WASHINGTON NOTES.

The house committee on the election of president and vice-president has made a favorable report on the bill for the election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.

President Roosevelt, it is said, will appoint Colonel Samuel Parker of Honolulu governor of Hawaii, to succeed Sanford B. Dole. This arrangement will tend to settle the squabbles that have for a long time been prevalent in Hawaii.

According to the statistics issued by the census bureau, the gross value of the products of manufacture in 1900 was \$18,008,127,663, as compared with \$9,879,437,283 in 1890, an increase of 83.78 per cent.

The annual report of the interstate commerce commission transmitted to congress says that hundreds of thousands of dollars are paid in unlawful rebates to a few great packing houses, and that the business of railroad transportation is conducted in open disregard of the law. The leading traffic officials of many of the principal railway lines are charged with deliberately violating the statute law of the land, and in some cases agree with each other to do so.

Lord Cranborne, under secretary for foreign affairs, in the British house of commons made an official statement concerning collective action of European states in view of the outbreak or expected outbreak of the late war between the United States and Spain. He said the British government declined to associate itself with proposals which seemed open to the objection of putting pressure on the government of the United States and offering an opinion on its action. The under secretary said he was unable to lay the papers in the case on the table. This statement was received with a burst of ringing cheers.

Joseph Ligler, whose wife and family live in San Francisco, was found dead on the winter trail near the Yukon river on Jan. 9, according to news brought to Vancouver by the steamer Amur. Ligler was on his way from White Horse to the Little Lebarg roadhouse when he perished.

The decision of the supreme court of Ohio in the case of the Nickel Plate company vs. Frank Shaffer, involving the "blacklist," sustains the railroad company. Shaffer was discharged by the railroad company for participating in a strike, and, being unable to secure employment on any other road because of the company's refusal to give him a certificate of service, he sued for damages. The judgment of the lower court in favor of Shaffer was reversed by the supreme court, which holds that the master is under no legal obligation to give to his discharged servant a statement of service, and whether or not it was satisfactory.

Work is under way on the construction of four large steamers on the Clyde for service between Vancouver, B. C., and Hongkong. The new vessels are to take the place of the Empress liners at present plying on the route, while the latter boats will go on the Canadian-Australian run. The new steamers of the Canadian Pacific when completed will surpass anything at present plying in Pacific waters. They will be 800 feet long, or over 100 feet longer than the present Empress liners, and will have accommodation for 800 saloon and 1,300 steerage passengers. The speed of the new steamers will be 21 knots an hour, as against 16 knots of the present boats.
