NEWS OF THE STATE.

The next supreme lodge meeting of the A. O. U. W. will be held in Portland.

Oakland has established a quarantine against Yoncolia on account of small-pox at the latter place.

Six hundred and forty acres of timber and near Forest Grove was sold last week to a Mr. Starns, of Michigan, for \$4400.

The total amount subscribed on the popular loan for school bonds for Eugene was \$53,000, more than twice the amount called for.

A severe cold burst and electrical storm occurred in Baker County last week. The first crop of alfalfa in the county was destroyed.

The Douglas County Citizen, a weekly newspaper recently started at Riddle, has suspended publication. The plant will be moved to California.

Woodburn will soon have first class fire protection. Six hydrants are being put in on the main street, and a new chemical engine has been added to the fire department.

The Coquille City council has instructed the town recorder to advertise for bids on \$14,000 worth of 20-year 4 per cent bonds. The money is to be used in constructing a water system for the town.

Joseph Keil, an old resident of Baker County, was choked to death Monday. He attempted to eat a piece of raw meat, which lodged in his throat, and he strangled before medical aid could be summoned.

At the annual meeting last week of the board of regents of the state normal school at Monmouth, the salaries of the professors were raised so that President Campbell will now receive \$2200, and other professors from \$900 to \$1300 per year.

The state treasurer recently made a call for scalp bounty warrants, which were issued under the old bounty law, but for the payment of which there were no funds. The call covered warrants aggregating about \$65,000, which is a little more than half the total amount issued. Warrants to the amount of about \$32,000 have already been sent in and cashed at the treasury department. The money for the payment of these warrants arises from the 3-mill tax authorized by the last legislature for that purpose.

Attorney General D. R. N. Blackburn and District Attorney J. N. Hart, late Saturday afternoon, filed a suit on the part of the State of Oregon in the circuit court for Marion County, against George W. Davis, the defaulting clerk of the State Land Board, and his bondsmen, George G. Bingham and E. P. McCormack, for the recovery by the state of the amount of the bond, \$5000. The bond was given to the State of Oregon during the administration of Governor Sylvester Penney, Secretary of State George W. McBride and Treasurer Phil Metschan.

NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

American Trap-shooters Beat English and Scotch Teams—A Battleship Is Taken Through Hell Gate—Photographer Falls 300 Feet From Balcony and Is Uninjured.

Capital is said to be leaving Paris because of a socialist scare.

The supreme court of Tennessee has decided that women cannot practice law in that state.

Henry Xavier, known all over the country among horticulturists, especially by raisers of grapes, died in Mount Vernon, N. Y., aged 75 years.

The remains of ex-Governor Pingree of Michigan, who died in London, were shipped at Southampton June 23 for New York.

The American trap-shooters were entertained at a farewell banquet in the Cafe Royal, London, by the Middlesex Gun club. Poultny Bigelow presided. The British team and the editors of the leading sporting papers were present. Secretary Gage of the Middlesex Gun club paid over the £1,000 purse and delivered the cups won by the various American shooters. The Americans also gained a victory over the Scotch team at Glasgow.

At Camden, Ark., Tom Watson, who, with his wife, falsely swore that the negro, Will Bussey, had committed an assault upon Mrs. Watson, was taken out by a committee of citizens and given 500 lashes. The testimony of Watson and his wife was the means of Bussey's being sentenced to be hanged, but Mrs. Watson recently confessed that she was forced by her husband to swear falsely against Bussey, and on learning this Governor Davis suspended the negro's sentence. Watson was placed on a train going south and given instructions not to remain in Arkansas.

Leander Southard, a well-to-do farmer of Norwood, L. I., began suit against his neighbor, John Johnson, for \$10,000 for alienating his wife's affections. Three years ago Mrs. Southard told her husband that she loved Farmer Johnson. She declared, however, that she had done no wrong, and refused to leave the house. Southard thereupon drew a chalk line through the premises, and neither has invaded the other's territory. Every Saturday night Southard left housekeeping money on the line. Johnson was a frequent caller, but Southard only glared at him across the chalk line. Mrs. Southard recently left her little boy on the chalk line and disappeared for the night. Southard thought this sufficient provocation for divorce and damages, hence the action.

The Hamburg-American line Deutsche land arrived at Plymouth June 19, having covered 3,682 miles in 5 days, 11 hours and 51 minutes, at an average speed of 23.33 against 23.53, her best previous record.

Without the assistance of a pilot, and to demonstrate that a first-class battleship could be successfully navigated through Hell Gate at New York, Captain Henry N. Manney took the battleship Massachusetts through the Narrows. The battleship draws between 33 and 37 feet of water, while the channel of Hell Gate is scarcely any deeper than this in some places. It was thus made clear that battleships of a foreign navy could enter by this channel. Secretary Long, however, in view of the danger incurred, has since issued a stringent order that no battleship shall go through Hell Gate except under conditions of great emergency.

The legal preliminaries in the suit of Portia Knight, the American actress, against the Duke of Manchester for breach of promise have been completed, and the case has been set for hearing. Colonel Knight is now in London to support his daughter's interests. Damages are placed at \$50,000.

Sir Harry Hamilton Johnston, special commissioner for the Uganda protectorate, has returned to London after an absence of two years. He says the country surrounding Mount Kenya is totally depopulated as a result of tribal wars, and is consequently stocked with big game as tame as English park deer. Zebras and antelopes can be approached to within ten yards and there is no sport in killing them. Elephants and rhinoceros are also abundant, and lions in Uganda are too busy eating hariboebs to notice a passing caravan. The prehistoric giraffe has been discovered in this country by the commissioner, who proposes to maintain the region referred to as a national park. Sir Harry photographed a race of ape men in the Congo forest differing entirely from Stanley's pygmies and obtained photographic records of their language and music. Twelve varieties of rubber trees are found in this country in inexhaustible supply.

President Schurman of Cornell university, in his address to the graduating class, said that, save in politics and invention, America was far behind the countries of Europe, especially in the domain of higher culture. "While in the industrial sphere we have developed world leaders, in the intellectual we are content to be underlings. America has not," continued Professor Schurman, "produced a single man or woman whose name will shine in the intellectual firmament with Raphael, Shakespeare, Copernicus, Newton, La Place, Goethe and Darwin."

George R. Lawrence, an adventurous photographer, who went up in a balloon at Chicago, fell 300 feet with his car as a parachute, struck upon his feet and escaped without a scratch. The balloon became separated from the car by the breaking of the ropes, but with remarkable presence of mind Lawrence grasped the two sidebars above the platform, so that the platform acted like a parachute and broke the force of the fall.

CRIMES AND ACCIDENTS.

Fourteen persons are believed to have been killed and a number injured as the result of a fire following an explosion among a quantity of fireworks in the store of Abraham Rittenburg at Paterson, N. J.

D. B. Jones, a negro preacher, who, it is alleged, attempted to commit an assault on Mrs. Davis, was taken from the guardhouse at La Grange, N. C., and lynched.

Frank Smith and F. D. Mel and, held at Benton, La., for complicity in the murder of John Gray Foster, were taken out of jail by a mob and strung up to a tree. The lynchers said that it was necessary to put these negroes to death in order to preserve the lives of white men in the locality.

Three persons were killed and several injured by lightning during a severe electric storm which passed over Indiana. At Greentown and Hartford City there was much damage to property.

A Rock Springs (Wyo.) dispatch says that George Ecker, a Philippine volunteer, who raised a check several months ago and who shot and killed Deputy Sheriff C. B. Hildon and fatally wounded Fred Reardon while resisting arrest, was captured and placed in jail at Evanston. He narrowly missed lynching at the hands of a mob near Thomas Francis' ranch, and only the vigilance and determination of the officers in charge of the prisoner prevented summary justice being meted out.

Eight lives were lost in a tornado at Napier, Neb. The killed were members of the Greening and Anderson families. The town of Napier was nearly wiped out.

A dividend of 50 per cent has been declared in favor of depositors of the First National bank of Vancouver, Wash., which was closed by the controller of the currency April 29th.

Amos Z. Clark lost his hand in an accident on the new line of the electric street railway between Altadena and Rubio canyon, Cal., at the junction of the Altadena and Mount Lowe lines. The accident was caused by the breaking of a rod on a construction train and the cars leaving the track.

Captain John Briercliff Brown, keeper of the Fort Bonita light near San Francisco, will, after nearly 30 years of faithful service, retire from his position on July 1st. In his 30 years at the lighthouse Brown and his assistants saved 40 lives. Some were rescued from capsized boats, others from the wrecks of ships. In October, 1874, when the tug Rescue went on the rocks, nine men were saved.

Miss Viola Van Ornum, a nurse whose home was in Chico, Cal., died at the Receiving hospital at San Francisco from the use of medicine taken for an unlawful purpose. "Dr." Victor Popper, an illegal practitioner, who was accused of prescribing the drugs, when placed under arrest by detectives, took from his pocket a phial labeled "carbolic acid" and drained its contents. In a few minutes he was dead. C. H. P. rent, a real estate dealer and mining man, whose wife and family are in Los Angeles, was living with Miss Ornum.

In the case of Charles G. Adams, an unfrocked Episcopalian minister, who at Berkeley, Cal., shot John G. Jessup, the coroner's jury found "that death was caused by a gunshot wound in the chest by one Charles G. Adams, after having been repeatedly warned by said Adams not to enter the premises." Jessup had gone to Adams' house for the purpose of protecting Miss Adams from the violence of her drunken father.

FOREIGN ITEMS.

A Berlin dispatch says that Canada is specifically excepted in the official announcement that the federal council, on the basis of the law of May 20, has decided from July 30 to extend to the products of Great Britain and her colonies the most favored nation treatment.

The first volume of the census returns shows the population of the United Kingdom to be 41,545,073, an increase in ten years of 3,721,650. England and Wales show 78.4 per cent of this total, while Ireland shows a loss.

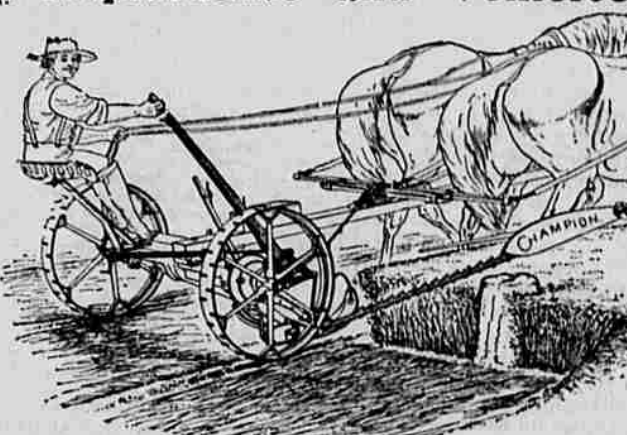
