The great emporium at Sydney, Australia, of Anthony Horner & Sons, one of the largest department stores in the world, employing 1,800 hands and serving 30,000 customers on an average each day, was destroyed by fire, in which five men met death and nearly \$4,000,000 worth of property was destroyed.

Santos Dumont, the aeronaut, had a narrow escape from death at Paris while making a trip in his dirigible balloon in order to gain the prize of 100,000 francs offered for the rounding of Eiffel Tower and return within a given period of time. After a series of accidents the balloon exploded and the frame was caught on the coping of a building. He remained suspended in midair for half an hour, until he was rescued by means of ropes.

NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Scandal in the New York Police Department—Rear-Admiral Frank B. Rowan, Commander of the Navy's National Bureau for Divorce.

Scientific men are greatly interested in a huge meteorite, weighing nearly three tons, which fell in Atlantic City. The presence of sulphur is observed from the smell which pervades the air for several feet around it. Local astronomers say the largest meteorite previously known to exist weighs only 500 pounds, and it is valued at thousands of dollars. The value of this last visitor, they say, is worth a fortune to science.

A Medicine Lodge (Kan.) dispatch says that David Nation, through his attorney, brought suit for a divorce from his wife, Mrs. Carrie Nation, the temperance crusader. Nation alleges that his wife held him up to public ridicule, neglected her family duties and abandoned his home.

The Society for the Prevention of Crime, better known as the Parkhurst society of New York, has obtained documentary evidence that the police department was engaged in protecting poolrooms and gambling-houses. Security Commissioner Devery, Captains Flood, Delaney, Vredenburg and McNihan, Sergeant Schulten and the entire force of telegraph operators at police headquarters are directly accused of warning rambles of intended raids over the police department wires. The sum of \$50 was the price received from each gambling hall for each tip sent out of a prospective raid.

Rear-Admiral Robley D. Evans, his book entitled "A Sailor's Log," reflected upon the conduct and motives of Secretary of the Navy W. E. Chandler in 1884, and as the result of a complaint made by Mr. Chandler, the navy department has severely reprimanded Rear-Admiral Evans.

An interesting romance has been brought to light by the announcement of the approaching marriage of Solomon Berliner of New York, United States consul at Tenerife, Canary Islands, and Miss Jennie Ottenberg of Washington. D. C. Mr. Berliner received in his mail one day at Tenerife a letter from Miss Ottenberg, a student at Columbia university, Washington, asking that he save her such used postage stamps as came to the consulate. A regular correspondence resulted, and during his vacation he visited Washington, and the announcement of his engagement has followed as a sequel.

The White Star line steamer Oceanic, which sailed from Liverpool for New York, collided in the Irish Channel during a fog with the steamer Kinross of Waterford, Ireland. The Kinross sank. Seven persons were drowned.

A Pittsburg dispatch dated Aug. 25 says that according to estimates of the Amalgamated association leaders, 65,000 trust workmen have joined the steel workers' strike, making 105,000 men on strike.

The wheat yield of Washington will be 25,000,000 bushels, an increase of 4,000,000 bushels over last year. Idaho and eastern Oregon will produce about 10,000,000 bushels more, making a total yield of 35,000,000 to be shipped through the grain elevators at Tacoma, with the exception of that part of the crop used in the state or ground for flour. The yield has averaged at least 30 bushels an acre. On many farms in the Walla Walla valley and the Palouse district it will run higher than this.

Great preparations are being made throughout Canada for the reception of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York, who will visit the dominions in September and October.
