AN ANARCHIST TRIED TO KILL OUR PRESIDENT.

ANARCHIST CSOLGOSZ TAKEN INTO CUSTODY.

President Strives to Calm the Enraged People—Cries of "Lynch Him!"—Mrs. McKinley Bears the Shock With Fortitude—Doctors Are Hopeful.

BUFFALO, Sept. 6.—President McKinley was shot and seriously wounded by a would-be assassin while holding a reception in the Temple of Music at the Pan-American grounds a few minutes after 4 o'clock this afternoon. One shot took effect in the right breast, the other in the abdomen. The first is not of a serious nature, and the bullet has been extracted. The latter pierced the abdominal wall and has not been located. The would-be assassin carried out the work without a hitch. The president, though well guarded by United States secret service detectives, was fully exposed to such an attack as occurred. He stood at the edge of the raised dais upon which stands the great pipe organ at the east side of the magnificent structure. Throngs of people

through that surrounded the presidential party, a medium-sized man of ordinary appearance and plainly dressed in black, approached, as if to greet the president. Both Secretary Cortelyou and President Milburn noticed that the man's hand was swathed in a bandage or handkerchief. Reports of bystanders differ as to which hand. He worked his way amid the stream of people up to the edge of the dais until he was within two feet of the president.

President McKinley smiled, bowed and extended his hand in that spirit of gentleness the American people so well know, when suddenly the sharp crack of a revolver rang out above the hum of voices. There was an instant of almost complete silence. The president stood stock still, a look of hesitancy, almost of bewilderment, on his face. He then retreated a step, while a palor began to steal over his features.

Then came a commotion. Three men threw themselves forward as with one impulse and sprang toward the would-be assassin. Two of them were United States secret service men who were on the lookout, and whose duty it was to guard against just such a calamity as had here befallen the president and the nation. The third was a bystander, a negro, who had only an instant previously grasped the hand of the president. In a twinkling the assassin was borne to the ground, his weapon was wrested from his grasp, and strong arms pinned him down.

The president, after the first shock of the assassin's shot, walked steadily to a chair and seated himself, at the same time removing his hat and bowing his head in his hands. In an instant Secretary Cortelyou and President Milburn were at his side. His waistcoat was hurriedly opened, the president meanwhile admonishing those about him to remain calm, and telling them not to be alarmed.

"But you are wounded," cried his secretary; "let me examine."

"No, I think not," answered the president. "I am not badly hurt, I assure you."

Nevertheless his garments were hastily loosened, and when a stream of crimson was seen to wind its way down his breast, their worst fears were confirmed. The president was taken to the exposition hospital, whence he was removed to the home of President Milburn. When the news was broken to Mrs. McKinley she bore the shock remarkably well and displayed the utmost fortitude.

The doctors are hopeful that the president will recover.

At police headquarters, where the prisoner had been taken, a cry of "Lynch him!" was raised, but the police drove the crowd back. His name is Leon Czolgosz. He states that he is an anarchist, and that he became an enthusiastic member of that body through the influence of Emma Goldman, whose writings he had read, and whose lectures he had listened to.

William Jerome, the song writer, is negotiating for the lease of the Comique theater, on Broadway, New York, and if he secures it, it will establish there a permanent company, composed entirely of negroes. The best colored actors and actresses obtainable will be engaged, and Jerome expects the enterprise to prove a big money maker, catering wholly to colored people.

There is a little stock ranch down on Box Elder creek, near Silver City, in South Dakota owned by August Petersen, which is the only stock farm of its kind in the country. Mr Petersen raises beavers for their fur, and it is said that his crop next year will make him thousands of dollars.
