NEWS OF THE STATE.

The Oregon Timberman says that Oregon dogwood found in the Coast and Cascade ranges is one of the most valuable wood for turning purposes to be found on the Coast. The trees attain a size of eight to ten inches on the stump and the wood is susceptible to a high polish and when finished is as white as ivory. For the manufacture of fine furniture Oregon dogwood is bound to have a place.

CRIMES AND ACCIDENTS.

A fatal shooting occurred at Corydock, Henderson county, Ky., in which G. W. Pritchett was killed and John Below, a farmer, fatally wounded. Each shot at the other when they met on the streets. With a bullet through his heart Pritchett fired the third shot at Below, but missed. Pritchett then fell and expired. Bad blood had existed between the two men over business matters. Pritchett was a wealthy tobaccoist. The verdict of the coroner's jury exonerated Below.

Hardman, Peck & Co., piano manufacturers, suffered a loss of more than \$300,000 by the destruction by fire of their plant at West Forty-eighth street and the North river, New York. The loss was mainly because of the valuable machinery and woods burned.

Burglars entered the Commercial hotel at Marissa, Ill., where 50 persons were asleep, shortly before midnight and blew open the safe. Obtaining \$2,500 the robbers escaped, leaving the building in flames. The fire was not checked until a dozen business buildings and several residences, with their contents, were destroyed. The property loss is \$150,000.

As a result of the insane jealousy of Charles Bothe, better known as Datch Charley, of Lissai, Utah, William Tebberts and Mrs. Charles Bothe are dead, while Bothe is under arrest for the murder in the jail at Placerville, Colo., where he fled after committing the crime. Bothe had refused to support his wife and she found a home in Tebberts' cabin, where the two were shot by Bothe.

Thomas Featherstone, who escaped, Feb. 17, from the jail at Jacksonville, Or., was captured by Under Sheriff Terrill and Chief of Police Hitchings at Fortuna, a manufacturing camp on Van Dusen river. He is now in the county jail at Eureka. Featherstone is wanted by the Jacksonville authorities for robbing a store at that place.

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR.

Boer Leaders, Under a Flag of Truce, Visit Kitchener.

Acting President Schalk Burger, F. W. Reitz, ex-secretary of state for the Transvaal, and Commandants Lucas Meyer and Kreigh, with their secretaries and attendants, arrived on a special train at Pretoria. They came into Balmoral under a flag of truce and proceeded to Pretoria. Schalk Burger and his party drove immediately to Lord Kitchener's headquarters, where he had an interview with the British general. The Boers afterward proceeded to the railway station and entrained for Kroonstad, whence they went out under a safe conduct. No information has been given out as to the result of the interview between Lord Kitchener and the Boer leaders.

HEIR TO AUSTRALIAN ESTATE.

The Romantic Story of a Lincoln (Ill.) Harness Maker's Windfall.

A poor harness maker, Edmund H. Moller, who has lived at Lincoln, Ill., for 30 years, is on the eve of coming into possession of an estate in Australia said to be worth \$750,000.

Moller was one of two sons born to a Dublin silversmith and his wife. Nearly 30 years ago the father went to Australia. Subsequently the mother started in search of him, but died in New Orleans. Then an older brother of Edmund's father took up the search and found the father in Sydney, N. S. W., where he had become rich.

He communicated his discovery to Edmund, and the latter engaged in a correspondence with his father, who recognized their relationship.

The elder Moller died many years ago, and his family in Sydney refused to recognize or consider the claims of the son at Lincoln. Through the American consul at Sydney Edmund Moller gained information and proof establishing his claim to his father's estate, of which he is the heir.

EACH LAMP A SMALL SUN.

Nicola Tesla, the Electrician, Presents His Remarkable "Daylight Illumination."

Nicola Tesla has at last perfected his new system of electric lighting—daylight illumination, it may be called—and he hopes to have it soon introduced into general use. Under a full head of electricity the lamp has the color of ice in the sun. There are neither wires nor carbon filaments to break or burn out.

The lamp may be described as a nest of glass tubes, bent in rectangular form. Each lamp has about 20 feet of the white glowing tubes. Into this square coil of hollow glass the diameter of one's finger electricity is sent quivering from Tesla's oscillator.

Tesla's oscillator, which he believes is the key for solving the most important electrical problems of the day, causes electrical vibrations of incalculable speed. These vibrations turn the atoms of the gases in the tubes into, as it were, little comets, which shoot through the inclosed space with tremendous rapidity, leaving trains of light behind. This sudden starting and stopping of the current produces continuous light, neither of the incandescent nor of the arc light character, but purely solar. In other words, each lamp is a little sun.

TO DEVELOP POPULATION.

Wisconsin Legislature Plans to Offer Premiums to Mothers of Large Families.

Frank legislation has broken out again in the Wisconsin legislature in the form of two sensational bills relating to matrimony. One is a bill to encourage the development of population by the state giving a premium to the mothers of large families. Mothers of a family of six children are to receive ten dollars annually; mothers of seven \$12; mothers of eight, \$15; mothers of nine, \$20; mothers of ten, \$25; mothers of 11, \$30, and mothers of 12 or more, \$35.

The other is a bill providing a special tax of ten dollars annually upon all unmarried men over 30 years of age. The bills have not yet been introduced, but will shortly be presented to the legislature by Assemblyman Christian Sarau, of Oshkosh.

Mr. Sarau does not claim to be the author of the bills, and it is said that both of them were drafted by members of the Woman's club of Oshkosh.

GUARD THE ROYAL.

When They Are Not in Pawn the Valuables of Monarchs Are Closely Watched.

Royal people are much given to the accumulation of jewels of great price, and they take especial care that these baubles are not stolen. Many of the so-called "crown jewels" which are shown to visitors to the Tower of London are "paste," the real gems being secured in strong vaults in iron-bound boxes. The jewels of the Russian imperial family form one of the most valuable collections in the world. This collection is guarded in a fortified castle watched over by a special detail of 180 retired officers and a body of soldiers. For this service they are well paid. No officer who in his days of active service was addicted to gambling or to extravagance can ever hope to be selected as one of the custodians of the imperial jewels. The czar keeps a portion of his own private jewels in banks in London and Paris, so that in case a revolution should break out in St. Petersburg he would have an "anchor to windward" in the two foreign capitals.

The treasures of the royal family of Italy are hidden away in deep vaults beneath a fort situated on a little island in the Tiber. Protected by the old and military on the island, the jewels are beyond the dreams of even the most daring and sanguine of burglars.

The prince of Bulgaria is possessed of precious stones to the value of \$5,000,000. These he keeps locked in a little castle on the banks of the Danube. King Milan of Serbia kept such of his jewels as are not in pawn in London and Paris banks. A ruby necklace belonging to the king is said to be in pawn for \$100,000. Some of the jewels belonging to the German imperial family are kept in London banks like those of the czar.

FOREIGN ITEMS.

Five hundred returned emigrants, disappointed with life in the United States, passed through Berlin on their way to Posen.

The rebels have captured the prefectural town of Kwang-Tung, in the province of Kwang-Tung, and have seized the arsenal and granaries, says a Hong-kong dispatch. The mandarins at the garrison fled and appealed to Canton for reinforcements. The viceroy of Canton replied that it was impossible further to deplete the Canton garrison, and urged that General Ma make the utmost efforts to put down the rebellion.

Admiral Lord Charles Berosford, at a dinner in London of the Institute of Naval Architects, said that ten years ago the British mercantile marine formed 80 per cent of the shipping world, but today it accounted for only 10 per cent. Proper preparations should, he said, be made for the protection of England's mercantile marine. He appealed to the nation to see that the naval reserve was placed on a more satisfactory footing, and said he should go to different towns in the country and explain the condition of affairs, even if the authorities should expel him from the service.

A movement has been set on foot in Memphis to secure the election of Right Rev. Thomas Gaylor, Episcopal bishop of Tennessee, as the next commander-in-chief of the United Sons of Confederate Veterans. The N. B. Forest Camp of Memphis has unanimously endorsed him for the position, and a committee of influential sons of veterans in the south called on the bishop and prevailed upon him to allow the use of his name at Dallas next month under the following conditions: That his election be unanimous and that the military features of the organization be eliminated. Promises of support have come from all parts of the country.

Governor Henry T. Gaze has sold to Walter L. Vail of Los Angeles, for the sum of \$12,000, his interest in the Warner ranch, in San Diego county.

Certain hotel-keepers of Los Angeles are charged with practicing methods of extortion. The various commercial bodies of the city will investigate the charges and take action in the matter.

Fire destroyed the big feed warehouse of Chedda & Co., San Rafael, and, like the six others of recent occurrence, was of incendiary origin. The loss is estimated at \$12,000, covered by \$4,000 insurance.

Three boats, which are said to be of the lightest draft in the world, are now being constructed to overcome the inconvenience experienced every summer on the Yukon river from shallow water, says a Seattle dispatch. The Merchants' Transportation company is building two of the boats at Lake La Barge. Their length will be 100 feet, with 20 feet beam and a capacity of 60 tons. The Northern Commercial company is building the third at Portland. She will be 110 feet long by 22 feet wide. Loaded with supplies, the regular freight and crews, these boats will not require more than 30 inches of water to permit of easy navigation.

WASHINGTON NOTES.

Senor Aspiras, the Mexican ambassador to the United States, has issued a statement concerning advertisements published for several years of an alleged lottery in the state of San Luis Potosi, Mexico, tickets for which have been sold, and even, he says, imaginary lists of prizes published. There is not, and never has been, says the ambassador, such a lottery in the Mexican state of San Luis Potosi.

General Miles told the senate committee on military affairs that if the bill introduced by Senator Hawley, at the instance of the war department, for the organization of the general staff of the army should become law he would decline longer to hold his commission. He said the bill is utterly subversive of the military establishment, and he would not be a party to such a proposition to the extent of even continuing to hold his place. It is stated that President Roosevelt, on account of Lieutenant-General Miles' opposition to the proposed military reform, will order him out of active service.

Treasury experts have submitted a report to Assistant Secretary Taylor showing that the best tempered steel, no matter how thick, is not proof against a new chemical compound which the up-to-date professional cracksmen have learned to use. This compound, called thermite, when mixed with magnesium powder, will destroy the hardness in the metal and rob it of its temper, enabling a burglar with ordinary tools to cut into it as though it were lead. For this reason Mr. Taylor believes the treasury ought not to expend large sums of money in the construction of so-called burglar-proof vaults and strong boxes in which to store away government funds.

Weight Left to Adopted Daughter.
Frank Conger of 83 St. Mark's avenue, Brooklyn, who died recently in a Detroit hotel, bequeathed to his adopted daughter, Oressa Stewart Conger, whom he took from the arms of her dead mother a dozen years ago in a railroad wreck at Hamburg, N. Y., an estate of \$6,000,000. The girl is now 14 years old and for 12 years has been thought by many to be the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Conger.

Conger left no natural heirs, and the will states that the girl, whose income will be \$500,000 a year, was the daughter of Rev. E. E. Stewart and wife of Rochester, N. Y., both of whom were killed on March 6, 1890, in a wreck on the Lake Shore road at Hamburg, N. Y. Conger bequeathed a life interest in the estate to his widow and an annuity of \$5,000 to Mrs. M. Lois Place, the widow of a friend, for whom he had provided since her husband's death.

TAR AND FEATHERS.

How It Feels to Wear a Coat of This Fearful Mixture.

People who read of tarring and feathering know that the punishment is a very unpleasant one, but few imagine how terribly painful and dangerous it is. In Wyoming I once saw a man who had been tarred and feathered, and, although he fully deserved the discipline, I could not help pitying him. Hardened tar is very hard to remove from the skin, and when feathers are added it forms a kind of cement that sticks closer than a brother. As soon as the tar sets the victim's suffering begins. It contracts as it cools, and every one of the little veins on the body is pulled, causing the most exquisite agony. The perspiration is entirely stopped, and unless the tar is removed death is certain to ensue.

But the removal is no easy task and requires several days. The tar cannot be softened by the application of heat and must be peeled off bit by bit, sweet oil being used to make the process less painful. The irritation to the skin is very great, as the hairs cannot be disengaged, but must be pulled out or cut off. No man can be cleaned of tar in a single day, as the pain of the operation would be too excruciating for endurance, and until this is done he has to suffer from a pain like that of ten thousand pin pricks. Numbers of men have died under the torture, and none who have gone through it regard tar and feathering as anything but a most fearful infliction.—Exchange.

Lifting by Magnets.

The most important employment of the magnet in the mechanical industries is in lifting and handling such masses of metal as ship plates, boiler plates and parts of machines which it would otherwise be difficult to get hold of. It effects an average economy in time and cost of handling, stacking, loading and unloading of from 50 to 75 per cent.

To meet the possible danger that from any cause the current from the dynamo might be cut off, causing the magnet to drop its load, it is usual in well appointed plants to install a storage battery, which effectually guards against such accident. In handling billets and material of convenient shape a number of pieces may be picked up at one time. The same is true of thin plates.

The type of magnets used in most American works has a lifting capacity of five tons. It makes a stranger nervous to see them at work, and he generally does not need to be reminded that unless his life is insured at its full value he would do well to stand from under. But slings and chains break under loads quite as often as magnets drop their loads by accident and in wrong places.—New York Times.
