HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Customs Franks on the Mexican Boundary—Attempt to Swim the English Channel—Exposition Will Open at St. Louis in 1904.

The death is announced of Miss Maude Coleman Woods of Clatsopville, Va. Miss Woods was pronounced the most beautiful woman in America by a committee from the Pan-American exposition, and her profile adorns all the medals issued by the board of awards.

Governor Longino of Mississippi has issued a statement of the condition of the state treasury showing that on Aug. 15 he found a shortage of \$107,021. The publication of this statement created great excitement. Mr. Stowers, the treasurer, declined to make a statement.

A Chicago dispatch says that James A. Fleming, reputed to be a wealthy mine owner of Phoenix, A. T., has been sued for \$50,000 damages by Miss Jessie M. Graham, who alleges that Fleming promised to marry her in 1891, and has failed to do so. Miss Graham formerly lived in Butte, Mont.

An E. Paso (Tex.) dispatch says that Jose Remon Valdez, the leader of a gang of bandits that has terrorized the entire state of Durango (Mexico) for three years, was killed by the rural guards.

Frederick H. Port, the handsome, swarthy son of James F. Porter, a millionaire real estate dealer of Brooklyn, killed himself with carbolic acid because his father had disinherited him to prevent his marriage to his sweetheart, Anna Josephine Gibson. Porter met the girl and they went to a cafe and had refreshments. He told the girl his troubles, and suddenly took a bottle from his pocket and swallowed the contents before Miss Gibson could interfere. He died in his sweetheart's arms. The parents were summoned, and their grief was pathetic.

An exposition in commemoration of the purchase of the Louisiana territory will be opened at St. Louis on May 1, 1903, and will close Dec. 1. President McKinley has issued a proclamation inviting all the nations of the earth to send such exhibits to the Louisiana Purchase exposition as will most fully and fully illustrate their resources, their industries and their progress in civilization.

The Press-Post printers of Columbus, O., refused to "set" news furnished by a local news bureau and the paper appeared filled with miscellany. The news department of the paper having been abolished, the News Writers' union declared a lockout, and the printers decided that hereafter they will set nothing but editorials and advertisements until the trouble between the proprietor and the News Writers' union is settled. The action of the printers is approved by the local typographical union.

A dispatch from Copenhagen says Dr. Sophus Bang of that city, manager of the laboratory belonging to Professor Pinseu, the inventor of the light-cure for lupus, has constructed a special electric lamp giving a feeble light, but which is extremely rich in chemical rays. Metal instead of carbon poles are used. The bactericidal power of this lamp is ten times as great as that of an ordinary arc lamp, and a lupus patient requiring 75 minutes' treatment with the arc lamp will require only from three to five minutes' treatment with the new one.

In response to a largely signed petition recently forwarded to the British home office asking for the release of Earl Russell, now serving a sentence of three months' imprisonment for bigamy, Home Secretary Ritchie writes that he can see no reason why he should interfere, and that the health of the prisoner is satisfactory.

The third death from yellow fever resulting from the bite of a mosquito has occurred at Havana. The victim was Miss Clara Mian of New Jersey, who died on the seventh day after she was taken ill. Of the six persons bitten in the course of the yellow fever commission's experiments three have died, and the doctors say the other three are suffering from light attacks of the disease. Miss Mian was a nurse at Las Animas and desired to become a nurse.

Reports from Zapata county, Tex., confirm the news that the poorer classes there are facing starvation. They must have immediate help in the way of food or the results will be terrible. Range water has failed and cattle are too weak to travel and are dying rapidly. The country is literally burned up by drought. There is not a green thing to be seen except cactus plants. Zapata county is 60 miles from the nearest railroad and whatever in the way of food is sent to the farmers in the famine-stricken place must be hauled from Laredo, a two days' trip at best.

FOUND PLAYING WITH BEAR.

Missing Three-Year-Old Child Is Discovered While Carousing the Animal.

"The lost baby and the big black bear" furnished a Sabbath sensation to police headquarters at Dallas, Tex., that lasted Chief of Police Price and his men all day. Lizzie, the three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Self, was suddenly missed by her parents late in the evening. They had left her playing on the sidewalk in front of the family home on Canton street. After searching for the child for an hour they notified the police department and a general search throughout the city was instituted. The theory of kidnapping was about accepted by them as the hours passed with no tidings of the missing child.

About seven o'clock in the morning two mounted officers riding through the section of the city park in which the girl was located, discovered Lizzie seated in front of a large iron grating cage in which a big black bear was confined. The child's feet and arms were extended inside the cage between the bars of the structure, and the little one was gleefully prattling to and petting the big brute.

Lizzie was taken to headquarters and restored to her parents. Chief Price, who used to be a Texas ranger, remarked to the child's parents and the newspaper men:

"If that had been me, or one of the force had taken such 'berlies will flip Ben, he would have chewed an arm or leg off for us, to say the least. God took care of the baby."

OIL AS FUEL FOR STEAMER.

Steamship Cowrie Voyaged from Bornoe to London Using Liquid Fuel.

The steamship Cowrie, which is discharging a cargo of oil from Bornoe at the Thames dock, steamed from Koet, Bornoe, to London, a distance of 9,250 miles, using only a liquid fuel. This was required to a spray by a steam jet at the furnace door. The owners say that the substitution of coal by oil proved most advantageous.

Six stokers sufficed instead of 16. The speed was slightly improved and the bunker space was also economized. A ton of oil occupying but 34 cubic feet, compared with the 45 cubic feet taken up by a ton of coal. Twenty-two tons of oil were daily consumed on this voyage, as against 35 tons of coal consumed in former voyages.

Borneo oil is declared to be excellent fuel, and is superseding the Russian and American product in the far east, as it can be delivered at 30 shillings a ton in Hong-Kong, 35 shillings in Japan and Colombo and 30 shillings at Suez.

Five Thousand Spectators Witnessed the Thrilling Scene—Escapes from Perilous Predicament with Only a Few Scratches.

High above the heads of 5,000 spectators at Binghamton, N. Y., a man crawled from the mouth of a cannon attached to a balloon, a mere speck against the sky. It was a task apparently beyond human accomplishment, and when he slipped on the smooth sides of the gun there was a murmur of horror from the myriad of upturned faces, and several women fainted, but with one hand he grasped a rope, and for a moment swung suspended 2,000 feet above the earth. Then, by a tremendous effort, he regained the tow of the cannon as the balloon and its broken shot earthward. The man was Prof. R. J. Burke, of Binghamton, Mich., and he came to Binghamton to make a series of ascensions at the Binghamton exposition. He was to be loaded into a cannon attached to the balloon, and when at the height of 2,000 feet was to be fired from the gun at a parachute hanging from the balloon's side, with which he was to descend. Shortly after starting he discovered that a rope had caught around the trigger which fired the cannon, and it would not explode. His only hope was to crawl from the inside to the top of the gun. Before this was accomplished the balloon had gained a swift downward impetus, and, though he endeavored to lighten it, it struck in a tree in a forest some miles away, and he was held a prisoner in the tree top an hour and a half before released. He escaped with a few scratches, but in those few moments he lived a lifetime of agony, and when he slipped from the gun he gave himself up as lost.
