First Prize for Old Jackson.

H. B. Nye returned Tuesday from his visit to the industrial exposition at Spokane, Wash. Himself and partner, H. G. Wortman, who is now visiting in Portland, took about 400 pounds of rock from their mine on Galle creek to the exposition, where it was displayed with other mineral exhibits from Jackson County. The rock from the Galle creek mine was fabulously rich and the attention of the best and wealthiest mining men of four states and British Columbia was directed wistfully to this golden product of mother earth.

Medals were offered by the exposition management for the best display of ore from the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and British Columbia, and the first prize was awarded to Messrs. Nye & Wortman. Think of it, old Jackson County in competition with all the above named rich mining country—and a winner over all of it.

The prize was a silver medal, about the size of a silver dollar but much heavier. On one side was inscribed:—"First prize, 'Bill Nye' mine, Jackson County, Oregon," and around the outer edge was lettered "Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Montana, British Columbia." On the other side is "Seventh Annual Spokane Exposition, Mineral Department, 1900."

All kinds of guesses were made as to the value of the rock on exhibition by old mining men. The highest guess made was \$40,000 to the ton. To gratify their curiosity an assay was caused to be made of a small piece of the ore, weighing 3.98 ounces, and it was found to contain 44-100ths of an ounce of gold. The assayer, Mr. C. M. Fossett, gave out in his report that in a ton of the ore there would be 3247.06 ounces, or \$67,116.52. This he stated was the highest assay ever made in his office.

Articles of incorporation have been drawn up and filed with the secretary of state, at Salem. The name given the association is the Bill Nye Gold Mining and Milling Company. The incorporators are H. B. and N. B. Nye, Frank Ward, Harry Wortman, A. B. Ralston and J. E. Enyart.
