Our community was shocked last Tuesday at the announcement of the death of one of our most highly respected citizens, Jacob Welch,

He was sixty-five years, one month and seventeen days of age and was a member of the Lutheran Church, having joined in 1854. Funeral services were conducted at the home by Rev. J. P. Moomaw and at the grave by A. C. Howlett. The remains were followed to their last resting place in the Central Point cemetery by a large number of friends and neighbors. Deceased leaves a wife and thirteen children to mourn his loss, but they sorrow not as those who have no hope for he was one of our best citizens and lived a consistent Christian life. The family wish to tender their sincere thanks to the many friends for their acts of kindness in this their hour of sad bereavement.

Professor Jacques Loeb, at the annual meeting of the American Physiological society at Chicago, read a paper entitled "On the Prolongation of Life of Unfertilized Eggs of the Sea Urchin by Potassium Cyanide." Death, Professor Loeb affirmed, is not a negative process, but an active agent born with the birth of the egg, and destined, if not checked, to gain the upper hand of the life instinct and bring about extinction. He announced that he had been able to check this death agent, in the eggs of the sea urchin at least, by means of chemical agents. This, it is said, means nothing less than on a minute scale the secret of eternal life in the power of mankind.

BOER WAR

Great Increase in British Public Debt Has Been Caused.

Enormous Outlay Made Necessary by Continuation of Hostilities in South Africa and No End in Sight.

In the speech of Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, chancellor of the exchequer, in the house of commons on the occasion of the introduction of the new budget there was not very much that bore directly on the cost of the war in South Africa. The tale was told, however, in one clause of one sentence.

The expenditures for the year, he said had been £183,500,000, "of which £65,000,000 was on account of the war in South Africa." At the same time he proposed a loan of £60,000,000, made necessary by the war.

This loan, which is now being subscribed, is in addition to the war loan of £30,000,000 issued in 1900. That loan represented less than half of the increase of the British public debt last year due to the conquest of the Boer republics. Its total was very near the £74,000,000 mark, says the New York Sun.

Since the latter part of the seventeenth century Great Britain has never been out of debt. The debt began with a trifling \$3,000,000, the result of the revolution which brought the Dutch King William to the English throne. From that time it grew and nearly always on account of war.

At the accession of Queen Anne in 1702 the debt was £10,400,000, and when the first George became king 12 years later the debt had been nearly quadrupled. He paid off a paltry couple of millions, but George II. saw it grow to nearly £140,000,000.

By the beginning of the American war it had been reduced some £10,000,000, but that war sent it climbing to what at that time was the terrifying figure of £250,000,000. For a few years there were successful efforts at reduction, and a total decrease of another £10,000,000 was recorded for the decade.

Then began the disastrously expensive French war, which with a slight intermission called peace continued until the downfall of Napoleon in 1815. During those 23 years the debt grew tremendously, the loans averaging about £20,000,000 a year. In 1816 the British debt had climbed to the colossal figure of £900,436,000. The debt of no other country, except France, has reached such proportions.

After the peace of Paris the British debt took a new course and began to decrease. This course was followed steadily with but two slight interruptions until the outbreak of the war with the Boers. In 1833 the abolition of slavery caused a slight increase, and the Crimean war added about £30,000,000, so that in 1857 the debt stood at about £839,000,000. In the 43 years that followed, up to the outbreak of the present war, the debt was reduced on the average £5,000,000 a year. In 1899, when the war began, it had decreased to £635,000,000.

The war expenses had taken it back well over £700,000,000, or more than three times the net debt of the United States, and there is as yet no sign that the war expenses are about to cease or even to show any material diminution. Great Britain is now spending approximately a million dollars a day on the war with an army in the field of only 250,000 men.

In the civil war, when the federal armies numbered nearly a million, the expense was only approximately double what Great Britain is now spending for one-fourth of that strength.

Another Viking Ship Found. Another Viking ship, or rather boat, has been unearthed near Kiel, but this new discovery cannot compare in dimensions with the finest specimen of its kind, which may be seen by tourists at the museum in Christiania. In fact, this clinker built Viking vessel, which is about the size of one of our modern fishing boats, is perhaps the most interesting thing to be seen in all Norway. Those who see it will realize for the first time why "star-board," or "steer-board," is applied to the right side of a vessel, as the helm protruded from this side, and not from the stern, which is practically the same as the bow. There is a popular impression that "Viking" is etymologically synonymous with "Sea-King"—but this is erroneous. The word is not "Viking," but "Vik-ing," or "bay-man"—"Vik" meaning "sea inlet," or "bay." Its counterpart is found in such English place names as Warwick, Wick in the Orkneys, and elsewhere.—London Chronicle.

Hebrides Island for Sale. It is announced that the duke of Argyll intends to sell Tiree, the most fertile island of the Argyllshire Hebrides. It is some 12 miles long and four miles broad. By reason of its flatness, Tiree is prettily described in an ancient Celtic legend as "the kingdom whose summits are lower than the waves." Around the coast there are some 40 ruined watch towers of unknown history and several "standing stones." The duke's factor's house was erected in the middle of the eighteenth century on the site of the venerable ruin of a turreted castle.—London Chronicle.

Wine for Horses. The plan of using wine as a portion of the regular rations of farm horses is being seriously discussed in France. The experiment of feeding the animals on a mixture of bran and wine, carried out by one farm, was brought into notice at the last meeting of the Heralut Agricultural society, and a commission was appointed to inquire into the subject.—London News.

SPIDERS WITHOUT EYES.

Yet They Hunt Their Prey with Accuracy in the Subterranean Depths.

A miner may be superstitious, but he is as plucky as man as braves. One creature, however, most of them shy at the sight of. This is the great, bloated, white spider, which rustles along the walls of the shaft and disappears in some cleft in the rock. Naturalists for a long time would not believe that these spiders were really cave dwellers. They declared that they were merely ordinary spiders that had fallen or crept into the mines. But at last one was brought to a famous naturalist, and found by him to be absolutely without eyes. This proved beyond doubt that for centuries the creatures' ancestors had lived beyond the reach of sunlight.

A spider, even if he does live in the depths of the earth, must eat, and more recently his prey has been discovered. It is a sort of small beetle. Another scorpion-like insect, called the blotrus, also takes his blind way over the rocks and stalks by sound and touch the same prey. It is a wonderful thing to watch one of these creatures hunting a beetle, and almost impossible to realize its absolute blindness when one sees how perfectly it moves and responds with those of the most perfect sight.
