MAN WAS BORN TO MURDER.

NEWS OF THE STATE.

The bill for convict labor at the penitentiary more foundry for June amounted to \$1041.95.

An endeavor is being made to have the next National Educational Association meet at Portland.

One day last week the house of Jim Tooski, an Indian, near Oregon City, was burned to the ground and his aged wife, who was totally blind, perished in the flames.

Benjamin George, the 8-year-old son of John George, of Mohawk, fell from a heavily loaded wagon, one day last week, the wheels passing over his head, crushing it in a terrible manner.

The Eugene creamery paid out over \$2000 among 180 patrons, for cream, during the month of June. Over 1200 pounds of butter was churned during the same month.

The Oregon City water commission has decided to put in a new gravity filter plant, with a capacity of 1,000,000 gallons in twenty-four hours, which will be installed at once. It will cost \$12,750.

Benj. Farley, an employee of the Booth-Kelley & Co. mill at Coburg, fell 25 feet from the rear slab chute, lit on a pile of slabs, just missing the big fire used to consume refuse, and escaped with slight bruises and a small burn.

McDaniel, the convicted murderer of Clara Fitch, was taken to the penitentiary immediately after the decision of the supreme court sustaining the verdict of the lower court. It was feared that he would commit suicide unless moved at once, as he had stated that he would never go to the penitentiary.

Manny Howard, the noted horse and cattle rustler of Eastern Oregon, whom the stockmen have tried for the past fifteen years to land in the penitentiary, was convicted of horse-stealing in the district court at Baker City last week, after a hotly contested trial. Howard had been tried many times before, but always escaped conviction. He was regarded as the most dangerous stock rustler in the state.

The Corvallis Times says that the erection of a fruit dryer is about to be undertaken at the Oregon agricultural college. Construction will be under the direction of the various station men, and an attempt will be made to evolve an appliance that will embody every scientific principle necessary to produce the best results in the curing of fruit for commercial purposes. The dryer will be on a small scale, but yet large enough to make the results certain. It will only be used for experimental purposes.

Through the efforts of the Oregon Fish and Game Association, many Oregon trout streams that have been practically fished out promise ere long to again become good fishing ground. Last week the association planted 10,000 eastern brook trout in Cox creek, Eliza County, and in a short time 100,000 speckled trout and 20,000 rainbow trout will be ready to leave the hatchery. The eggs are hatched at the Chickamauga hatchery at the expense of the government, although the Oregon Fish and Game Association meets all other expenses incident to the restocking of Oregon's trout streams, such as transportation of the eggs, the feeding of the fry and the planting of the fish after they are large enough to leave the hatchery.

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NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Tammany Increases Personal Assessments In New York—Suicide of the "Cowboy Preacher"—Equal Suffrage In Colorado—Doxley Mobbed.

Pierre Lorillard, the millionaire tobacco manufacturer, died in New York July 7. He was nearly 68 years of age.

Earl Russell will be tried before the British house of lords on July 18 on the charge of bigamy.

A message by wireless telegraph was received at Cape Ray, Newfoundland, from the steamer Lake Champlain, 300 miles out at sea, stating that the steamer would pass that point the next evening at 8 o'clock. There was quite a fog at the time, but this did not appear to affect the signals.

The steamer Braemerton arrived at Tacoma from the Orient and brings details of the loss of 300 lives by a landslide and flood at Lungkung, in China, in June. The landslide was caused by a tremendous earthquake which unsettled both land and sea.

A New York dispatch says that the Tammany dragnet system of putting nearly every one on the tax rolls for personal estate for sums ranging from about \$5,000 to several millions has resulted in increasing gross personal assessments by more than \$64,000,000. Some of the larger assessments are the following: Frederick W. Vanderbilt, \$2,000,000; George W. Vanderbilt, \$2,000,000; William K. Vanderbilt, \$1,000,000; J. D. Rockefeller, \$1,000,000; Ottendorfer estate, \$1,000,000; Andrew Carnegie, \$1,000,000; Russell Sage, \$600,000; A. G. Vanderbilt, \$500,000; H. H. Rogers, \$500,000; Joseph Pulitzer, \$500,000; Marie Marshall, \$330,000; Adrian Iselin, \$400,000. Tammany has also increased the valuations on city real estate to \$133,892,075.

By a decision of Judge Palmer in the district court at Denver liquor may be sold on Sunday and saloon-keepers may sell liquor to women in wine rooms connected with their saloons. Judge Palmer is of the opinion that women have the same right as men to purchase liquor, and that the equal suffrage constitutional provision swept away the last vestige of inequality between man and woman under the laws of the state of Colorado.

Rev. L. G. Brooker of the Evangelical church, well known as the "Cowboy Preacher," committed suicide at his home in Kearney, Neb., by shooting himself with a revolver. Brooker stood charged with criminal relations with Hattie Longmate, who had been an intimate of the Brooker family during her residence at Grand Island.

Professor John Fiske of Cambridge, the famous lecturer and historian, died at the Hawthorne Inn, East Gloucester, Mass. The cause of death was excessive heat, of which he had complained for two days. Mr. Fiske was 59 years of age and was for many years connected with Harvard.

Allen O. Meyers has brought suit in the United States district court at Columbus, O., for \$50,000 damages against the grand lodge of Elks. He says he was illegally expelled from the order; that his newspaper, The Elk, was destroyed, and his history of the Elks rendered valueless, and the ritual of the order, of which he was the author and proprietor, was appropriated and is now in use, for all of which he asks damages in the amount stated. Meyers was expelled five years ago and would have been barred from bringing suit by the statute of limitations in a few days.

The Chicago Tribune gives the number of casualties throughout the country due to celebrating the Fourth as follows: Dead, 25; injured, 1,813; fire loss, \$128,185. Those who were injured suffered from the following causes: Fireworks, 750; toy pistols, 225; toy cannon, 244; firearms, 200; loose gunpowder, 266; injured in runaways, 38. Total, 1,813.

About a score of the disciples of John Alexander Dowie visited Evanston, a suburb of Chicago, for the purpose of showing the people of Evanston the error of their ways. The instant the Dowieites began their meeting they were assailed with eggs, vegetables and other missiles, and despite the efforts of the entire police force of the place, a mob of 1,000 people drove them out of town.

The Pope has sent a letter to the superiors and generals of the religious orders and institutions condemning the French legislation against congregations, and says that he who touches the priests or monks touches the apple of the church's eye.

Jessie Morrison, convicted of manslaughter in the second degree for the murder of Mrs. Clara Wiley Castle on July 22, 1900, was sentenced at El Dorado, Kan., to five years in the penitentiary for confinement at hard labor. Miss Morrison took the sentence calmly.

W. Ed Stokes gave a dinner at the Union League club at New York to General Maximo Gomez and General Estrada Palma. Mr. Stokes was formerly a member of the Cuban League of America, and was closely identified with the work of the junta, of which General Palma was the head. Cuba and the United States, said the general, belong together. It is only a question of gravitation when they will be one. But at present, after the great struggle in which thousands of lives were sacrificed and when men returned to their homes only to find their wives and children starved to death in the restricted barriers in which Weyler held them under his policy of reconcentration, they felt that they must have Cuba free. It is realized fully, he said, that Cuba cannot get along without the United States, but the Cubans want to feel freedom.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Lord Kitchener telegraphs to the war office under date of Pretoria, July 4, as follows: "Grenfell, on July 1, at Howell, captured 93 Boers and a lot of supplies belonging to Meyer's commando."

The London Daily Mail gives sensational prominence to mail advices from Vlakfontein which attribute to the Boers inhuman atrocities that the censor would not allow to be described by cable. "A couple of Boers," says the Daily Mail's correspondent, "who were armed with Martinis walked around among the dead and dying. Some they turned over to see if they were dead. If it were otherwise, than one or the other of the Boers shot them as you would shoot an ox. I saw four killed in this way. One youngster pleaded for his life. I heard him say, 'Oh, Christ, don't!' and then, bang! went the rifle. That is what happened." The Daily Mail protests vigorously against the suppression by the censor of such details.

Great Britain has refused the request of this government to release American who were made prisoners while fighting with the Boers, and they will have to endure captivity until the close of the South African war. Such persons, it is contended, lose their nationality. The state department at Washington is satisfied that all reports as to the British ill treating their prisoners are without foundation.

The Brussels correspondent of the London Morning Post says: "Dr. Leyds has addressed to the continental powers and the United States a protest against Great Britain's 'barbarous treatment' of Boer women and children. It is said that Holland will support the protest."

The report of the governor of the island of St. Helena, dealing with the year ending March 31st, says: "The lies in the European papers about the Boer prisoners exasperated even the prisoners. The latter enjoy large liberty and are well behaved, contented and anxious to work. Many of them are employed by the farmers, and others are employed on the roads and wharves."

THE TROUBLE IN CHINA.

An edict signed by the emperor and empress dowager of China has been posted in Chinese Thibet announcing that the Europeans have been victorious in Northern China, and ordering that the lives of missionaries and Christian converts be respected, on pain of decapitation.

A dispatch to the Berlin Volks Zeitung from China says that according to advices received at mission headquarters many missionaries have returned to the interior of Shantung province, where they were well received by the Chinese. The missionaries from every locality report their belief that the present calm will not last. The German foreign office, however, says that official reports received from China seem to show that no new preparations are being made for further uprisings, and that upon investigation the various alarming reports of approaching trouble in China were found to be unwarranted.

A dispatch from Albuquerque, N. M., says that Professor Francis J. Birtwell of Boston met a horrible death on the Rio Pecos. He was high up in a tree after a bird's nest when the rope he was using caught on a limb, the loop tightened around his neck and he was slowly strangled to death before the eyes of his bride of a month, who, with two men, stood at the foot of the tree, unable to help the unfortunate man.

The directors of the Cured Fruit association, at their meeting in San Jose, Cal., by a unanimous vote elected F. N. Woods, president, vice H. G. Bond, resigned. Louis F. Bond, chief accountant, was chosen treasurer, vice F. N. Woods, and Judge H. G. Bond was made a member of the executive committee in place of Mr. Woods. The new president has a large orchard in Santa Clara valley, but his home is in San Francisco. He was formerly a member of the firm of Whittier, Fuller & Co.

Word was brought by the steamer City of Seattle that George O'Brien, who killed Lynn Reif, Fred Clayton and Lawrence Olson on the frozen Yukon river trail in December, 1899, has been found guilty of murder in the first degree, and has been sentenced to be hanged in Dawson on August 23rd. The expenses of the trial are estimated at \$100,000.

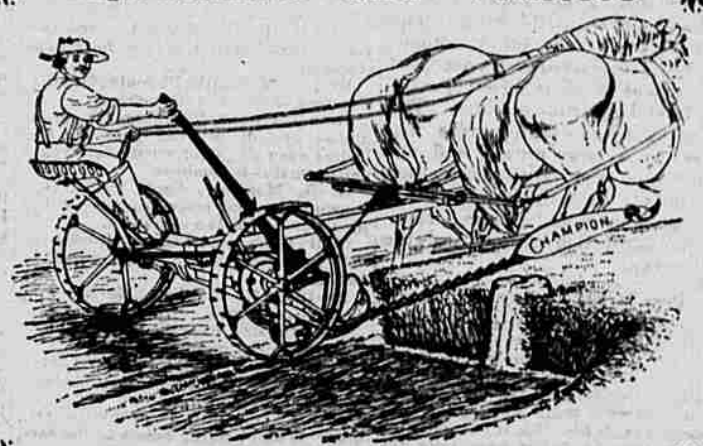
