MAN WAS BORN TO HUSTLE.

ONE of the clerks of the last Oregon legislature has become a Christian since the legislature adjourned, and recently sent the secretary of state \$2.50 in payment for various articles he carried away from the state house after the adjournment.

SEVERAL recent estimates, some of them apparently conservative, are that the output of gold from the Klondike district this year will amount to \$30,000,000, and that this amount will probably be undiminished for at least ten years.

Those mentioned as candidates are Governor T. T. Geer, Ex-State Treasurer Phil. Metcalf, Judge Wm. Coke and Gen. Owen Summers, the three latter being residents of Portland.

It is so unique and superlatively perfect that it has no rival and can have no successor."

THE greatest race of the nineteenth century, in which four nations are interested and the balance are attentive onlookers, is now in progress. Yankee pluck, brains and ingenuity are matched against foreign journalism of years and experience coupled with determination to win and confidence in so doing. The object of the race is to determine the shortest possible time in which the earth can be circled by travel, and for this purpose seven individuals have been selected. The one who reaches his original starting point in the quickest time, traveling around the world, shall be declared the winner. Four of the contestants are American youths—school boys—and are matched against three Frenchmen of much experience in traveling.

CATTLE raising in Oregon is a business which holds its own with any rural occupation in the state. Stockraisers are holding for prices which makes the business very profitable, and they will probably secure their price. In a country where there is comparatively little feeding to be done, what more profitable business is there than this? Oregon seems to be a regular nursery for young cattle. Not a year passes that several thousand head are not shipped to Dakota, Montana, Nebraska and other eastern states, and still there is no noticeable diminution in the supply. The severest winters in this state are mild in comparison with less

avored localities in the east, and young stock thrive here amazingly when open spring clothes our stock ranges with verdure, and grass springs like magic over our beautiful hills and valleys.

WILL NOT ARBITRATE.

CHICAGO, May 29.—The administrative council of the National Metal Trades' Association, at a meeting in the Great Northern Hotel, adopted a resolution abrogating the New York agreement with the International Association of Machinists.

The council decided that it would have no national arbitration of the wage question. A committee will be appointed to confer with the local officers of the Machinists' Union to arbitrate wages in Chicago, provided President O'Connell appoints a committee from the union for that purpose. A telegram was sent to O'Connell asking him to appoint a committee.

Henry Davis Killed.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 29.—Henry Davis, of Medford, was accidentally shot at this place, at 5 o'clock this evening, and died from the effects three hours later. In company with his wife he had just returned from rowing on Klamath lake, and on landing he attempted to take his rifle from the boat, the hammer of which caught on a projecting board, and was discharged. The ball entered his left side just below the ribs, and came out near the left shoulder.

The shocking news of Mr. Davis' sad death was received here with universal sorrow. His parents received a telegram about 6 o'clock in the evening, apprising them of the accident, and at once started for Klamath Falls. Shortly after leaving another message was received here announcing his death, which was delivered to them at Phoenix. Arrangements were made to start at once with the body, which will be met by Mr. Davis at some point along the route, who will bring it to Medford for burial.

Mr. Davis was a young man well and favorably known here. He has been a resident of Medford for about one year, and was engaged in business in this city. He was twenty-five years of age, and was married two years ago. He recently became a member of the Fraternal Brotherhood lodge in this city, in which order he carried a life insurance policy for \$1000. He also carried a policy for \$1000 in the Washington Life Insurance Company. Members of his immediate family surviving him are his wife, whose grief over the shocking affair is intense; his father, mother and sister, who reside here, and a brother residing in Kansas. He was nephew of Ex-Merchant G. L. Davis.

Damaging Hail Storm.

Last Saturday afternoon, between four and five o'clock, a heavy hail storm raged in a section of Lane County, covering an area of about 15 by 10 miles, around Thurston and Springfield, doing a great deal of damage to grain, fruit, hops and vegetables. One man, J. R. Douglas, reports that it damaged his crops to the extent of \$700, and states that there are many more equally severe losses. The hail ranged from the size of walnuts to as large as hen's eggs. At Springfield 500 window panes were broken. It is difficult to estimate the total damage.

THE GOVERNMENT IS SUSTAINED.

United States Supreme Court Hands Down a Sweeping Decision in the Insular Cases—Congress May Govern Dependencies.

WASHINGTON, May 27.—The United States supreme court today handed down opinions covering all the issues on the new insular possessions, which have been in controversy. Although several of the decisions uphold the contestants on certain issues raised, yet in the most important decision, that of Downes against Bidwell, Justice Brown announced the sweeping decision of the court upholding the general attitude and policy of the government up to the present time. The effect of this decision is to affirm the constitutionality of the Foraker act, and to give congress power to deal with a newly acquired territory in such a manner as the legislative branch may consider suitable for the new territory. The decision also has the effect of declaring that the new insular possessions do not by virtue of cession acquire all the privileges and rights of the constitution.

AMENDMENT WAS ADOPTED.

HAYANA, May 29.—The Platt amendment was accepted by the Cuban Constitutional Convention yesterday by a vote of 15 to 14. The actual vote was on accepting the majority report of the committee on relations, which embodied the amendment, with explanations on certain clauses.

The Radicals made a hard fight at the last moment, and Senors Portuondo, Gomez and Tamayo bitterly arraigned the Conservatives. Senor Tamayo was particularly vindictive and declared that everybody who voted in favor of the Platt amendment was a traitor to his country. The convention compelled him to retract this statement. On several occasions personal encounters seemed imminent.

To Water Consumers.

The city council passed an ordinance on the 14th day of May, 1901, increasing the water rate after June 30, 1901, to all consumers of city water, hoping thereby to make the service self-supporting. No water will be furnished after June 30th to irrigate any lawn or garden, except through a meter. If you want water for your lawn or garden, you will have to buy a meter and have the same attached to your water pipe before the 1st day of July next.

Water will be furnished for business property if desired, at a flat rate; and on such property a meter will not be required.

On and after July 1, 1901, the water will be shut off on all residence and suburban property, unless you cause a meter to be attached to your supply pipe before that date.

If you expect or desire to use city water after June 30th, you should at once buy a meter and have it installed.

If you wait until July 1st to buy your meter, your water will be shut off before you can get it installed.

The city recorder will take your order for a meter at any time, and will send for it for you.

The city will not exact any profit from you for supplying you with a meter, but will supply and install the same at actual cost.

Meter rates for city water will be only eight cents per 1000 gallons. When you have a meter you can irrigate all day or at any hour you please. You pay for what you get, but no more than you get. You can make it cost yourself much or little as you please.

The cost of a meter and the installing of it will be \$8.75. ORDER YOUR METER AT ONCE so that your water supply will not be stopped on July 1st.
