A LITTLE OF EVERYTHING

Lompoc, in Santa Barbara county,
California, grows mustard for the
whole nation. In that region two
thousand acres are cultivated for
the seed, the industry employing
about two hundred farmers.

In the thirty odd thousand dead
letters forwarded to Washington
from New York were 20,000 "argu-
ments to voters" sent out by the
campaign managers of the late elec-
tion, but improperly addressed or
delivered to men who had died.

Senator Hanna receives a larger
mail than any of his colleagues. It
fills a bushel basket three times a
day. He keeps a force of clerks
constantly at work answering the
letters, comparatively few of which
he sees himself.

The trouble between Argentina
and Chile seems almost certain to
bring on war. The Argentine rep-
ublic is red hot for fighting and
Chile seems to be in the same
mood. The dispute originates in
the establishment of the boundary
line between the two republics.

The navy department has taken
up the question of adopting wireless
telegraphy as a means of signaling
between vessels at sea. Admiral
Radford of the bureau of equipment,
has asked that cruisers of the Penn-
sylvania class have their masts and
rigging fitted so that the wireless
system can be used.

Today smokers are numbered by
millions, a fact to which the treas-
uries of most nations have to be de-
voutly thankful. It is estimated
that 1,000,000,000 acres of land are
devoted to the cultivation of tobacco.
The world consumes each year
6,800,000,000 pounds, or 2,812,500
tons, worth £52,000,000.

President Roosevelt is twenty-
eight years older than the King of
Spain, twenty-two years older than
the Queen of Netherlands, ten years
older than the Czar of Russia, and
one year older than the Emperor of
Germany. He is many years
younger than the other crowned
heads and the youngest of all presi-
dents.

Figures have been prepared by
the Railroad Age showing that rail-
way building in the United States
during 1901 has been greater than
it has been for 11 years previous,
the total approximating 2508 miles
of line. In 1890 the total was 5070
and in 1900 was 4437 miles. The
construction of the year added to
the total mileage of the country
gives approximately 199,370 miles.

The employees of Armour & Com-
pany, at Chicago, have been noti-
fied that they would have an in-
crease in their wages the first of the
year. This company employs about
10,000 men in Chicago, besides from
20,000 to 30,000 at other places.
The secretary of the company says
it has been the rule of the company
to make an increase in wages when
times would admit of it.

Gifts to education in the United
States in 1899 amounted to \$53,000,
000, and it was classed as the ban-
ner year. Last year the total gifts
for educational purposes reached a
sum exceeding \$35,000,000. This
year's contributions are estimated
\$75,000,000. In the latter figure
Carnegie's offer of \$10,000,000 for a
national university is included, al-
though the conditions on which it
was tendered have been disapproved.
But excluding that offer 1901 is
\$10,000,000 ahead of 1899.

A mule trust has been formed at
New Orleans, growing out of the
enormous English demand for the
American mule, and it is said Eng-
lish buyers will not buy another
mule in the United States and the

business will probably go to South
America. The trusts have prob-
ably killed a business that has left
\$40,000,000 in the United States
and has taken from the raisers a
grade of stock that they could not
sell, and for which they have re-
ceived good prices.

The longest run made by any
trainmen on the continent is that
made by the Pullman car conduc-
tors on the C. P. R. R., who remain
with their cars the whole six days
from Portland, Maine, to Vancouver.

Pennsylvania railroad officials
announce that progress is being
made in the way of completing the
final plans for the North River tun-
nel. The latest estimates are that
the railroad tunnel and approaches
will cost \$40,000,000.

Chicago today is a city of nearly
2,000,000 inhabitants. Do you know
what these figures mean? They
mean that within the borders of the
municipality are more people than
live in either the state of Georgia,
or Minnesota, or New Jersey, or
Virginia, or Wisconsin. They mean
that there are gathered together
more people than occupy Alaska,
Arizona, Colorado, Delaware, Idaho,
Maine and Oregon combined.
Greater New York is about twice
the size of Chicago.

Bites Nails in Two.

Over at Newport there is a boy
who bites in two, brass pins, wire
nails and other bits of iron, with
apparent ease, says the Corvallis
Times. He does these things when-
ever requested for the entertain-
ment of those about him, and snaps
off a piece of ten penny nail as
readily as a school girl bites off a
chew from a stick of gum.

The boy is Cleveland Baker. He
is seventeen years of age and re-
sides at Newport. The only physi-
cal development to indicate his ca-
pacity for chewing nails and other
bits of iron is a massive set of jaws.
These are square and deep set. His
teeth as far as a layman can de-
termine are not unlike the teeth of
other persons.

A truthful man, who saw the boy
at his work, described it yesterday.
A pin, he said, was handed to Baker
and he placed it between his teeth
and without hesitation or apparent
effort closed his heavy jaws together.
As the teeth closed together there
was a muffled snap that told how
thoroughly the work had been done.
When the mouth was opened the
pin was in two parts, having been
cut as perfectly as though done by
a powerful machine, made for the
purpose. In the same way nails of
different sizes were readily bitten
in two, much to the amazement of
the gaping crowd that stood around.

Americanizing Cuba.

In one extremely important par-
ticular, Cuba is being American-
ized with great rapidity. W. C.
Gorgas, major and surgeon of the
United States army, and chief sani-
tary officer of Havana, in his re-
port issued on December 5, 1901,
shows that the sanitary condition
of that city shows an improvement
in each month over the correspond-
ing month of 1900, and that year

scored an advance on all preceding
years. In November, 1898, just at
the close of the war with Spain, and
before the United States' occupation
of the city began, there were 2054
deaths in Havana, while there were
only 444 in that month in 1900,
which was the lowest mark ever
reached in that month since the
population of Havana has been up
to any high figure. In November,
1901, the number of deaths was 443.

Havana, which was formerly one
of the unhealthiest cities on the face
of the globe, has now become one
of the healthiest. The death rate
in 1891 was 106 per thousand. The
Americans reduced it to 21 per
thousand in 1900. In 1901 it has
been cut to 19.58 per thousand. In
1896 there were 1115 deaths in that
city from yellow fever. There were
only 79 in 1898. There have been
only 5 in 1901. In November,
1901, for the first time since 1762,
there has not been a single case of
yellow fever in Havana. In No-
vember, 1900, there were 214 cases
and 54 deaths. There has not been
a case this year since September 28,
October and November are the
months when yellow fever is most
prevalent in Havana. Until 1901
there has never during a hundred
years been a day during those
months in which there were not
many cases of yellow jack in that
city.

Here is a field in which Cuba al-
ready has been Americanized,
whether the island sets up an inde-
pendent government for itself or
not. The scourge by which Cuba's
population every year has been
thinned to the extent of many thou-
sands has been diminished so rad-
ically that it has lost much of its
errors. In the island's chief city it
has almost been abolished. Cuba
owes a debt of everlasting gratitude
to the Americans for driving out
the malady with which it has been
afflicted ever since the early days
of white occupation. In all the
centuries which have passed since
the Spaniards first settled on the
island there were never so few
deaths in proportion to the white
population as have taken place in
1901. It is no longer necessary
for the United States and the world
to raise quarantines against Ha-
vana and the rest of the great cities
of Cuba. Those towns are as free
from malignant diseases as are
New York, Philadelphia, St. Louis,
London, Berlin and the other great
centers of the most modern of the
nations. For Cuba's and the
world's good the obligation to keep
up the American system of sani-
tation is one of the provisions of the
Platt amendment which will be
binding on the Cuban republic.
