AFTER THE MERGER AGAIN.

Attorney General Stratton, of Seattle, Wash., is now in Washington, D. C., upon business regarding a proposed suit against the Northern Securities Company on behalf of the State of Washington. The bar which kept Minnesota out of the Federal Supreme court will not operate against Washington, Montana or North Dakota. The supreme court refused to take jurisdiction on the Minnesota case, because one of the parties defendant is a citizen that state. None of the corporations interested in the merger are citizens of either of the states to the west. Both Montana and Washington may bring suit, but it is stated the former will act first. The Minnesota authorities will soon begin an action in the state courts with a view to dissolving the merger.
