## WRECK ON SANTA FE

### LOS ANGELES THE SCENE OF A SERIOUS COLLISION.

#### Passenger and Freight Trains Meet in Head-On Collision—Oil Cars and Locomotives Explode—Fireman Missing and Four Passengers Hurt

Los Angeles, Aug. 4.—While running at the rate of thirty miles an hour a Santa Fe passenger train ran through an open switch and crashed into an oil train which was delivering tank cars of oil to the plant of the Loomis Refining company on Vernon avenue at the extreme southwest corner of the city at 8 o'clock Sunday night. The two engines were demolished and four oil cars and two coaches were wrecked.

The instant the crash came a fuel tank on one of the engines exploded, setting fire to the wreck. This was immediately followed by the explosions of the other engine tanks and one of the tank cars. Boilers blew up, burning oil was thrown in all directions and the large warehouse of the refining company caught fire and was destroyed, as were all of the cars in the wreck except one.

T. D. Martin, fireman on the freight engine, is missing, and it is believed his body is under the wreck. If it is it will probably never be recovered for the heat from the burning oil was so great that it bent the heavy rods on both wrecked engines and twisted the steel rails until nearly 100 yards of track will have to be relaid.

The engineer of the freight train saw the other train enter the switch and saved himself by jumping and then lying near the side of the track where the force of the explosion passed over him.

The passenger train was a special running light, that is, it only carried four or five passengers. It had been out to bring back from Redondo Beach the Sunday crowds which went to that resort.

The cause of the accident was the fact that the crew of the freight train did not know that a special passenger train was to be sent out. They left the switch open and on the main line they had cut out a car, so that whether the switch was open or not there would have been a wreck.

As soon as the news of the accident was received at the company's offices two special trains were sent to bring the injured to the city. The men were taken to the Sisters' hospital. All of them will probably recover, although Gardner's condition is considered serious. The loss to the company consists of the value of two fine locomotives, four oil tank cars, one coach and damage to two other coaches. The loss to the refining company will not exceed \$5000.

## WILL SHOOT TO KILL

### SUCH WILL BE THE ORDERS AT SHENANDOAH.

Attacks on the Soldiers Will in the Future be Met With Force. Under Cover of Darkness the Soldiers Are Peeted With Stones.

Shenandoah, Pa., Aug. 4.—At 11 o'clock last night one of the guards of the Eighth regiment was rendered unconscious by being hit by a stone thrown from the bushes. At the same time a fearful fusillade of stones rained about the sentries and a volley as if from a dozen revolvers was fired. The sentries responded to the fire and raked the bushes with a volley, a call to arms was issued and in a few minutes the entire regiment was ready either for attack or defense. It is estimated that only about twenty men were in the crowd and all but one escaped through the bushes.

The attack on the sentries was repeated at 1 o'clock and again at 3, but no one was injured. The camp of the Eighth regiment is located on the mountain side about a quarter of a mile below. While the shooting was going on at the camp of the Eighth the bullets were whizzing over the camp below, and as the shooting was heard by the Twelfth regiment boys everything was got in readiness there to meet an attack.

General Gobin has issued an order to have all the underbrush cut away. He says that forbearance has ceased to be a virtue, and that all the attacks on the sentries in the future will be met with force. Orders will be "Shoot to kill."

Colonel Hoffman of the Eighth regiment gave an order for mobilization of the troops and in three minutes the regiment was ready to charge.

#### Accused of Starving Babies to Death

Chicago, Aug. 4.—Buying, kidnapping, poisoning and starving babies to death are the charges which caused the arrest of Mrs. Nell Campbell, 665 Grand avenue. The woman is suspected of maintaining a "baby farm." The police are unable to solve the complex proposition presented them to the points of discovering the woman's motive in the event the allegations are founded on facts. Evidence has been obtained confirming the information of the police and supporting the charges preferred against the prisoner.

A story horrible in details was unfolded to Inspector Wheeler by Viola Campbell, a 14-year-old girl, who until recently believed Mrs. Campbell to be her mother, but who is now thought to have been stolen from her father John Reade, of Cincinnati, while she was an infant. The story details how the little dependents were slowly starved to death, or made to eat opium, and of eight little forms laid to rest in one lone lot in Calvary cemetery.

#### Stage Hold-Up Frustrated.

Auburn, Cal., Aug. 4.—A determined attempt was made at 10 o'clock Saturday morning to hold up the stage which runs between Forest Hill and this place. Owing to the quickness of mind and bravery of the stage driver the attempt was frustrated. The stage was coming in from the Forest Hill mines, having the mail and a considerable quantity of gold on board. The exact value of the treasure has not been disclosed, but it is understood to have run well into the thousands. Sitting on the box with the driver was a miner named John Acuma, and there were a few passengers inside. The stage had reached a point about one mile this side of Butcher's ranch, or about eleven miles from here, when a masked man jumped into the middle of the road with a revolver in each hand, and shouted to the driver to pull up. The highwayman had, however, chosen his ground badly. The stage was coming down hill, the horses were fresh, and were making good time, and they had a determined man at the lines. By way of reply Crocker, the driver, threw his whip over the hanks of his horses, and the robber had barely time to jump aside to avoid being run over. He fired at the flying stage and his bullet went close to Crocker's head. The driver, thinking that the man might have confederates, kept up the pace until well out of range. Some of the passengers then returned with drawn "kisses" looking for the robber, but he had decamped.

#### Bad Train Wreck in New York.

Hudson, N. Y., Aug. 4.—One dead and twenty-five injured is the record left by a rear-end collision on the Albany and Hudson electric railroad near Rossman station, seven miles north of here. The accident was caused by a misunderstanding. A car running ahead was forced to stop because of an accident to its electrical machinery, and a car running closely behind it ran into the disabled car with terrific force.

#### Missoula Has Tracy Scare.

Missoula, Mont., Aug. 4.—Missoula had a Tracy scare yesterday. The sheriff and his deputies, each armed with a Winchester, occupied places at the west end of the Northern Pacific yards in the hope that the Oregon desperado would alight from the train and be captured or killed. The man who it was thought was Tracy turned out to be a tramp. An armed watch is being kept, as Tracy is likely to pass through here in order to reach the "Hole in the Wall" country.

## NEWS ITEMS FOR FOREIGN LANDS

A dispatch from Rome says that the Princesses Rosalinda, who was Miss Marie Reid of Washington, D. C., has given birth to a daughter.

General Salmave and forces, who are fighting for the presidency of M. Firmin, are in retreat, having retired some twenty miles from Cape Haytien. General Nord, the minister of war, with his troops, has incurred a heavy loss upon the forces of General Salmave.

Miss Yobe, while leaving a carriage which had conveyed her back to her hotel from the railway station, fell and her knee was badly injured. She did not seem to mind the pain, however, but said she would leave London for Paris at once in search of Captain Strong.

The object of the visit of the king of Italy to the German Emperor at the end of August is said to be to propose a reduction in continental armaments. It is the purpose of his visit to the czar, from whom he received every encouragement. He will come to the emperor with Russia's full support.
