CRIMES AND ACCIDENTS.

In a battle between a sheriff's posse
and outlaws in Scott county, Va., five
men, all members of the sheriff's posse,
were killed, two other posse men were
wounded, and Jim Wright, an escaped
Hancock county (Tenn.) murderer, was
wounded and captured. All the other
outlaws escaped.

Thomas A. Saiton, a prospector and
engineer of Redding, Cal., was thrown
from a Pittsburg and Western railroad
train while walking from a day coach
to the smoking car. His body was
pulled out from a small creek near Pitt-
sburg. His skull was fractured, and
death must have been instantaneous.

Miss Carrie M. Jonnett, 23 years of
age, who would have become a mother
in a few months, was brutally mur-
dered on Thirteenth street, Detroit,
about midnight, while on her way home
from a meeting she had been attending.
Professor J. M. Miller, aged 47, a music
teacher, and a married man with a
family, was arrested on suspicion of
having murdered the girl, and afterward
confessed to the crime. He was Miss
Jonnett's music teacher, and was re-
sponsible for her condition. He was
arraigned in the recorder's court, pleaded
guilty to the charge of murdering Miss
Jonnett with a hatchet, and 73 hours
after he committed the crime he was in
Jackson prison, sentenced to spend the
rest of his life there at hard labor.

shot herself in the head and shortly
afterward died. When Elizabeth Mo-
nulty, the servant girl, rushed into the
room the entire family save the little
baby, only 11 months old, lay in a heap
on the floor. The woman's mind, prior
to the tragedy, was known to be af-
fected. Mrs. Bucey, who was 35 years
of age, was formerly Miss Millie Hale
of Vancouver, B. C. Bucey was a native
of Wisconsin. His father is a minister
at Madison, in that state.

The Rev. M. V. Donaldson, a Method-
ist minister who was run out of the
town of Vacaville, Cal., recently by the
indignant citizens on account of scan-
dalous conduct with certain women of
his congregation, was arrested and
locked up at the city hall prison, San
Francisco, on a charge of being drunk.
Since Donaldson arrived in that city he
has been staying in the rooms of his
wife, a saleswoman, who says he is the
victim of malice. Mrs. Donaldson's
landlady at 367 Geary street sent for a
police officer and complained that Don-
aldson was trying to beat in the doors
of the rooms in her flat. When Police
Officer Lew Clark arrived at the house
he found that Donaldson had gone out,
but found him in a saloon at Post and
William streets. As Donaldson was con-
siderably under the influence of liquor
he was placed in custody and sent to
the city hall prison in the patrol wagon.
Mrs. Donaldson offered bail for her
husband's release, but it was refused
until such time as the disgraced min-
ister could sleep off the effect of the liquor
he had taken.

Jose, Cal., of the charge of illegally

defendant was not authorized by the
state board of medical examiners to

FIFTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

Monday.

The Chinese exclusion bill was passed
by the House by a vote of 220 to 155.
The bill practically re-enacts the existing ex-
clusion laws and incorporates with them
the existing treaty regulations. It ex-
tends these exclusion laws to the Phil-
ippines and the other possessions of the
United States, and forbids Chinese
labor in our colonial possessions coming
into this country. It is also provided
that no vessel under American register
shall employ Chinese crews in voyages
terminating at an American port.

Tuesday.

A vigorous protest was made in the
senate by Callahan of Illinois, chairman
of the committee on foreign relations,
against the passage of the Chinese ex-
clusion bill in its present form, so being
in contravention of our treaty obli-
gations with China. Patterson of Colo-
rado and Perkins of California supported
the pending bill. The exclusion bill, as
passed by the house, was referred to the
committee on immigration.

In the house the bill to protect game
and fish in Alaska was passed. The
house then went into committee of the
whole for the consideration of the
Cuban reciprocity bill. Payne, in order
to side Cuba over the present crisis,
favored a 20 per cent reduction on sugar.
Newlands of Nevada spoke against the
measure.

Wednesday.

In the senate Senator Gallinger of
New Hampshire attacked the Chinese
exclusion bill, and said it was "narrow,
bigoted and indefensible." Dillingham
of Vermont also opposed the bill, while
Turner of Washington supported it.

In the house William A. Smith of
Michigan and Morris of Minnesota, both
Republicans, spoke against the Cuban
reciprocity bill, as did Ball (D.) of Texas
and Sparkman (D.) of Florida. Mondell
of Wyoming advocated its passage.

Thursday.

Three speeches were made in the sen-
ate against the Chinese exclusion bill in
its present form; Dillingham of Ver-
mont, Stewart of Nevada and Hoar of
Massachusetts stating their objections
to the bill.

In the house Governor of Michigan
spoke in favor of the Cuban reciprocity
bill, while Weeks of Michigan opposed
the measure. Lawrence of Massachusetts
supported the bill on the ground
that the United States owed a moral
obligation to grant this relief to Cuba.

Friday.

In the senate, during the discussion of
Dewey's amendment to the resolution to
provide for the election of senators by
the people, Dewey was severe in his
comments upon the methods practiced in
Mississippi and other southern states,
resulting in the disfranchisement of in-
telligent negroes, while ignorant whites
are permitted to vote. The remarks of
Dewey resulted in a lively interchange
of personalities between him and several
southern senators. The exclusion bill
was then considered.

The house, in committee of the whole,
resumed consideration of the Cuban
reciprocity bill.

Saturday.

In the senate, during the discussion of
the Chinese exclusion bill, the speeches
made were in favor of the measure,
with modifications of some of the more
drastic provisions.

The house passed the bill granting a
pension to the widow of President Mc-
Kinley of \$5,000 a year. It had previ-
ously passed the senate, and now goes to
the president for signature.

Caste in India.

The barbers of India rank with the
washerwomen. The son of a barber
must be a barber all his life, and his
wife must be a barber's daughter. The
Hindoo shaver travels about in search
of customers, and the barbering is done
in the street. There are no stools, both
barber and customer squatting on their
heels while the operation is performed.
The Hindoo barber is a man of a
churlish disposition as well, and his pay is
wretchedly small. They often act as
surgeons, and they make a specialty of
piercing the ears of young girls for ear-
rings, while barber's wives are almost
always hairdressers.

Like Shooting Ghosts.

The impression when hunting paddi-
melons, a species of kangaroo found in
Australia, is of shooting at ghosts,
what with the dim, mysterious light of
the "bush" and the strange appearance
and swift movement of the game. Padi-
melons, like all the kangaroo tribe,
are useless for food, except so far as
their tails are concerned, which, being
largely of glutinous texture, furnish
material for capital soup, very like
cat-tail, but with a peculiar and agreeable
gamy flavor.

Webster's Income.

The legal profession of the present
day will be surprised to learn that Mr.
Webster, the greatest American law-
yer of his time, made but \$15,000 a
year by his practice. But the fees of
counsel between 1840 and 1850 were
not what they have been since.

In 1848 I accompanied a client to
Mr. Webster's office in Boston and asked
him to make a retaining fee in an
important patent case. He said he
thought a couple of hundred dollars
would do. When the case was tried,
his fee was only \$1,000. On another
occasion I paid him a retaining fee of
\$2,000 for the proprietors of the Good-
year India rubber patent.

His fee for arguing the great equity
cause of Goodyear versus Day in the
circuit court of the United States for
the district of New Jersey, by which
he established the validity of the Good-
year patent, was \$5,000. This was in
the spring of 1852, and was the last
case he ever argued.

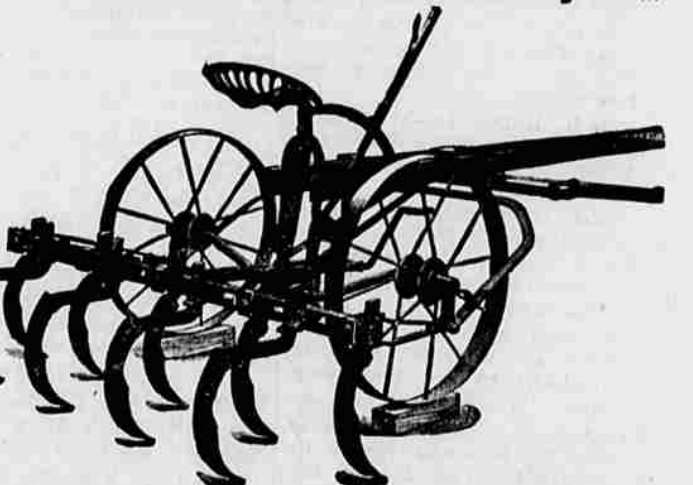
