NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Arrival of Prince Henry in America. Loss of Life in a New York Fire. Millions For British Navy—Remarkable Electrical Invention.

Advises received at Tacoma from Dawson state that a single dealer has obtained a "corner" on the oat supply of the upper Yukon, and recently advanced oats to 9 cents a pound, or \$189 a ton. The number of horses in Dawson and vicinity is much larger than ever before, and oats form their principal food.

George D. Bliss, the millionaire cattle king, who for nearly half a century was connected with the stock-raising interests of California, died of pneumonia at his residence, 1581 Pacific avenue, San Francisco. He was born in Albany, N. Y., 74 years ago, and came to California in 1850.

Two great log booms, the property of the Humpulps Boom company, and located on the upper Humpulps above Hoquiam, Wash., were destroyed by the use of dynamite, set off with malicious intent. Not less than 15,000,000 feet were lost. Two sacks containing more than 200 sticks of dynamite that failed to explode were found in the river.

Burt Alvord and Bravo John, two noted Arizona outlaws, have been arrested in Sonora, Mexico, by the Mexican rurales, and the two prisoners will be at once extradited and brought to Tombstone for trial on the charge of train robbery.

Fire partly destroyed the Puget Sound Bridge and Dredge company's dredger San Diego, anchored in Elliott bay. When the flames burst through the deck the crew were forced to run for their lives and escape in small boats anchored alongside. The loss is estimated at from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

James Powers, working in a wood camp near Iron Mountain, deliberately cut off one of his little toes with a chisel, says a Kewick (Cal.) dispatch. He was greatly bothered by a corn, and amputated the toe to insure relief. He is now surprised to find that he must lie in bed a week or two before he will be able to walk.

A miner at Handsburg, Cal., was arrested for having broken into the posthouse and slept during the night with smallpox patients. He had been discharged from the posthouse some days previously and returned to work in the mines. He returned, however, to the place where he slept, and the next night took up quarters with a friend. He was fined and given a short sentence in jail, although there appears to be no law governing his case.

Barney Collins, a pioneer of Kern county, Cal., and for years a resident of Plute mountain, was returning to his home from Liebel's camp, but as darkness overtook him he concluded to camp. Collins, after building a camp fire, lay down beside it. His clothing ignited, and he was roasted as he slept. He was 55 years of age and leaves a widow and several children.

A dispatch to the Batte (Mont.) Miner from Havre says that the frozen body of Bear-Air-of-the-Wolf, a noted Sioux chief, with two dead horses, was found in the Bear Paw mountains, the redskin having committed suicide. He had been killed by a Crow maiden and had almost blown the top of his head off with a shotgun. The Indians throughout the Bear Paw mountains are greatly excited over the affair, medicine men claiming it is a forerunner of the return of their lands by the Great Father. The dead chief was a descendant of White Bear, after whom White Bear lake, near St. Paul, was named. His aquaw was a granddaughter of Sitting Bull.

Prince Henry of Prussia, representative of his brother, the Emperor of Germany, at the launching of the latter's American-built yacht, reached New York and was cordially welcomed as a guest of the nation. The land batteries that guard the outer harbor sounded the first greeting in a salute of 31 guns; the rifles of a special naval squadron assembled in his honor echoed the sentiment; there were oral greetings from the representatives of President Roosevelt, the army, the navy and the city of New York; and a great crowd lined the way into the city to see and cheer the sailor prince of Germany.

An Indianapolis electrician named E. E. Rhine has invented an incandescent bulb by which the degree of illumination may be varied. He has taken the ordinary 16-candle-power bulb and arranged it so it may be turned to use at eight, four or two candle power. This is done by using connections that are different from the old style and have two filaments.

Great is Surgery.

Last Sunday a Chicago paper gave the particulars, with illustrations, of one of the most remarkable surgical operations for the restoration of eyesight ever performed. The operation which was performed by Dr. Paul Walter, a specialist, was a no less undertaking than the rafting of the corns from the eye of a rabbit to the sightless eye of Wm. Strickell, of Clinton, Iowa, a wealthy mine owner.

A healthy live rabbit was found and taken into the operating room. Mr. Strickell was placed on the operating table and etherized. The poor little rabbit who was doomed to give up its sight for the benefit of man, was placed under the influence of an anesthetic and handled as carefully as possible.

Then the tough growth over Mr. Strickell's left eye was removed. The eyeball was thoroughly cleaned and then the cornea of the rabbit's eye was lifted off, and with four stitches fastened over the ball of the mine owner's left eye. The operation was performed two weeks ago and Mr. Strickell kept in a dark room until last Sunday when the bandage was removed and the patient instantly recognized his friends.

The cornea is the transparent part of the eyeball which covers the iris and pupil and admits light to the interior. It projects forward from the eyeball in the same manner a watch glass does from the face of the dial. The cornea of a rabbit is much similar to that of a man, and for that reason Dr. Walter decided in his experiment a healthy rabbit must sacrifice its sight to save that of Mr. Strickell.
