NEWS OF THE STATE.

The price crop in Douglas County is said to be larger this year than ever before.

Crops were badly damaged by frosts around Dufur, and a good deal of wheat is being cut for hay.

The depositors of Gilbert Brothers' bank, of Salem, are rejoicing in the news that they will be paid dollar for dollar.

Grasshoppers are reported to be swarming the hills and valleys south of Pilot Rock. Serious damage to growing crops is anticipated.

A fellow named Burt Bedient, of Junction City, hired a team on the Fourth, drove one horse to death and seriously crippled the other. He was not drunk.

The wheat crop in Lane County will amount to 800,000 bushels this year, which is better than an average crop. This will help the farmers out on their almost total failure last season.

The English partridges recently introduced into Linn County are doing well. Three broods of young ones have been seen near the foot of Knox Butte, within a few miles of where they were liberated.

John Kelsch and wife of Jefferson, were riding on a load of hay when it was overturned. The woman was thrown in the ditch, lay on top, and nearly drowned before she could be rescued.

In the Pioneer Day parade at Union, Donham Wright carried an ox yoke which his oxen wore across the plains in 1890. It was made from a white oak tree, which grew on the Charlton river bank, in Iowa.

F. Gasser, who resides on Birch creek, 12 miles southwest of Pendleton, seeded only one acre of bromegrass on alkali land, and cut three tons of hay from it this season. Scarcely anything but bromegrass would have grown on the land.

E. W. Haines and M. H. Shipley, of Forest Grove, have finished buying 1200 tons of this year's timothy hay at \$10 per ton. In 1899 the price paid for the same class of hay during the month of July was \$7, and last year the price paid was \$9.

The Woodmen of the World will initiate 1000 candidates in Portland on August 31. It is expected that 10,000 members of the order will be present from all over the state. The ceremony will take place at midnight in the open air near Mt. Taber.

The sale of property heretofore bid in by Lane County for taxes was completed last evening. Every piece on the list was sold to speculators, there being four regular bidders during the sale besides persons occasionally interested in individual cases, most going for nominal sums, while farms for ten cents.

A so-called case of smallpox was discovered in the smoking car on a Southern Pacific train at Roseburg last Saturday. The patient was a soldier and said the trouble was due to his recent vaccination. His arm and hand were quite badly broken out. The railway officials ordered another car substituted for the smoker when the train stopped at Roseburg, and the car carrying the afflicted man was attached to the rear of the train and taken on through to Portland.

NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Bride Drowned During Her Honeymoon—Novel Injunction—New Senator For South Dakota—Unsuccessful Trial of an Air Ship.

American and Danish capitalists propose to start a direct steamship line from Christiania and Copenhagen to Chicago.

The Minnesota state parol board approved the parole of Cole and James Younger, who have been in the Stillwater penitentiary for the past 25 years for complicity in the robbery and murder at the time of the raid on the North bank.

The National Educational association, at its meeting at Detroit, passed a resolution in favor of establishing a national university at Washington, to be supported by the government.

Charles S. Young of Ypsilanti, Mich., has succeeded in getting Judge Kinne to issue a novel injunction. It perpetually restrains Foster Kilpatrick from visiting Mrs. Young or from speaking to her, or writing to her or in any way, directly or indirectly, corresponding with her through the aid of a third person. He says in his application that Kilpatrick induced Mrs. Young to start divorce proceedings at one time, but the case was discontinued. Kilpatrick has appeared on the scene again, and Young says his wife is growing discontented once more.

The prediction that because of inferiority the negro as a race would die out in the United States finds no support in the census returns of 1900. It is estimated that the negro constitute 11.8 per cent of the total population of the country as against 11.9 a decade ago, the apparent loss being due to the greater growth of the northern states and not to any less proportion of negroes in the south.

The strike of the Newport News Shipbuilding company's machinists was settled by the unanimous decision of the men to return to work at the old scale.

Governor Herreid of South Dakota has appointed A. B. Kittredge of Sioux Falls to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Kyle. The new senator is a native of New Hampshire, having been born in Cheshire county March 26, 1861.

Judge Hall of the United States district court in Salt Lake City, Utah, rendered his decision in the celebrated Hilton-Park case, the court holding that the ceremony of "sealing" performed in 1873 was purely a religious ceremony affecting the lives of Mrs. Hilton and Dr. Park only in the hereafter, and was not a marriage ceremony known to or recognized by the laws of Utah. Mrs. Hilton, claiming by this ceremony to be a widow of Dr. Park, had sued for part of the estate. At the time when Mrs. Hilton (then Miss Armitage) and Dr. Park were "sealed" she was supposed to be dying, and it is a Mormon church doctrine that a woman dying out of the marriage state does not occupy so high a plane in heaven as a woman who has been married.

At the special convention of the supreme lodge of Knights of Pythias, held at Chicago, an address to the members was issued. The official figures of the result of the examination of the insurance department of Illinois and Connecticut, as given in the address, show that on June 1, 1901, the gross assets upon the books were \$635,236, of which the sum of \$292,853 was not admitted, leaving net assets of \$342,383. The actual liabilities for the same date were \$660,143, thus leaving a deficiency of \$225,267. John A. Hinsey, as a result of an investigation of the affairs of the endowment rank, has resigned his position.

Judge James M. Sellers, one of the brightest and best known attorneys in Indiana and a prominent figure in legal and political circles, committed suicide by taking morphine in his office at Crawfordsville, Ind. He left a letter, in which he stated that his life had been a total failure, and that he had been the "poorest kind of a financier for every one, and especially for myself."

M. Santos-Dumont, the Brazilian aeronaut, made the official trial of his balloon at Paris in the attempt to win the prize of 100,000 francs offered by Henry Deutsch for a mannaeable balloon. Failure of motive power, however, necessitated a descent after the balloon had gone some distance, and it was caught and suspended in the branches of a tree. The aeronaut was not hurt. He will resume his attempt to win the Deutsch prize in a few days.

Clifford Smyth, former United States consul at Cartagena, Colombia, started Sunday, July 7th, from Brooklyn to walk to San Francisco, which he expects to reach on foot in six months, at the rate of 20 miles a day. Smyth wears a golf suit and broad-brimmed straw hat and carries a knapsack. He has tramped in this manner through great Britain. He expects to defray the expenses on the present trip by delivering humorous lectures in some of the larger cities on his experiences in Colombia.

A London dispatch says: William S. Wedge, an American, who, with his bride, an 18-year-old London girl, was spending his honeymoon at Stratford-on-Avon, went boating on the river. Mrs. Wedge stood up to change her position, when she lost her balance and fell overboard. Wedge dived repeatedly after her, but could not find her. He was found later on the bank prostrated with grief and exhaustion. His wife's body was found three hours afterward.

Six persons were drowned while surfing bathing at a picnic of the Hebrew Gamahl at Danfuskle beach, Savannah, Ga. The current swept them out to sea, and their bodies were not recovered.

THE TROUBLE IN CHINA.

General Gaselee, who commanded the British Indian troops at Peking, left July 14 on route for England by way of Japan, Canada and the United States. There was a special guard of American, German, Italian and Japanese troops at the station and a number of Chinese police. The presence of the latter was an unusual occurrence. Part of General Gaselee's staff will remain at Tientsin with General O'Moore Creagh, who succeeded General Gaselee. Colonel Alexander of the Sixteenth Bengal Lancers is now in command of the British troops in Peking. The Sixteenth Bengal Lancers, the Savourh Rajputs and the Welsh Fusiliers will leave about the middle of August. Only 250 troops will be left as a legation guard.

The Chinese officials are making elaborate preparations to save the emperor's feelings, when he re-enters Peking. All evidence of the destruction wrought by the war along the streets to be traveled by the emperor will be temporarily disguised. A Hung Chang has deferred the withdrawal of the foreign troops from the temples and palaces to not later than August 15. The ministers of the powers have acquiesced and have notified the various commanders of their decision.

James A. Ragsdale, American consul at Tientsin, has sentenced three American looters, caught in the Chinese quarter of the city, to four years' imprisonment in the American jail at Shanghai. Ragsdale has turned over the Europeans caught looting to consuls of Great Britain and Denmark respectively.

Secretary Hay has sent instructions to Commissioner Rockhill to support the Japanese application for an enlargement of their indemnity to be paid by China from 50,000,000 yen to 54,000 yen to cover the depreciation in Japanese bonds as compared with those of some other nations.

CRIMES AND ACCIDENTS.

Paul Hagne, known as Professor Zeno, an aeronaut, was fatally injured at Inland Park, Springfield, O., falling 200 feet. His parachute failed to open.

The home of Mrs. Helen Althoff, a widow, one mile north of Vallejo, Cal., took fire, and before assistance could be rendered Mrs. Althoff and her little daughter Gertrude were burned to death. The explosion of a lamp is believed to have caused the fire.

The Chicago and Alton's restituted limited passenger train bound from Chicago to Kansas City collided with a fast live-stock train between Marshall and Norton, Mo. Nineteen were killed and 28 are in Kansas City hospitals. Many of the passengers were imprisoned in the cars while scalding steam poured in upon them.

County Treasurer Alfred Norlin of Minden, Neb., who confessed to the embezzlement of \$10,000 of county funds and admitted that he set fire to the courthouse in order to cover his crime, was sentenced to six years' imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$5,400, the amount of his shortage after a previous restitution.

Nine men were killed as the result of the collapse of a bridge at Springfield, Pa., while a local freight train was passing over the structure. When the locomotive and the cars went down a gang of Italian laborers working under the bridge were caught beneath the wreck. Eight of the Italians were killed and a number of others badly injured. P. A. Moore, the conductor of the train, was instantly killed.

Superior Judge Sloss at San Francisco handed down a decision declaring unconstitutional the law fixing a day's labor under state contracts at eight hours. The decision was reached in the action instituted by L. & E. Emanuel for a writ of mandate to compel the board of harbor commissioners to pay them a balance of \$1,800 due on a contract for the furnishings of the new postoffice building at the ferry. The contract called for the payment of \$2,745. The board advanced \$945, but refused to pay the balance on the ground that the plaintiff corporation had violated the eight-hour law, and the sum withheld, \$1,800, represented the statutory penalty of \$10 a day for violations of the law, it being alleged that the plaintiffs had violated the contract on 180 days.

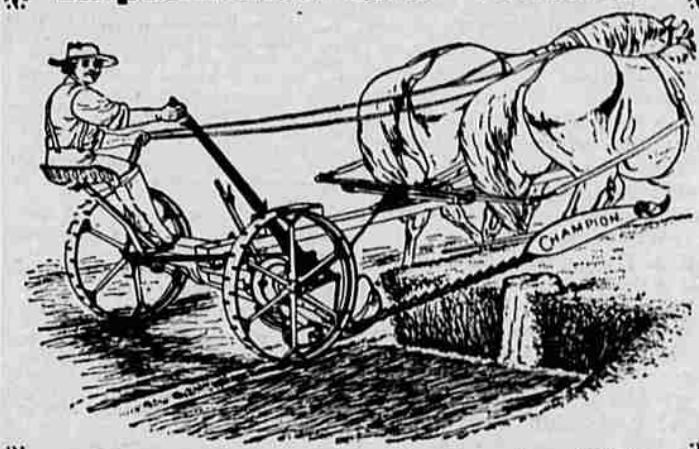
