## Klamath County Items.

From the Klamath Falls Republican.  
It is reported that Bob Oglesby  
who was convicted of robbing the  
Lakeview-Paisley stage, was re-  
leased from the penitentiary on the  
1st inst.

R. W. Marple returned from the  
railroad last week and reports that  
work is progressing on the new line  
into this county, several miles hav-  
ing been graded and great quan-  
tities of material having been  
hailed in ready for use. The force  
of men employed has been increased  
and will of course receive future  
additions as they are needed.

Stockholders of the Little Klamath  
Ditch Co met in the Klamath  
County Bank Monday and attended  
to its annual business. Alex Martin  
sr., J. F. Adams and S. C. Trayner  
were re-elected members of the  
board of directors. Alex Martin, jr.,  
continuing as secretary. The com-  
pany's affairs were found to be in a  
very prosperous and satisfactory  
condition. The Little Klamath ir-  
rigating ditch is one of the largest  
in the county, carrying a volume of  
about 6000 inches of water.

## FOREIGN ITEMS.

The speech from the throne, read by  
the imperial chancellor, Count von  
Buelow, at the opening of the Prussian  
diet, took a gloomy view of the econ-  
omic situation. It pointed out that the  
income from the state railroads in 1901  
was considerably short of the estimates,  
and that the whole results of the finan-  
cial year were disappointing.

The Shanghai correspondent of the  
London Standard cables that 7,000 of  
the bodyguard of the dowager empress  
of China, who joined in the attack on  
the foreign legations at Peking under  
Prince Tuan, returned to Peking with  
the Chinese court.

The call by the British war office for  
volunteers to relieve the regiments at  
the front has so far met with no re-  
sponse. Volunteers answering the call  
would receive only a shilling a day,  
while the yeomanry, in which many  
volunteers have already enlisted, re-  
ceive five shillings a day. The only  
solution for the deadlock, says a London  
dispatch, appears to be for the war  
office to introduce conscription or with-  
draw the new regulations.

The bitter feeling that existed be-  
tween Great Britain and Germany has  
been intensified by a rebuke given to  
Colonial Secretary Chamberlain by  
Count von Buelow in the German reich-  
stag. In a recent speech Chamberlain  
said: "As I read history no British  
minister has ever served his country  
faithfully and at the same time been  
popular abroad. I therefore make al-  
lowance for foreign criticism. I do not  
want to give lessons to a foreign minis-  
ter, and I will not accept any at his  
hands. I am responsible only to my  
sovereign and my countrymen."

**Quick Transportation of Mails.**  
Edward A. Kelly, a Norfolk (Va.)  
electrician, has applied for a patent  
upon a car to be operated by electricity,  
which he believes will carry mails over-  
land at a rate of 400 miles an hour.  
The working model shown appears to  
warrant this belief. The car is shaped  
like a ship, with wheels as high as  
itself. It is built on the theory that a  
magnet always goes to the largest end  
of a piece of steel. Between the rails  
Kelly has arranged a series of iron  
plates, small at one end and large at  
the other, the narrow ends all pointing  
one way. The magnetized car used as  
a model follows these plates at high  
speed. As it reaches the end of each  
plate the current is automatically cut  
off and the car jumps to the next plate.  
A half-mile circular track and a large  
car will be built for the inventor's next  
experiment.

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FIFTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

Tuesday.

In the senate Morgan of Alabama of-  
fered and secured the adoption of a  
resolution which indicated his purpose  
to have the committee on interoceano  
canals inquire into the relations alleged  
to exist between the transcontinental  
railroads of the United States and Can-  
ada and the Panama canal company.  
He said it was a wicked monopoly, and  
has cost the people of the Pacific coast  
millions of dollars.

The debate on the Nicaragua canal  
bill was opened in the house by Hop-  
burn. He replied to many questions  
concerning the recent offer of the Pa-  
nama Canal company to sell its prop-  
erty and franchises to the United States  
for \$40,000,000. Morris of Minnesota  
gave notice of an amendment favoring  
the purchase of the Panama Canal com-  
pany's property.

Wednesday.

The debate in the house on the Nicar-  
agua canal bill developed sentiment for  
giving consideration to the recent offer  
of the Panama company to sell its fran-  
chise and property for \$40,000,000. Of  
16 members who spoke nine favored the  
Morris amendment.

Thursday.

The senate committee on commerce  
authorized a favorable report on Sen-  
ator Nelson's bill for the creation of  
an executive department of the govern-  
ment, to be known as the department of  
commerce. There is also established a  
bureau of manufactures and a bureau of  
mines and mining. The senate in ex-  
ecutive session confirmed the nomina-  
tion of L. M. Shaw to be secretary of  
the treasury and of H. C. Payne to be  
postmaster-general. W. S. Graham as  
surveyor-general of California was also  
confirmed.

The Hepburn Nicaraguan canal bill  
passed the house by practically a unani-  
mous vote. Only two members out of  
310 voted against it. Fletcher (R.) of  
Minnesota and Lassiter (D.) of Vir-  
ginia were the only two casting nega-  
tive votes.

Friday.

The house spent the day considering  
the Hopkins bill to create a permanent  
census bureau. After some discussion  
the bill was recommitted with instruc-  
tions to report back a bill containing a  
plan for a detailed organization of a  
permanent census bureau, to include  
also a provision to place the present  
employees under the civil service. The  
house then adjourned until Monday.

## WASHINGTON NOTES.

The population of the United States,  
including all outlying possessions, was  
84,233,069 in the census year 1900.  
The nation has thus grown nearly sixteen-  
fold in 100 years. China, the British  
empire and the Russian empire are now  
the only countries that have a greater  
population than the United States.

Secretary Root urges the passage of a  
bill permitting the abandonment of the  
transport service to the Philippines.  
Mr. Root told the house committee on  
military affairs that the service was  
costing the government more than by  
contract with a transportation company,  
and that the government, in keeping up  
the service, was preventing the estab-  
lishing of commercial lines and the  
consequent development of commerce.  
It is stated that the transport service  
costs \$9,000,000 a year, while the same  
service could be done by contract for  
\$6,000,000, or even less.

Dr. R. S. Anthony, charged with  
high treason in South Africa, was tried  
by a military court at Oradock and ac-  
quitted. Anthony is a native of San  
Francisco and married a Boer woman,  
who, with her children, is now in this  
country. It is understood that Secre-  
tary Hay exerted his good offices to pre-  
vent the punishment of Anthony.
