PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

ITEMS OF INTEREST PICKED FROM THE WEEK'S DISPATCHES.

Destructive Forest Fires—Perilous Trip on a Gold Dredger—Ex-Chief Clerk of the Mint Charged With Embezzlement—Great Bullion Robbery.

U. P. Pettigrew was arrested at Visalia, Cal., on a charge of forgery. The checks forged are against the Visalia Fruit and Land company.

By a fire at the Oregon Livery and Feed Stables, in Portland, about 50 horses are supposed to have been burned to death. The total loss is about \$30,000.

The postoffice in San Mateo, Cal., was entered about daylight Sunday morning by a burglar, who blew the safe open with dynamite and made good his escape with \$150.

A wine cellar containing 400 gallons of wine, a fruit-house holding 200 pounds of dried fruit, and a barn with a number of farming implements, belonging to Paul Laborde, near Middletown, west of Redding, Cal., were destroyed by a fire that is thought to have been of incendiary origin.

Walter N. Dimmick, ex-chief clerk of the mint at San Francisco, was arrested by secret service agents on the charge of having embezzled \$30,000, as well as many smaller sums, from that institution. It is said that a woman has been traced through the ex-chief clerk's unofficial life.

The preliminary examination of Mrs. C. A. Scholes for the murder of A. A. Richmond, at Yakima City, July 25, resulted in Mrs. Scholes being discharged. The examination was before Justice Taggard, at North Yakima, and extended through two days. The court was of the opinion that Mrs. Scholes was justified in shooting Richmond, as he had used threats against herself and husband.

Captain E. Alexander, the commanding officer of the steamer Santa Rosa, was called to the custom-house on the arrival of the steamer at San Diego and found there a letter from Secretary Lyman J. Gage of the treasury department, accompanying a gold medal in recognition of his heroic conduct in saving the life of a drowning man at Port Harford on April 5, 1890. The medal, which weighs fully four ounces, is inscribed, "In memory of heroic conduct in saving a life from the perils of the sea."

The body of a young girl, chopped to pieces and then placed in a trunk and buried was found eight miles south of Seattle. The trunk was discovered during the grading for the new racecourse. Coroner Hoye says there is no doubt a murder was committed. The bones are those of a young girl not over 14 years of age, the body having evidently been buried about four years.

The American bark Empire, owned by J. J. Moore of San Francisco, was destroyed by fire off Mahukoua, Hawaii. She arrived at Mahukoua on the 24th of July after a voyage of 73 days from Newcastle with a cargo of coal. Two days later it was discovered that her cargo was on fire, and despite all efforts to quench it, the bark burned to the water's edge a short distance from shore, and everything was lost.

There was enacted recently at Pacific Grove, Cal., a Sunday-closing ordinance, and City Councilman O. K. Tuttle, the prime mover in the passage of the measure, was the first to break it, and was fined in consequence. Tuttle is the proprietor of a drug store, and on Sunday morning sold a hairbrush, this being against the law, as only drugs are allowed to be sold on Sunday. A strong feeling is said to exist against the new ordinance. No milk, ice or bakery wares are allowed to run, and great inconvenience is thereby occasioned.

At Winter Quarters, Utah, where the mines of the Pleasant Valley Coal company are situated, a flood, caused by a cloudburst, swept away the home of Matt Korbilo. Korbilo, his wife and child were swept away by the torrent, the father and child being drowned, while the mother was rescued only with the greatest difficulty. Mrs. Korbilo was terribly bruised and received injuries which may prove fatal. Floods have caused considerable damage to property in various parts of Utah.

A strange state of mixed relationship was brought to light at Petaluma, Cal., when Maria Bacigalupi and Mr. Bacigalupi of Healdsburg were granted a license to wed. The bride was formerly the wife of the brother of the groom. The witnesses were Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Bacigalupi of San Francisco. The witness, Mrs. Bacigalupi, is a daughter of the bride and a niece of the groom. The husband of the witness is her own first cousin, a nephew of the groom and twice a nephew by marriage of the bride.

James Cosgrove, locator and owner in the early fifties of the great San Juan mine in Yuba county, Cal., and a notable stock manipulator in San Francisco from 1861 to 1881, died at his late residence, 11 McAllister street, San Francisco.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

A dispatch from Bloemfontein, dated Aug. 11, says that the 3,000 refugees who arrived at Brandfort the previous day are all in a wretched state of health. Diphtheria and other malignant diseases are so prevalent among them that additional aid has been sent to them. Small numbers of Boers continue to surrender in the Grange River Colony.

A dispatch from Lord Kitchener, dated Pretoria, Aug. 10, says: "A block-house near Brandfort (Orange River Colony) was rushed and captured by the Boers, after severe fighting, the night of Aug. 7. Elliott has captured 70 prisoners and large quantities of stock and wagons, which he is sending in. No details have been received."

Lord Kitchener has issued a proclamation declaring that all leaders of armed bands, being burghers of the late republic, shall, unless they surrender before Sept. 15, be permanently banished from South Africa. "The cost of maintenance of the families of all burghers in the field who have not surrendered before Sept. 15 shall be recoverable from such burghers, and shall be a charge upon their property, removable and immovable, in the two colonies." The government is determined to put an end to the present state of things, "which is aimlessly prolonging bloodshed and destruction, and inflicting ruin upon a great majority of the inhabitants, who are anxious to live in peace and earn a livelihood for themselves and their families."

A Boer spy, believed to be a resident of Pretoria, who took the oath of neutrality and afterward rejoined his command, entered town and three policemen started out to arrest him. The spy, who was back of the door of a house, drew a pistol and shot the policemen, severely wounding them. He then made his escape.

Lord Kitchener, in a dispatch from Pretoria, says that a post of 25 men, belonging to Steynacker's Horse, on the Sabi river, was surprised and captured by the Boers. Lord Kitchener reports "so the surrender at Warpi Baths of Commandant de Villiers, who was second in command to Beiers."

A Doctor Advises For Cadavers.

Dr. L. C. H. E. Ziegler, of Chicago, who advertised for the bodies of 400 human beings on which he could operate, has found many persons who are willing to accept his grim offer. Men and women of all conditions of life—some for money, some for the sake of science, some who are tired of the trials of life—have written to the physician and asked that he meet them and seal the bargain. Dr. Ziegler has been kept busy answering telephone calls, reading letters and meeting those who called in person to see him.

The doctor expresses the belief that within six months, the limit he has set, he will obtain the 400 bodies. The first letter Ziegler opened was a short one and to the point. It read: "Dear Doctor—I have the goods to deliver.—Manning, 7 West Beethoven Place." Another read: "I will sign your terms.—P. F. Egan, 271 South State street." Then came a letter from a man who explained why his body was on the market. It was: "I am willing to make the deed, as I have no insurance.—E. Galvin, 3215 West Huron street."

Dr. Ziegler's search for bodies arises from his desire to prove his contention that surgery can be performed without anesthesia. He has found, he says, that patients under the effect of anesthetics move, and cannot be photographed clearly. He desires to make photographic illustrations of tests, and as there are to be 400 of them, he is anxious to have cadavers.

THE TROUBLE IN CHINA.

There is great mortality from malignant typhoid fever among the German troops at Tientsin.

A dispatch from Peking dated Aug. 10 says: All the French troops in Peking, except the legion guard, evacuated the city to-day. The British and Italians have not yet left and there is a temporary German guard of about 400.

One of the foreign ministers said recently the protocol would be signed in three weeks. The delay was caused by two questions. In the first place, the Chinese want certain foreign expenditures to be under Chinese control. In the second place, Sir Ernest Satow, the British minister, wants a better understanding on the indemnity question.

A cable from Peking to the New York Sun says that the Italians, who have been occupying, along with the British, the summer palace, have committed many depredations. They have burned the chief temple, which was the finest structure in North China, and are now dismantling the famous bronze pagoda prior to their evacuation. The British section is intact and vigilantly guarded.

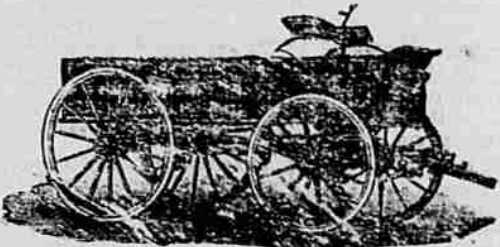
