Robert Thorn, alias Lieholm, posing as a son of the lord provost of Glasgow, Scotland, was arrested at Portland, Or., charged with passing forged checks.

Sheriff Wm. Frazier, of Portland, has recently purchased 250 head of horses for service in the artillery branch of the United States army.

E. F. Lowenthal of New York City, a dealer in precious stones, had diamonds valued at \$10,000 and \$200 in money taken from his room in the Portland hotel at Portland, Or.

Secretary Hitchcock, of the Interior department, has announced the formation of a bureau of forestry, which will assume charge of forest reserves.

The American Wool and Cotton Reporter, No. 7, said Oregon wools had been in active demand on the Boston market the previous week and sold freely at 14 and 16 cents.

A year ago a unique incident occurred in a certain coast town where the prevailing type of smallpox had taken root somewhat. A man was in a barber's chair. One side of his face had been neatly shaved, and a pause had followed general conversation.

NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Admiral Schley's Entire Savings Spent. Sir Wilfrid Laurier Declares For Protection - Jewish Rabbi Assaulted In the Synagogue - Destructive Explosive.

Strikers and guards got into a fight at the mines of the Providence Coal company, 17 miles from Madisonville, Ky., and one man was killed and several injured.

The report of the Pan-American Exposition company at Buffalo shows the total liabilities of the company to be \$3,326,114 net, assuming that the assets of \$146,454 are collectible at face.

The court of inquiry, says the New York Times, has cost Admiral Schley \$30,000, his entire savings of 45 years. "I cannot say I wish I had it back."

Henry Laflamme, a barber, of Cambridge, Mass., was fined \$30 for drawing the color line and refusing to shave Thomas S. Bruce, a negro divinity student of Harvard university.

Yiddi Yidilson, a Jewish rabbi, says a Denver dispatch, was attacked by six men and 12 women in his synagogue at Colfax and had his robes torn from his body and his face badly bruised.

At a Montreal banquet tendered to the Manufacturers' association of Canada, Sir Wilfrid Laurier was unequivocal in his declaration for the continuance of the present tariff, which is highly protective.

Grace Snell-Coffin-Coffin-Walker-Coffin, four times married and now as many times divorced, is again her own mistress. She was married only about two weeks when she was released from her last bond at Racine, Wis.

The mayor of Ottawa, Ont., has been unseated, because while entertaining some gentlemen at the Russell House he purchased liquor in violation of a clause in the Ontario liquor license act.

In a test at Sandy Hook, the ordinary army 12-inch rifle, with an armor-piercing shell filled with a small charge of high explosive, drove a hole 13 inches in diameter through a hardened steel plate 1 1/2 inches thick.

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"Prince Ranji of Baluchistan," the mysterious potentate from India who aroused the curiosity of London by his lavish luxury and haughty reserve, and who was an object of great interest in Montreal, turns out upon his arrival in New York to be only a cook, the curry cook in Sherry's famous restaurant.

Justice O'Gorman, in the supreme court at New York, of his own motion set aside a verdict for \$300 in favor of Julius Wiltson, who sued the Metropolitan Street Railway company for \$15,000 for the death of his 5-year-old son Lawrence on the ground that such a verdict was utterly inadequate.

GRIMES AND ACCIDENTS.

By his own testimony, Harry Ferguson Sastro, who was convicted at Seattle of robbery, has smuggled into the United States from Victoria during the last five years \$70,000 worth of opium.

The charred bones of John A. Montgomery and Hugh Montgomery, deputy United States marshals, were found in the ashes of the house occupied by William Matthis, an alleged counterfeiter and moonshiner, who lived near Oxford, Miss.

Shipping has suffered severely by the storm on the Newfoundland coast. The Norwegian steamer Ella, under charter for the Black Diamond line, was lost in the vicinity of Belle Isle with all hands.

The federal grand jury at St. Louis returned indictments against Harry Longbaugh, alias "John Arnold," the mysterious Montana robber suspect, and his companion, Laura Ballou.

Nelson Shaw, a negro, says a Columbia (S. O.) dispatch, was arrested for flogging to death Nathaniel Williams, an 11-year-old boy of Sumter. The body of the child was found tied in the house of Shaw, and a coroner's jury found that a narrow, heavy strap of leather had cut into the flesh like a duck-knife more than 300 times.

In a cave-in that occurred at Onong near Joplin, Mo., the entire plant of the Aurora Mining company, one of the greatest producers in the district, was swallowed up. No lives were lost. The plant comprised a 100-ton mill, office building and engine-house, all of which were engulfed, together with six grave cars and an immense tailing pile.
