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CAN'T CROWD US OUT

Trade of United States with Canada Shows Big Increase.

This Despite the Fact of the Preferential Tariff Rates Established Between Canada and Great Britain—A Year's Record.

The Canadian preferential tariff in favor of the United Kingdom has not had the expected effect of reducing the proportion which the United States supplies of manufactures imported into Canadian territory. A copy of the Canadian Manufacturer, just received by the treasury department bureau of statistics, sharply calls attention to the fact that imports of dutiable articles into Canada from the United States in the fiscal year 1899 aggregated over \$44,000,000 and from Great Britain less than \$28,000,000, and that the United States is furnishing a much larger amount of manufactures of iron and steel than the United Kingdom, and still:

"The preponderance of trade is overwhelmingly in favor of American manufactures, and tariff preference in favor of British goods to the contrary notwithstanding, American manufactures are taking the cream of the business. Is it possible that British manufacturers are entirely unable to compete in the Canadian market?"

The Canadian tariff, it will be remembered, was in 1897 so adjusted that the duty on articles entering Canada from the United Kingdom was made, beginning with April, 1897, 12 1/2 per cent, less than the rate from other parts of the world, and on July 1, 1898, another reduction in favor of the United Kingdom was made, bringing the total reduction to 25 per cent, as against goods coming from other parts of the world. A recent announcement indicates that, beginning with July 1, 1900, a still further reduction would be made, so that the rates of duty on articles from the United Kingdom would be 22 1/2 per cent, less than those from other parts of the world. While the effect of the third reduction of 12 1/2 per cent, which went into operation July 1, 1900, cannot yet be determined, it is practicable to compare the imports of manufactures into Canada from the United Kingdom and the United States respectively during the years ending June 30, 1898, 1899 and 1900, and thus determine whether the advantages which the manufacturers of the United Kingdom during that time have a perceptible effect upon the relative growth of the imports of Canada from the two countries, the United Kingdom and the United States.

THRONE OR WEDDING.

Bill to Enable Wilhelmina to Marry and Yet Remain Queen.

Therefore two bills are about to be put before the states general, the first giving the parliamentary consent to Queen Wilhelmina's marriage to Duke Henry of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, and the second granting full naturalization to the duke, as well as deciding upon his future title. Temporarily this title is that of prince consort. Preparations for the wedding are being hurried along.
