NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW
DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Russians Seize Sealing Schooners.—Mrs. Taylor Goes Over Niagara Falls in a Barrel.—Important Decision by Illinois Supreme Court.

The Duchess of Manchester (who was Miss Helen Zimmerman of Cincinnati) was accouched of a daughter. Both the mother and child are doing well. The infant will receive the names Mary Alva Montagu.

Minneapolis is the first city in the United States to have its mails delivered by automobile. The vehicles used were also built in that city.

Ex-Secretary of State Caleb Powers was again convicted at Georgetown, Ky., as accessory before the fact to the murder of Governor William E. Goebel in January, 1900, and the second time sentenced to imprisonment for life.

The London Daily Chronicle learns that a syndicate of tradesmen and others who will lose heavily in the event of the coronation not occurring, have effected insurance on the life of King Edward for a very large sum at Lloyd's at the high rate of 10 guineas per cent.

The supreme court at Lansing, Mich., handed down a decision affirming a judgment for \$100 secured by Anna Lee, a licensed bicycle rider, against the city of Port Huron, for injuries in a fall caused by the defective condition of the walks. The court was of opinion that "to ride a bicycle upon the sidewalk may not be a nuisance, where to drive a horse and wagon upon it would," and held that the municipality must keep the sidewalks in reasonable repair for all ordinary use.

According to the London correspondent of the New York Tribune, the South African Gold Storage company has been making immense profits out of the supplying of meat to the British soldiers. The amount now available for distribution, as the result of a year's trading, is about \$5,500,000. The preponderating interest in the company is, curiously enough, Dutch and Boer.

Mrs. Anna Edson Taylor, to celebrate her 43d birthday, navigated, in a barrel, the Canadian rapids at Niagara and plunged over the Horseshoe falls, a drop of 155 feet. The barrel, which was padded with cushions and equipped with a harness of straps, was started over the falls at 4 o'clock, and 40 minutes later was taken from the water half a mile below. It was necessary to saw a portion of the barrel away to get Mrs. Taylor out. She has a cut three inches long behind the right ear, and she suffered severely from the shock, but the doctors say she will recover. Mrs. Taylor came to Niagara Falls from Bay City, where she had been engaged in teaching school.

Mrs. Nellie Hardifer, wife of Philip C. Hardifer, a contractor, of Denver, is dead from morphine poisoning, and William T. Flanders, a Lyons (Colo.) hotel owner, is in a hospital and may die from the same cause. "We fixed it up to die together, for we loved each other and could not live apart," said Flanders, who is a married man, after the woman was found dead in his room at the Midland hotel at Denver. Should

Flanders recover he will be charged with murder.

Advices from the Orient state that three more schooners, Japanese sealers, have been seized by the Russian cruiser Yakut for sealing within the limit around the Copper and other Russian seal islands. This makes six schooners and a boat's crew, or about 71 men, most of them Japanese, but some of them Americans and Canadians. The schooners were taken to Petropavlovsk, where they were condemned, and the men to Vladivostok, where some were sentenced to a year in jail and others were waiting trial.

The Illinois supreme court awarded a writ of mandamus against the state board of equalization to compel it to assess the capital stock, including franchises, of 23 Chicago corporations, the fair cash value of whose capital stock, including franchises, over and above their tangible property, is alleged to be \$388,000,000, all of which had escaped taxation previously, and was likely to be omitted again by the state board, which adjourned last December without assessing this vast amount of property.

Dr. Schuit, health commissioner of Milwaukee, has recommended that consumptives, or those suspected of having that disease, do not indulge in kissing, for the reason that germs are likely to gather around the mouth and thus aid in the spread of consumption. The doctor also advises consumptives to expectorate only on pieces of paper or bits of cloth carried for that purpose (which must be burned immediately), or in a pasteboard box, the bottom of which is to be covered with carbolic acid.

A Chicago jury rendered a verdict of \$3,000 damages for Albert C. Whitney, a bookkeeper employed by the American Steel and Wire company, from Sigmond A. Schmidt, a wholesale dry goods dealer of New York. Whitney alleged alienation of his wife's affections by Schmidt. The latter made no defense.

Admiral George Dewey resigned the presidency of the Metropolitan club, one of the most exclusive organizations of the city of Washington, because of the savage criticism made by members of the club of the rulings of the court of inquiry in the Schley case. The criticism was not leveled at Admiral Dewey alone, but at Rear Admirals Benham and Ramsay as well, some of the members charging that the rulings of the court were too favorable to Schley. Whereupon Dewey, feeling that he should act not only on his own behalf, but also on behalf of his distinguished colleagues, Benham and Ramsay, resigned.

Two masked robbers held up the north-bound California train near Eugene, Or., but were foiled in their attempt to rifle the safe of Wells, Fargo & Co. by the pluck and determination of the express messenger, C. F. Charles. The messenger was ordered by the robbers to open the door of the car, but he refused. Two charges of dynamite blew open the door, and a third charge was placed inside the car and the fuse lighted by Engineer Lucas, at the order of the robbers. Charles, however, detached the fuse before it could do any damage. A fourth charge of dynamite blew a hole in the floor of the express car, but the robbers were scared away when the messenger fired a shot from his shotgun. The robbers gained entrance to the baggage car and secured the contents of four registered mail pouches.

Extensive importations of cattle from drought-stricken districts of Kansas are to be made by farmers in Whitman county, Wash. Wheat and corn are cheap in eastern Washington, and as cattle can be bought low, farmers see an opportunity of making large profits. Anna Caton and Myrtle Love, who live at a farmhouse a few miles east of Grant's Pass, Or., were engaged in washing clothes in an adjacent creek, when they were attracted by the gluring eyeballs of a panther, which was crouched in the brush 12 feet from the young women and making ready for a spring. With great presence of mind Miss Caton flung an armful of wet clothes in the face of the brute. This attack by Miss Caton with a battery of wet clothes so disconcerted the panther that he skulked off into the brush, while the women ran screaming toward the house.

CRIMES AND ACCIDENTS.

As the result of a wreck on the Bar-lington road near Exline, La., four have died and two others are not expected to live.

A cry of fire at the Temple theater Louisville, created a panic, and in the rush to escape many were knocked down, and about a score were badly hurt, two or three so seriously that it is feared they will not survive their injuries. A little flash of flame from a polypease caused the panic.

Half a million dollars' worth of buildings and slaughtered cattle were destroyed by fire which broke out in the plant of the G. H. Hammond Packing company at Hammond, Ind. More than 2,000 persons were employed in the departments destroyed. The plant will be rebuilt at once.

Twenty-one persons were killed and many injured in a fire that started in the eight-story building occupied by Hunt, Wilkinson & Co., upholsterers and furniture dealers, Market street, Philadelphia. More than half of the firm's employees were on the upper five floors, and it was among these that the greatest number were killed and injured. The property loss is estimated at about \$500,000.

Andrew Israelson, a homesteader near Beechwood, a small settlement eight miles west of Iron river, Mich., became insane, and seizing his gun, sent a bullet through his wife's head, killing her instantly. The wife's father was shot through the body and is believed to be fatally wounded. The maniac next shot his sister-in-law through the heart, then set fire to the house, in which, lying in bed, was the aged mother of his wife, who, however, was rescued from the flames by some passers-by. Israelson then put the gun to his head and blew out his brains.

Engene Wall was shot to death by unknown persons seven miles from San Augustine, Tex. Wall is the sixth man to die in the Wall-Brooks feud, and his faction has contributed five victims, two of them sheriffs of the county. Rangers have been ordered to stop any further trouble. Wall was shot from ambush, and fell within a few yards of where his brother was assassinated recently.

Yale Honors President Roosevelt.

During the celebration of the bi-centennial of Yale university the degree of LL.D. was conferred upon President Roosevelt. In the presence of many distinguished people who had come to New Haven to attend the celebration, President Hadley, addressing President Roosevelt, spoke as follows:

"Theodore Roosevelt, while you were yet a private citizen, we offered you most worthily the degree of LL.D. Since in his providence it has pleased God to give Theodore Roosevelt another title, we give him on that account a double portion of welcome. He is a Harvard man by nurture, but we are proud to think that in his democratic spirit, his broad national sympathies, and above all his clearness and purity and truth, he will be glad to be an adopted son of Yale."

President Roosevelt, in reply, said: "President Hadley: I have never yet worked at a task worth doing that I did not find myself working shoulder to shoulder with some son of Yale. I have never yet been in a struggle for righteousness and decency that there were not men of Yale to aid me and give me strength and courage. As we walked hither this morning we passed by a gateway which was raised to the memory of a young Yale lad who was hurt to death beside me, as he and a great many others like us march against the gunnery of the heights, with those memories quick in my mind. I thank you from my heart for this honor you have done me, and I thank you doubly, for you planned to do that honor while I was yet a private citizen."

At a reception afterward, at which President Roosevelt was present, it was noticeable that there was no handshaking.
