DEATH OF MAX MULLER.

In the death of Max Muller, which occurred in this city on Sunday evening, July 20th, Jacksonville loses a pioneer resident since 1855 and a highly esteemed citizen. Mr. Muller was born at Reckendorf, Bavaria, January 20, 1836, coming to America in 1851. After four years in the Atlantic states he came to this coast. In 1858 he established a mercantile business of his own and has lived here continuously since that time. His great popularity was shown by the numerous times he was elected to public office, his first election being in 1863 as president of the board of trustees. Three times he held the office of town treasurer, and in 1868 he was elected county treasurer. For eighteen years he filled the appointment of postmaster of Jacksonville. In 1890 he was elected county clerk of Jackson County and in 1892 and 1894 he was honored by re-election. In 1900 he was elected county treasurer, which term of office expired a few weeks before his death. Mr. Muller was a prominent Mason, being secretary of both Warren Lodge No. 10, A. F. and A. M., and Oregon Chapter, R. A. M. He was also a charter member of Banner Lodge, A. O. U. W. Mr. Muller was married to Miss Louisa Hess, June 11, 1868, who, with five grown children, survives him. In his home life he was kind and affectionate; to his wife the kindest of husbands. Max Muller will indeed be missed by the business and social circles of our town. The funeral took place at two o'clock Tuesday afternoon, conducted by the Masonic order and the A. O. U. W., prayer and benediction being offered by Rev. S. H. Jones. Beautiful floral offerings were placed on the casket by the hands of friends. Max Muller leaves behind only friends to remember him. May he rest in peace.

The Palm-Bodge Block.

Active building operations have commenced on the Palm-Bodge block and before many weeks roll by Medford will have another fine structure to add to the substantial appearance of the town. Priddy & Childers, who have the stone and brick work, are getting their material on the ground ready to begin operations August 1st, according to their contract, and the Medford Planing Mill Company is getting the lumber delivered, which is from Olson's saw mill, ready for their carpenters as soon as the brick work is advanced enough to permit them beginning their work.

The wooden buildings now on the ground will be torn down, as they are not worth moving.
