City Council Proceedings.

The city council met in regular session Tuesday evening, and transacted the following business:

An ordinance was passed to authorize the mayor and recorder of the city of Medford to execute a contract with the Southern Pacific railroad company to supply city water to said company.

An ordinance was passed recognizing the validity of the \$30,000 issued by the town of Medford to the Medford bank.

Report of the recorder for May was read and accepted.

Report of engineer for wood received was accepted and placed on file.

Petition of W. J. King for liquor license for six months from June 11, 1901, was granted and license ordered issued.

On motion the street committee was instructed to examine the sidewalks in front of the Thos. McAndrews, Wm. Barnum and J. S. Howard buildings on Seventh street and report the condition of same to the council.

On motion it was ordered that no more water meters shall be put in until they have been examined and approved by the water committee.

The resignation of J. W. Lawton, city recorder, to take effect June 8th., was read and accepted. W. T. York was placed in nomination to succeed Mr. Lawton, to enter upon the duties June 11th., and was unanimously elected.

Resignation of W. T. Kame, as councilman, was read and accepted.
