NEWS OF THE STATE.

Portland has lost a minister—Rev. Fung Chai, who had charge of the Chinese Mission. He goes to Canton to take charge of the First Baptist Church, with a Chinese membership of one thousand.

Fifty thousand acres of Oregon timber land in one sale is reported from Portland. The pine belt of Michigan is practically exhausted and the Northwest must yield its forest treasures. What will the future be for timber?

The most remarkable yield of oats ever reported in Oregon, perhaps in the United States, is reported from the farm of S. E. Young, near Albany, occupied by John Lennox. On four acres scant measure, 596 bushels were raised, an threshed, and average of 149 bushels. The grain is a new variety of white oats, and the ground was particularly fertile.

The 10-year-old son of Jas. Weaver living near Malheur City, tried to kill his father last week by putting strychnine in his food. Shortly after eating of the poisoned food, Mr. Weaver was taken violently ill, but heroic measures were applied and he was soon out of danger. When asked why he did it, the boy said he had become tired of living on a ranch, and he thought that if he killed his father he would be able to find some better place to live.

The Robertson log raft has left for San Francisco in charge of two powerful tugs. It was built in the slough near Westport, and consists of 600,000 lineal feet of piling, procured in the vicinity of that place. The greater part of the timber came from the head waters of Beaver creek, from which a flume was specially constructed for the purpose, a distance of 10 miles. The raft was about eight months in course of construction. It is 634 feet in length, of cigar shape, and is about 40 feet in diameter, at the largest part. Its draft is about 24 feet, and it is very unwieldy to handle under the most favorable conditions. To tow it to San Francisco from the mouth of the Columbia is expected to take about ten days. The raft is the largest of its kind ever built.

NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Colored Bishop Denounces Lynching of Negroes—Consolidation of Coal Interests—Emperor William Receives the Chinese Expiation Mission.

James J. Keys, president of the Commercial National bank of Andrews, Ind., who pleaded guilty to a number of forgeries, was sentenced to 14 years in the state penitentiary at Michigan City.

The annual hunt of the Debeque Hunt association will be held Oct. 25 and 26, if these dates will suit former President Grover Cleveland. Mr. Cleveland will visit the Colorado hunting and fishing grounds about the middle of October.

All the bituminous coal mining companies of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, West Virginia and Kentucky are to be consolidated into one great corporation by the J. P. Morgan syndicate. The completion of this great project will mean the consolidation of from \$200,000,000 to \$300,000,000 of invested capital.

No. 1 Cotton Belt passenger train, leaving Texarkana at 9:25 p. m., was held up by six men and robbed near Eylan, at a wild and heavily timbered spot, four miles south of Texarkana. One of the robbers, who it seemed, was an expert engineer, ran the engine, mail and express cars some distance, and forced the express messenger to open his car. The robbers then blew open the safe with dynamite, securing, it is said, a very large amount of booty.

The fortune of the Dowager Empress Frederick totals 11,000,000 marks. Her six children receive one million each. The youngest, Princess Margaret of Hesse (wife of Prince Frederick Charles of Hesse) also gets Friedrichshof Castle, upon which Empress Frederick spent the whole of 3,000,000 marks bequest which she received from the late Countess Galliera. The dowager empress destroyed her all her papers of a private nature.

Ogden Armour, heir of the late Philip D. Armour and his father's successor in the packing business in Chicago and other cities, has agreed to pay into the United States treasury the sum of \$19,700 for smuggling pearls and diamonds into this country from Europe.

ADDRESS BY THE PRESIDENT.

Hitting Speech in Favor of Reciprocity and Trade Expansion.

BUFFALO, Sept. 5.—President McKinley, accompanied by Mrs. McKinley, visited the Pan-American exposition at Buffalo, and were the recipients of a warm welcome from great crowds of people. In an address the president spoke of the present unexampled prosperity of the country, and said that our "capacity to produce has developed so enormously and our products have so multiplied that the problem of markets requires our urgent and immediate attention." On the subject of commerce he continued:

"By sensible trade arrangements that will not interrupt our home production we shall extend the outlets for our increasing surplus. A system that provides a mutual exchange of commodities is manifestly essential to the continued healthful growth of our export trade. We must not repose in fancied security that we can for ever sell everything and buy little or nothing. If such a thing were possible it would not be best for us or for those with whom we deal. We should take from our customers such of their products as we can use without harm to our industries and labor. Reciprocity is the natural outgrowth of our wonderful industrial development under the domestic policy now firmly established. What we produce beyond our domestic consumption must have a vent abroad. The excess must be relieved through a foreign outlet, and we should sell everywhere we can and buy wherever the buying will enlarge our sales and productions, and thereby make a greater demand for home labor."

"The period of exclusiveness is past. The expansion of our trade and commerce is the pressing problem. A policy of good will and friendly trade relations will prevent reprisals. Reciprocity treaties are in harmony with the spirit of the times; measures of retaliation are not."

"If, perchance, some of our tariffs are no longer needed for revenue or to encourage and protect our industries at home, why should they not be employed to extend and promote our markets abroad? Then, too, we have inadequate steamship service. New lines of steamers have already been put in commission between the Pacific coast ports of the United States and those on the western coasts of Mexico and Central and South America. These should be followed up with direct steamship lines between the eastern coast of the United States and South American ports. One of the needs of the times is direct commercial lines from our vast fields of product to the fields of consumption that we have but barely touched. Next in advantage to having the thing to sell is to have the convenience to carry it to the buyer. We must encourage our merchant marine. We must have more ships. They must be made under the American flag, built and manned and owned by Americans. These will not only be profitable in a commercial sense; they will be messengers of peace and unity wherever they go. We must build the isthmian canal, which will unite the two oceans and give a straight line of water communication with the western coasts of Central and South America and Mexico. The construction of a Pacific cable cannot be longer postponed."

John Jacob Astor, Martin Maloney of Philadelphia, George H. Day and other directors of the Electric Vehicle company, which operates electric carriages in New York city, are defendants in two suits brought in the court of chancery by Richard Siegman and other stockholders of the concern. It is alleged that the directors have wasted or lost the entire \$5,000,000 received in cash for capital stock, and that they have, in addition, been compelled to raise \$1,500,000 by a mortgage to prevent a complete suspension of business. The complainants seek to hold the directors responsible for alleged losses.

It has been decided that the Columbia will defend the America's cup against Shamrock II in the forthcoming series of races.

The contents between American and Canadian riflemen at Sengrit, N. J., for the American Centennial Palma trophy, emblematic of the world's championship, was won by the Canadians by a margin of 23 points. The total score was 1,523 to 1,494. The Krag-Jorgensen rifle was used by the Americans, while the Lee-Metford was used by the Canadians.

IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Arthur Howard, the American deserter, was captured recently in the island of Mindoro and brought to Manila. He will shortly be tried by court martial. Howard denies that he was ever an American soldier. He says he was born in Spain, that his father was English and his mother Spanish, but that he espoused the cause of the Filipinos. He denies that he commanded the force at San Mateo that killed General Lawton. Two former California volunteers identified Howard as a deserter from their regiment named Walley.

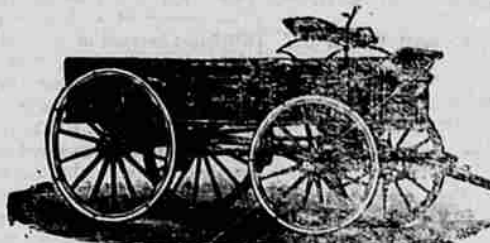

Dr. E. P. Hershey of Denver, at the meeting of the Rocky Mountain Interstate Medical association at Denver, said that he had found a function for the vermiform appendix. He asserts that it is a secretory organ, the function of which is the lubrication of the caecum, or the beginning of the large intestine. The arguments advanced in support of this theory were interesting, but the other doctors did not deem them conclusive. They refused to consider the paper in its original form, and Dr. Hershey was given a year in which to investigate the subject.

At the Ecumenical Methodist conference in London the colored Bishop Walters of Jersey City, in an impassioned plea, declared that there was a systematic effort on foot on the part of the white Americans to detract from the good opinion which the English people had of the American negroes. The English part of the audience loudly cheered the bishop's statements about negro morality, but several of the many delegates from the southern states went out, while others did not conceal their disagreement with the speaker.
