President Will Visit Oregon.

"President Roosevelt is very anxious to visit Oregon," said Hon. Binger Hermann, commissioner-general of the United States land office. Mr. Hermann is on his way to his home at Roseburg and is visiting the United States surveyor-general in this city. In a conversation this afternoon the ex-congressman referred to the intentions of President Roosevelt to visit this state.

"Many times has the president spoken to me of coming to Oregon," resumed Mr. Hermann. "He has repeatedly declared that he is desirous of touring this vast, wealthy region of the Pacific coast. Of his great interest in Oregon there can be no doubt. I do not believe he will come to Oregon this autumn, however, but I am positive he will make the journey early next year. As is well known the president is enthusiastic when big game is concerned and Oregon is adequately supplied in this direction."

WILL CALL EXTRA SESSION.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—Advices received here indicate that President Roosevelt will call the Senate in Extraordinary session early in November. Ever since it became evident that nothing would be accomplished as to reciprocity with Cuba at the recent session of Congress, rumors of a more or less definite nature have been in circulation that the President would call an extra session either of the entire Congress to enact Cuban reciprocity legislation or of the Senate to ratify, if possible, a reciprocity treaty with Cuba.

Arranging for Big Coast Travel.

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Commencing November 12th, the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad will run through trains from the Lakes to the Pacific Coast. Arrangements have been made with the Southern Pacific by which the Rock Island trains will be taken over the former's tracks from El Paso to the Coast. In order to provide cars for this through service, ten complete trains must be built. The cars, sixty in number, are now under construction and will be ready for delivery in about sixty days. The total cost of the cars will be but little under \$1,500,000.

Largest Ship in the World.

STETTIN, Aug. 12.—The new German Lloyd steamship Kaiser Wilhelm II was successfully launched at the Vulcan shipyards today, in the presence of Emperor William.

The Kaiser Wilhelm II will be the largest and is designed to be the fastest ship in the world. Her dimensions are: Length, 707 feet; beam, 71½ feet; depth, 39 feet; draught, 29 feet. Her displacement is 19,500 tons. She is to be of 39,000 horse power, and will have accommodations for 1,000 cabin passengers.

X-Ray Cured Him.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Former Senator William A. Roach, of North Dakota, who has been exceedingly ill here for a long time, is improving. His illness, which arose from the growth of a malignant tumor, had been pronounced incurable, and for days he lay at the point of death. The knife had been used several times without avail.

Finally the physicians resorted to the X-ray treatment. A tube was inserted in the incision made by the former operation, and through this the X-ray was applied to the affected part. The attempt was made to dry up the tumor, which the surgeons had failed to remove thoroughly with the knife. Gradually the dangerous symptoms have lessened, and at last there is genuine ground for hope.
