## NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

An Actress Commits Suicide In Presence of an Audience—Single Case in a Will—Matrimonial Epidemic on a Manila Transport.

The population of Canada, according to the recent census, is 5,337,885, an increase of 505,844 over the census of 1891.

The Santa Fe Railroad company will erect a big hotel at the entrance to the Grand Canyon of the Colorado.

Owing to the enormous supply of fruit from Jamaica all the American companies have materially reduced the purchase price, and cultivators are expressing much dissatisfaction.

The Canadian yacht Invader, in a grand race with the yacht Cadillac, won the Canada's cup, which goes back across the border, but accompanied by five challenges.

Eastern manufacturers are opposed to the re-enactment of the Chinese exclusion law, in view of China's being in the future the greatest market in the world for certain products of this country.

A Fairbault (Minn.) dispatch says \$25,000 in bills will be publicly burned by order of the probate court unless a clause in the will of Harvey T. Scott is knocked out by the courts. Scott, who was 82 years old, left an estate of \$50,000, half of which is in bank notes and United States currency. In order to deprive his legal heirs—three in number—of any share in this money he directed that it be burned. Last winter \$3,000 was burned by Scott in the presence of witnesses. The heirs have protested on the ground that the administrator has no more right to destroy money than he would have to destroy buildings.

The steamship Lucania, from Liverpool to New York, communicated by wireless telegraph with the Nantuxet lightship at a distance of 287 miles. The New York Herald shore station, to which came the wireless message from the lightship, is at Siasconset, a favorite summer resort on the island of Nantuxet.

Chicago physicians, while examining Karl Wambold with the X-ray, discovered that he has two hearts. The right heart is said to perform its functions as properly as the left heart, against which it presses slightly, and both are as free from disease, apparently, as any normal heart. Physicians say there has never been a similar case, so far as medical records show.

Private Schmidt of Company D, Fourteenth United States Infantry, camped at the rifle range near Mount Clemens, Mich., made a score at 600 yards range that breaks the shooting record of the whole army. Of the 23 shots which he fired at the target, which was a dummy man, 19 took effect in parts of the dummy where, had the target been a living man, they would have caused death, while the 20th would have caused a serious or fatal wound. ## EVERY MAN HIS OWN PROPHET

Head of Weather Bureau Tells How to Make Guesses About the Weather.

Willis L. Moore, chief of the United States weather bureau, has published an almanac for the guidance of the public, entitled "An Almanac and Weather Guide." Mr. Moore declares that anyone, by studying weather maps and "getting the hang" of them, can predict the weather for himself. He says:

"If the student of the weather map will pay close attention to it day by day he will see that the 'high' and the 'low' move across the country from the west to the east in almost regular succession. If the 'high' be a decided one it will cover a territory 1,000 or 2,000 miles in width, the weather within its influence will be cold and clear and the winds will have a general tendency spirally outward from the center. The 'low' is the opposite to the 'high' in almost all of its characteristics. It is usually attended by clouds, rain or snow and high winds. The winds within the influence of a 'low' blow spirally inward. The lower the barometer and the steeper the gradient the more rapid is the whirl of the storm eddy. Storms of like class take nearly the same course and produce nearly the same results; but they do not always move with the same rapidity. No exact rule in regard to them can be laid down. Empirical reasoning and intimate association with the charts day by day and year after year in the main equip the most successful forecasters, but, as previously stated, any intelligent person can, with a little study, make profitable deductions.

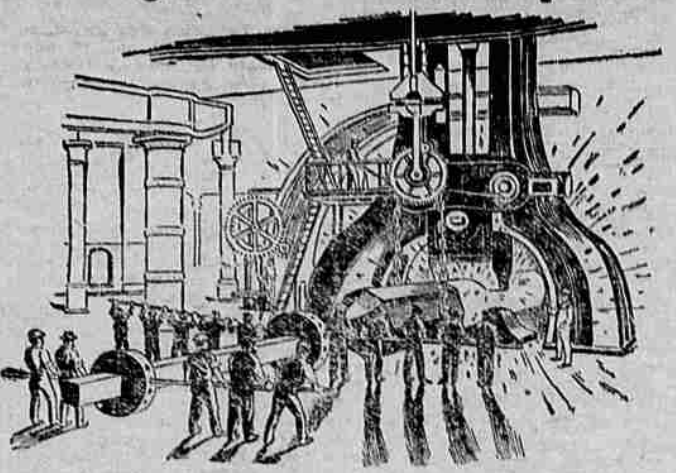
"Low pressure areas which approach from the southwest are reasonably sure to cause precipitation, while many from the northwest will pass with little or no rainfall. . . . The approach of a storm center from the west is attended by warmer, easterly winds and unusual precipitation, and its passage is followed by colder, westerly winds and fair weather."

Mr. Moore, in speaking of the hottest and coldest places in the world selects the Colorado desert as the hottest place in the United States, and mentions a recorded temperature there (at Mammoth tank) of 128 degrees. The lowest temperatures in the United States occur in the extreme northern portions of Minnesota and North Dakota, where 50 and 55 degrees below zero are common.

Reliance and Stormy Cape Horn. In history, as well as in romance, Cape Horn looms before the imagination as the especial home of tempests, shipwrecking billows, cross-seas, black squalls, sleeting, roaring gales and freezing blasts, and recent study of the meteorological conditions prevailing about the stormy cape does not diminish the darkness of the picture. The hydrographic bureau has undertaken to collect statistics concerning the weather at Cape Horn. In this manner, it is hoped that some of the difficulties of the Cape Horn passage may be overcome through scientific advice to ship captains.—Pilot Chart.

The Good Queen. Queen Victoria was profoundly religious. She believed in the efficacy of prayer. She was a regular Bible reader, and frequently used a well-worn Bible that belonged to Gen. Gordon, and was presented by his sister to the queen, who acknowledged the gift in an autograph letter. 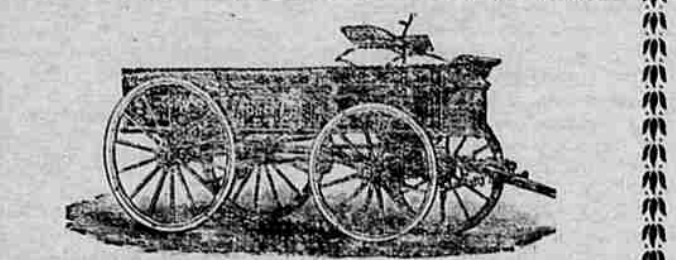
