THE Pacific Miner, a bright and new paper, containing much information upon the mining affairs of the state, has recently been launched in Portland with H. S. Harcourt, a practical and able newspaper man, as editor.

GOVERNOR GEER has appointed Benjamin Young, of Astoria; J. F. Calbreath, of Salem, and L. Flynn, of Albany, to succeed themselves as members of the board of regents of the state normal school at Monmouth. Their term of service is six years.

IN CINCINNATI recently William Bernard sued his wife for a divorce and alimony, she being wealthy. The judge granted the divorce and gave the poor husband one dollar a year, all of which goes to show that the age of the new woman is surely upon us.

A STRIKE is on involving 500,000 metal workers and machinists. The strike is for nine hours' work for ten hours' pay. We know nothing of the merits of the strike, but it is certain that the workingmen of the country should participate in the good times with which this great republic is blessed.

THE oldest mail carrier in the United States is Samuel Gibbons, of Hodgenville, Ky. He is 76 years old, and for sixty-three years, with hardly an intermission, he has been in the employ of the government as a mail carrier. His career in this capacity was begun in 1836, when he was eleven years old, during the "Old Hickory" Jackson administration.

EACH succeeding day witnesses an improvement in Mrs. McKinley's health, and the party expects soon to start on the return trip to Washington. The President expressed his regret to Governor Geer for his inability to visit Oregon, and stated that he would endeavor to again visit the Pacific coast before the expiration of his term as president.

OF THE twenty-five vice presidents of the United States, Mr. Roosevelt is the ninth to be elected from New York. The fact illustrates the influence, under the electoral system, of the large and "doubtful" states. Since 1875 the Republican party has, except in two elections, chosen its candidate for vice-president from New York. Moreover, Mr. Hobart, one of the two exceptions, lived only fifteen miles from New York City, in New Jersey, another doubtful state. The Democratic party has chosen its candidate for president from New York at six of the last nine elections.

THE president was characteristically pointed and happy in his speech at San Jose. "We live," he said, "under a constitution that was made by 4,000,000 of people, and yet it has proved adequate for 75,000,000 of people. That instrument seems almost to be inspired to carry forward the holy mission of liberty. It seems not to have been made alone for those who framed it and

their successors, but for all ages and all mankind. That instrument stands today almost as it left the hands of its framers. Few amendments have been added, and those have only been to enlarge the priceless blessings of liberty and free government of the people, and no amendment can ever be made to the constitution of this country that will curtail the supreme and sovereign power of the people." All this is true, and the fact that it is true is an impressive tribute to the ability and foresight of the Philadelphia convention, of 1787, says the St. Louis Globe-Democrat.

Fortuna Mining Company, plaintiff, vs. Walter Briggs, et al, defendants. It is ordered that a new trial be granted to said cause.

Carrie M. Crouch, plaintiff, vs. Benjamin F. Crouch, defendant; decree annulling marriage.

SHAMROCK II IS WRECKED.

SOUTHAMPTON, May 22.—The Shamrock II with King Edward and party on board was totally dismantled by a squall off Cowes today. The topmast, mainmast and bowsprit were broken off short. Several sailors were washed overboard. King Edward had a miraculous escape.

Ashland Saloon Men Convicted.

The legal fight between the Ashland saloon keepers and the city of Ashland was opened in earnest last Thursday, when V. S. Lewis, H. Salomon, High & Sonichsen and Houck & Damo were arrested on a charge of selling liquor to one K. J. Johnson by the drink and in half-pint bottles, contrary to an ordinance prohibiting the keeping or maintaining of a bar room and saloon in the city of Ashland. The defendants were taken before City Recorder Berry, and were granted until last Monday to secure attorneys and prepare for trial. On Monday they appeared in court with C. B. Watson as their attorney, while the city was represented by Judge W. C. Hale, of Grants Pass, Judge J. R. Neil, of Jacksonville, and H. L. McWilliams, of Ashland. An attempt was made to secure the discharge of the defendants on a demurrer filed by Attorney Watson, in which he claimed that the ordinance under which the defendants were arrested were unconstitutional. The recorder overruled the demurrer, and the defendants were placed on trial. After the evidence had all been taken, which was in effect that said defendants had sold to the said Johnson above named, the whiskey in drinks and in pint bottles, Recorder Berry adjudged them guilty and imposed a fine of \$75 each on V. S. Lewis and H. Salomon, and \$50 each on High & Sonichsen and Houck & Damo. The cases will be taken up to the circuit court on a writ of review, pending the preparation of which the execution of the sentences were suspended.

These cases have attracted a great deal of attention, as the outcome will settle the question as to whether a municipality has the power to prohibit the selling of liquor within its limits. The defendants have declared their intentions of contesting the cases to the bitter end.

G. A. R. Resolution.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by Chester A. Arthur Post No. 47, Department of Oregon G. A. R. at their regular meeting, May 13, 1901:

RESOLVED, That we hold Memorial service in the opera house on Sunday, May 26th next, at 11 o'clock, a. m., in accordance with the usual custom in this city, and that we most respectfully invite each and all the religious denominations to forego their usual worship in their several churches on the above mentioned hour and date and meet and participate with us in a union Memorial service on this occasion, believing as we do that a spirit of patriotism and reverence for our comrades who have given their lives for the country they helped to save demands that at least one Sunday annually should be devoted to services in their memory.

That a copy of the foregoing be given each of the pastors of this city with a request that it be read to their congregations, also that same be published in city papers.

To Water Consumers.

The city council passed an ordinance on the 14th day of May, 1901, increasing the water rate after June 30, 1901, to all consumers of city water, hoping thereby to make the service self-supporting. No water will be furnished after June 30th to irrigate any lawn or garden, except through a meter. If you want water for your lawn or garden, you will have to buy a meter and have the same attached to your water pipe before the 1st day of July next.

Water will be furnished for business property if desired, at a flat rate, and on such property a meter will not be required. On and after July 1, 1901, the water will be shut off on all residence and suburban property, unless you cause a meter to be attached to your supply pipe before that date.

If you expect or desire to use city water after June 30th, you should at once buy a meter and have it installed.

If you wait until July 1st to buy your meter, your water will be shut off before you can get it installed.

The city recorder will take your order for a meter at any time, and will send it for it, for you.

The city will not exact any profit from you for supplying you with a meter, but will supply and install the same at actual cost.

Meter rates for city water will be only eight cents per 1000 gallons. When you have a meter you can irrigate all day or at any hour you please. You pay for what you get, but no more than you get. You can make it cost yourself much or little as you please.

The cost of a meter and the installing of it will be \$8.75. ORDER YOUR METER AT ONCE so that your water supply will not be stopped on July 1st.
