ITEMS OF INTEREST PICKED FROM THE WEEK'S DISPATCHES.

Squaw Buies Her Child Alive.—Colonel Northam sued for damages—during theft of \$29,000—Oll P. Ouders to incorporate—A Faithful Poodle.

The sugar-beet factory at Chino, Cal., closed down for the season, the owing more than 400 men out of employment. The beets will be shipped to the factory at Oxnard.

A coroner's jury returned a verdict that the railroad accident at Nyack, Mont., in which 35 men lost their lives, was caused by no fault of the train crew, but that a freight train escaped from Essex station through some unknown cause.

A fire that caused a loss of \$50,000 and will temporarily throw out of employment 100 persons destroyed the laundry and composing-room of the Judd-Judd company, printers, at 21 and 23 First street, San Francisco, and other firms in the same building and those adjoining suffered considerable loss from water. All the loss is covered by insurance.

A Pima Indian squaw named Nieves was arrested at Tucson, A. T., for attempted murder. There is a custom among the Pimas that where a child is born that resembles an American or Mexican it is immediately killed. Nieves, having given birth to a child which she thought did not bear a family resemblance, buried it alive in the ground. Indian Agent Burger learned of the affair 50 hours later, and on digging the child out, was surprised to find it still alive. The child apparently did not suffer much from its interment.

Government Surveyor Stafford has discovered an underground stream of pure, clear water 30 feet wide and 10 feet deep near Safford, A. T. He says the water can be brought to the surface by its own weight and used for irrigation purposes. The volume of water is large enough to irrigate 100,000 acres. Many people have gone into the neighborhood and taken up land on the homestead plan.

Dr. Walter Hough of the Smithsonian Institution at Washington has just completed a series of excavations in the famous petrified forest of Arizona, and has discovered ancient ruins and graves of former inhabitants. He says: "I found evidence of at least four groups which at different times have made this wonderful place their home. One of these groups was evidently of Zuni stock and a third Mokl. The third was a people possessing a gray pottery ware, and the fourth group I have thus far been unable to classify."

CRIMES AND ACCIDENTS.

By a fire at Emporia, Kan., a large number of residences, a planing mill and a lumber yard and the beautiful First Methodist church lie in ruins, and the damage will approximate \$100,000.

Bill Fournery, alias Bill Hillyard, a negro, charged with assaulting M. S. Wilson at Chestnut Grove, near Troy, Ala., was shot and his body burned by a mob near the scene of his crime.

At the ranch of Cayetano Rios, five miles west of San Diego, Tex., Luis Camerillo, Estacio Rosendez, Ysabel Lopez and Jesus Rios were killed by lightning and Juan Trevino fatally injured.

A dispatch to London from Copenhagen says the new Danish ministry has decided to accept the United States' offer of 16,000,000 kroner for the Danish West Indies.

The German third-class cruiser Wacht was sunk off Arkona, during the maneuvers in the Baltic, after having been in collision with the battleship Sachse. No lives were lost.

Andrew Carnegie, through his private secretary, has sent a letter to Lyman Evans, a member of the board of city library trustees of Riverside, Cal. It is to the effect that if Riverside will furnish a suitable site and agree to support a free public library at a cost of not less than \$2,000 a year, Mr. Carnegie will provide \$20,000 for the erection of a free library building. The city council has accepted the offer. The cost of maintaining the present library approximates \$3,500 a year, almost double the amount that Mr. Carnegie asks to be guaranteed for its support.

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NEWEST DEFORMITY.

Strange Affliction of Business People in Our Cities.

Known as the Lunch Counter Hump and is Contracted Through the Habit of Feeding on High Stools to Eat.

The lunch counter hump is the latest deformity noticed by physicians among the business people of all the big American cities, says the New York Journal.

To remedy this evil a Philadelphia legislator has introduced a bill into the Pennsylvania legislature.

It provides for the regulation of the height of stools at lunch counters—or, perhaps, more exactly, that these stools shall all be provided with screws to permit each customer to adjust his to his own comfort.

This bill is the work of John M. Campbell, a widely-known hotel man of Philadelphia.

The lunch counter hump, he declares, arises from the postures more or less inconvenient by which men of varying sizes, heights and shapes endeavor to adjust themselves to the unvarying and rigid standard of the prevailing lunch counter stool.

Nor is the lunch counter hump confined to the poor and lowly. Mr. Campbell has poured all the thirty odd places in his city in which the unyielding and inflexible stool holds sway, and everywhere, from the costly hotel lunch counter to the beany or daffy, the hump was to be seen. Rich and poor enjoy its possession, provided there be any enjoyment in the possession of a hump; but only a few of the victims realize the fact that they have it.

Even the women, many of whom patronize lunch counters, are among its victims. To such an extent has the awkward deformity made its way among the fair ones that a special corset has been devised to meet it and make it less apparent.

Yet it remains curiously true that persons of medium height are the least sufferers. It is your very tall men, who must bend almost double to reach their food, who are the chief sufferers. These, after a few weeks of lunch counter practice, acquire poses and contours altogether different from the ones originally provided by nature.

Mr. Campbell feels certain that not only for the protection of the lunch counter victims themselves, but for the satisfaction and comfort of their friends and families and those with whom they may have dealings, it may be necessary to urge the speedy passage of his contemplated law.

It will provide, among other things, for the appointment of a competent inspector or inspectors in every city having a population of more than 500,000, "whose duty it shall be to measure, determine and from time to time to inspect and certify as to the height and capacity for adjustment of all stools, fixed, revolving or rotary, in all those resorts and eating places therein, commonly known and designated as lunch counters, which said inspectors may be of the male or female sex."

TAGGED FISH IN THE OCEAN.

Thousands of Them at Large Bearing Uncle Sam's Ownership Brand.

It seems rather an odd idea to fasten metal tags to marine fishes and then let them loose in the ocean with the idea of identifying them as individuals in case they happen to be caught at a future time; but this is what the United States fish commission is doing just now with cod, 1,500 of which have been duly tagged and released this year.

No two tags are alike, the markings on them being stamped in a series of letters and numbers, a record of which is kept in a book in such a manner that if a tagged codfish turns up, a moment's reference to the memoranda will furnish the history of that particular specimen, with date of liberation, weight, and so forth. For example, a cod wearing a tag with the raised inscription "S 100" has a complete identification card, so that she cannot be mixed up with any other fish entered in the commission's ledger.

Only "brood fish"—that is, spawning females—are tagged. They are brought from fishermen, stripped of their eggs at Wood's Holl, Mass., and liberated in the waters of Vineyard sound, after having the tags attached to them. The tag is a small piece of copper, securely fastened by a wire placed through a fin near its juncture with the body. It does not matter which fin is chosen, though a back or tail fin is best. The tag is very light, and its attachment in the manner described does no harm whatever to the fish.

Alaskan Copper.

The attention of practical mining men has for several years been devoted to the deposits of copper in Alaska, but questions of transportation have in many cases prevented the ore from being extensively mined. One of the most recent reports from this region states that the copper mines in the Copper river district will exceed in output any that are known in the world. In the vicinity of Chitina there are veins of copper bearing 85 per cent. of ore, and in one instance a vein was located which was about five miles in extent and 160 feet in depth. If such a vein were worked to a depth of 100 feet, at the present price of copper, it would yield about \$780,000,000. Other deposits varying from 68 to 13 per cent. have been located.—N. Y. Post.
