Superior Judge Seawell of San Francisco has decided that there is no law to compel artisans to work with men whom they consider in any way objectionable. The case arose out of the building trades council's excluding from its membership any labor union controlled by a central organization which is not engaged in building work exclusively. The council issues cards to the artisans connected with it, and its members refused to work with members of local union 433 of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America. The latter organization sued out an injunction against the building trades council, restraining its members from refusing to work with members of the plaintiff organization, but this was refused by the court.

FIFTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

Monday.

Only a brief time was devoted by the senate to the discussion of the Philippine government bill, which Deliver of Iowa vigorously supported.

The house passed the naval bill. By its provisions half of the new vessels are to be built in the government navy yards. The 4 per cent differential heretofore allowed Pacific coast builders was taken off, and hereafter, if the bill goes through the senate as it stands, Pacific coast builders will have to compete with eastern yards on an even basis. The government may construct all vessels if contractors combine.

Tuesday.

During the discussion of the Philippine bill in the senate Bacon of Georgia attacked the policy of concentration, likening it to the reconcentration camps established by General Weyler in Cuba. Hoar of Massachusetts spoke briefly in the same line, while Foraker of Ohio defended the action of the military authorities.

In the house a resolution offered by Hitt, chairman of the foreign affairs committee, felicitating Cuba on her independence was passed unanimously. The house instructed conferees not to agree to the senate's amendments to increase the money for army posts.

Wednesday.

The senate adopted a resolution congratulating the republic of Cuba on its entry into the family of independent nations. When the Philippines bill was brought up Wellington of Maryland and Bacon of Georgia denounced the policy of the government in the archipelago. The omnibus public buildings bill was passed.

The house took up the immigration bill under a special rule giving it the right of way. Shattuck of Ohio condemned the manner in which immigrants are shipped through Canada by Canadian railway and steamship companies. An educational test of immigrants was proposed by Kibben of Texas and Grosvenor of Ohio.

Thursday.

In the senate Hoar of Massachusetts made a notable speech on the government's Philippine policy. He urged that the United States should withdraw from the Philippines and permit the people there to erect their own government, as had been done in Cuba. He sharply arraigned General Funston, and intimated strongly that had the senate been aware of the facts connected with the capture of Aguinaldo, Funston might not have been confirmed in his recent promotion. Applause swept over the senate and the galleries at the conclusion of the speech.

In the discussion of the immigration bill the house adopted an amendment, offered by Underwood of Alabama, requiring an educational test for immigrants to this country.

Friday.

In the senate Dubois of Idaho opposed the Philippine bill, and said it would be a disadvantage to the people of this country, from a commercial and industrial point of view, to retain the islands. Beveridge of Indiana combated the views of Dubois, and maintained that it would be of benefit to this country to retain the islands. The senate adjourned until Monday.

The house devoted the day to private pension bills and to a few other minor measures. Lord of California criticized the special pension legislation as a disservice, and drew emphatic responses from Salloway of New Hampshire, Sullivan of New York and Miles of Indiana. The house adjourned until Monday in order to participate in the Bozhambeau exercises on Saturday.

PORTLAND OREGON.

Proposals for the Construction of a Bridge across Bear Creek at Medford, Oregon.

Sealed proposals will be received by the County Court of Jackson County at Jacksonville, Oregon, on or before the 4th day of June, 1902, for the construction of a steel bridge across Bear Creek at Medford, Oregon, said bridge to commence and terminate as specified in the former advertisement for the construction of said bridge, which advertisement is on file in the clerk's office at Jacksonville, Oregon, and to consist of two 110-foot spans, together with a 72-foot approach on the west side thereof. The foundation, piers and abutments to consist of either granite or tubular piers, the said abutments and piers, spans and approach to be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications as approved by the County Court and now on file in the clerk's office of said County Court. The said bridge is to be of not less than 18 feet of clear roadway, free from all obstructions, and to be constructed 18 inches lower than the present bridge.

With each bid submitted by contractors there is to be a separate bid presented for the filling to be made at each end of the bridge. Each bid for the construction of said bridge is to be accompanied by a deposit equal to five per cent of the bid.

A bill for the removal of the hulk of the wrecked battleship Maine from Havana harbor is now pending before the United States senate. It carries with it an appropriation of \$1,000,000—a sum which will probably be inadequate to the undertaking. The recovery of the bodies of the American sailors who went down with the vessel is mentioned as one of the prime reasons for the introduction of the bill, and upon this plea, together with the necessity of removing the wreck from the harbor as an obstruction to navigation, its passage will be urged.
