The report of the Pan-American Ex position company at Buffalo shows the total liabilities of the company to be \$3,326,114 net, assuming that the assert of \$146,454 are collectible at face. The total cost to the company was \$8,860,767.

Henry Laffamme, a barber, of Cambridge, Mass., was fined \$20 for drawing the color line and refusing to shave Thomas S. Bruce, a negro divinity stu-dent of Harvard university. Judge Almy said the case was clearly one of discrimination. The barber had the right to reject objectionable customers but not for reasons of race or color.

Yidil Yidilson, a Jewish rabbi, says a Denver dispatch, was attacked by six men and 13 women in his synagogue at Colfax and had his robes torn from his body and his face badly bruised. At the national convention of the Knights of Labor at Indianapolis, General Master Workman Simon Burns attacked the American Federation of Labor, and said that the steel companies in the recent strike were victorious because of treachery and the failure of organized labor to do its duty. The Amalgamated association expected at least the friendship of the American Federation of Labor, said Mr. Burns, but they received nothing but deception and opposition.

In a test at Sandy Hook, the ordinary army 12-inch riffs, with an armor-piercing shelt filled with a small charge of high explosive, drove a hole 13 menes in diameter through a hardened steel plate 111/2 inches thick, and immediately thereafter, before the shell had emerged from the steel cofferdam behind the plate, it exploded, making a hole in the interior steel construction through which a man could run an automobile. While on the witness stand he said that the snugglers' gang of which he was a member had headquarters at Victoria, B. C., and that a Chinese was in charge

The charred bones of John A Mont-gomery and Hugh Montgomery, deputy United States marshals, were found in the ashes of the house occupied by Wiliiam Matthis, an alleged counterfeiter and moonshiner, who lived near Oxford, Miss. The deputy marshals had gone to arrest Matthis and it is supposed they were shot and the house fired to conceal the crime. A posse went in pursuit of Matthis.

Shipping has suffered severely by the storm on the Newfoundland coast. The Norwegian steamer Ella, under charter for the Black Diamond line, was lost in the vicinity of Belle Isle with all hands. The barkentine Titania, from Liverpool to St. Johns, was wrecked near Cape Bace. The captain and crew, lashed to the rigging, were on the wreck for 36 They were ultimately rescued, except one man, who lost his life in try-ing to reach the shore.

The federal grand jury at St. Louis-returned indictments against Harry Harry Longbaugh, alias "John Arnold," the mysterious Montana robber suspect, and his companion, Laura Bullion. They were indicted on 17 separate counts each. Two of the train crew that were on the Great Northern train that was held last July near Wagner, Mont., identified Longbaugh as the man who took the lead in intimidating the train crew and blowing open the express company's safe, from which nearly \$100,000 in unsigned bills of the Na-tional bank of Helena were stolen.

Nelson Shaw, a negro, says a Columbia (S. C) dispatch, was arrested for flogging to death Nathaniel Williams. an 11-year-old boy of Sumter. The body of the child was found tied in the house of Shaw, and a coroner's jury found that a narrow, heavy strap o leather had cut into the flesh like a du knife more than 300 times, and it wa estimated that in all 1,000 strokes wer given. No reason is assigned for the crime. It is said to be a case of wanton cruelty.

In a cave-in that occurred at Oronogi near Joplin, Mo., the entire plant of the Aurora Mining company, one of the swallowed up. No lives were lost. plant comprised a 100-ton mill, officbuilding and engine-house, all of which were engulfed, together with six grave cars and an immense tailing pile.
