JACKSONVILLE'S CELEBRATION.

Jacksonville's celebration of the anniversary of America's independence was a grand success. The celebration opened with a sunrise salute. Despite the rain of the preceding days the day of the Fourth was almost an ideal one. A large crowd thronged the streets, every town in the valley being well represented. The parade formed at 11 a. m. and after traversing the principal streets gaily decorated with flags, bunting and evergreens, proceeded to the court house grounds, where the exercises were held. The procession headed by Sheriff Orme, as grand marshal, marched in the following order: Grants Pass band in their natty suits of white duck; carriage with orator, chaplain and reader; flag float with Edyth Cranfill, of Medford, as a personation of our national colors; a gorgeous float of red and gold bearing the Goddess of Liberty, Miss Sarah Maury, resplendent in robe of red; following this was a float of artistic creation in white, with the Angel of Peace, Miss Jennie Woodford, of Medford, beautifully symbolic of white winged peace, with four charming little cherubs, Vera Merriman, Mary Trowbridge, Ruth Woodford and Lucile Johnson, of Medford, as attendants; next came the float, Justice, beautifully bedecked in white and silver, with Miss Grace Reeves as the central figure and two ravishing little cupids with poised arrows in the foreground; our Union represented by forty-five little girls; the original colonies by thirteen young ladies on horseback, preceded by Miss Anna Keegan as flag bearer; America's colors, the red, white and blue, represented by floats in the three colors, with silver and gold trimmings, carrying Mary Colvig, Mervena Kenney and Gertrude Dunnington; following this was the fairy float of pure white and silver, with Mary DeBar as queen, attended by her court in the persons of Laura Neuber, Frances Hubert, Maude Newbury, Pearl Dox, Fieta Ulrich and Katie Murphy; Battleship Oregon manned by Ephraim Wilson, Vivian Beach, Bryant DeBar and Charlie Prim; next came Medford members of Knights of Pythias in their striking uniforms and plumed helmets walking six abreast; float representing Oregon, laden with products of our fair state in charge of Misses Clara Elmer, Agnes Love, Maud Roberts, Florence DeBar, Ethel Florey, Myrtle Sutton, Amy Cantrall and Ethel Barber in Grecian costumes; Jacksonville's base ball nine in suits of blue and gold and preceded by Vance Colvig leading the team's mascot, a goat, wearing the blue and gold; the proverbial Old Woman in the Shoe with her innumerable children came next; our island possessions followed ably represented by Frances Kenney, Lulu Areamith and Mike Broad in a float resplendent in various colors; tandem team of three horses gaily decorated in red, white and blue driven by Miss Emma Ulrich came next, followed by the fire department and engine with hose cart beautifully decorated carrying little Ora Norris and drawn by nine little boys uniformed in red. The Gehm club seated in a much bedecked vehicle was one of the features of the parade. At the court house the exercises were presided over by J. C. Whipp. Rev. S. H. Jones invoked the divine blessing and Gore brothers' quartet sang several patriotic selections with such effect as to win for them hearty applause from the audience. Lolla Prim read the Declaration of Independence as it has never been

read before, while the address of the day by Hon. W. J. Vawter, of Medford, was listened to with marked attention. The speaker was frequently interrupted with rounds of applause. During the fore part of the afternoon the Calithumpians with C. L. Reames as grand orator, furnished amusement for the crowd. Games for the enjoyment of all with prizes for the feats performed claimed the attention of many. Hundreds attended the ball game between Medford and Jacksonville, which was won by the former. The Grants Pass band discoursed music in the principal places during the day. In the evening the crowd gathered at Neuber & Taylor's grounds to witness one of the best display of fireworks ever seen in Jacksonville. The celebration closed with a grand ball in the evening at Orth's hall. The Ashland orchestra furnished the music. Taken as a whole the celebration was one Jacksonville may be proud of and fully sustained the county seat's old time reputation.

Mr. Vawter's oration was a model, both as to brevity, for he did not talk for the long period that so many Fourth of July speakers do, and the timeliness of the topics discussed, for he did not follow the lines of the average stereotyped celebration oration, but talked of today. Clearly and convincingly Mr. Vawter proved that the pessimist's wail, that public virtue and patriotism were on the decline, was an unwarrantable fear, born of a morbid mind. America in political life was growing purer with each year. Conventions were more fair in their deliberations, elections more honestly carried on, and public officials more true to the fealty they owe to the people than at any previous time in the history of the republic. And as to patriotism the events of recent years have shown that the American people are just as patriotic as they were in the days when Paul Revere made his famous ride. He attributed to the American sense of justice and liberty, the cause for the United States attaining the high position it now holds in the world's affairs. The way in which Cuba has been befriended, and the magnanimous treatment accorded to China in that country's late trouble, are without parallel in the history of nations. The marvelous growth of the nation in industrial, commercial and other lines was but another compliment to American brains and energy. Mr. Vawter closed his speech with a masterly defense for the Nation's expansion from the time of Jefferson down to today.

A Runaway Car.

About 4 o'clock Thursday morning as a freight train was pulling out some flat cars loaded with granite from the spur at the Ayers quarry, on the Siskiyou, north of Ashland, one of the cars got away and dashed off down the mountain so quickly, that the trainmen didn't realize it was gone until it was out of sight. It reached Ashland in about five minutes, passing through that town at the speed of seventy-five miles an hour. The curves this side of Ashland slowed it down some, but it made the 12 miles to Medford in less than eleven minutes, making the last six miles, which is straight track in four minutes, and when it passed Medford it was going at the rate of 60 miles an hour. Night Operator R. E. Ormsby received notice from Ashland that a runaway car was coming just before the northbound passenger train got in. Being unable to get the passenger onto the siding, at the instant it arrived he notified the trainmen when a brakeman made a run for the switch and threw it open just in time to let the runaway go onto the siding which it did through rare good luck and solid condition of the switch rails, for which Section Foreman Kelley should have the credit. For once there was not a car standing on the siding and the runaway was in an instant back on the main track and continued its mad flight until it passed Tolo, when a level track brought it to a stop and the passenger train coming up to it pushed it onto the siding at Gold Hill. So many trains are on the road that it is rarely that so long a stretch of track is clear and it was but one chance in a hundred that a runaway car could make the 22 miles without making a terrific wreck. Had the train man been a moment late in throwing the switch the Medford yard would have been the scene of one of the most horrible wrecks ever on this road, for the heavy blocks of granite would have gone through the Pullman coaches like shot from a rifled cannon.
