BRYAN WILL NOT RUN

WILL NOT TRY FOR THE PRESIDENCY IN 1904.

Says He Will Not Promise to Never Be a Candidate Again, But for the Present Wants to Devote Himself to Advocating Necessary Reforms.

Muscatine, Ia., Aug. 9.—William J. Bryan settled for all time the rumor that he would be a candidate for President in 1904 in an interview yesterday while on his way to Danville, Ill., where he spoke last night. Colonel Bryan, when shown the reports that he might again be a candidate, was much nettled and expressed himself in no uncertain manner. He said he wanted the matter settled right now, so that there could be no further question. The Mason City interview, he said, was unreliable. "I will not be a candidate for president in 1904," said Mr. Bryan. "While I would not promise never to be a candidate again under any circumstances, I have no plans looking to the future nomination for any office. I am perfectly content to do my work as a private citizen and enjoy my educational work. I shall continue to advocate with tongue and pen reforms which I believe to be necessary."

KILLED HIS UNCLE.

Fourteen-Year-Old Boy Protects His Mother From Relatives' Abuse. Chico, Aug. 9.—Walter Low is dead at the county hospital as a result of a rifle bullet wound received at the hands of his 14-year-old nephew, Elvin Freer, on July 4. Low was drunk, and going to the home of his sister, Mrs. Freer, began quarreling with the members of the family. He finally attacked young Freer with a club, running him out of the house. Low returned to the house and soon after young Freer heard his mother scream. Seizing a rifle the boy ran in and shot Low in the back, inflicting a wound which finally proved fatal. It is not believed the boy will be prosecuted.

Selling of Friar Lands Disapproved. Rome, Aug. 9.—The selling by the Philippine Friars of their lands to syndicates of laymen is disapproved at the Vatican. The lands are considered to be church property inalienable without the consent of Rome. An investigation indicates that the Dominicans alone sold their lands. When the sales are definitely ascertained the friars will be obliged to show the amount received by them and reimburse the church.

Democratic causes of Los Angeles and Pasadena have endorsed the candidacy of Mayor M. P. Snyder of the former city for governor on the Democratic ticket.

Charles Warren of Sacramento, who has been convicted of the murder of Hugh Duffy, a liquor merchant of that city, has been sentenced to be hanged October 11, next.

FOREIGN NEWS ITEMS.

Janowski has won the international chess tournament at Hanover. The Doni hotel of Cologne, Germany, has been sold to an American for \$1,184,000.

The introduction of labor saving machines in the canning factories at Quimper, Brittany, resulted in a riot, in which the workmen marched to the factories and smashed the new appliances.

Admiral Marquis Salgo, one of the famous connecting links between old and new Japan, is dead. He distinguished himself in the China and Formosan wars and held many high offices of state.

A Melbourne dispatch says that Captain Shields, medical officer of the transport Drayton Grange, from South Africa, has reported that the overcrowding of the ship was scandalous and without consideration for health or loss of life.

While King Oscar was yachting near the Marstrand bridge, Stockholm, which was crowded with women and children, the structure collapsed, throwing the occupants into the water. The king threw off his coat and assisted in the rescue of twenty-three persons, who were taken aboard his yacht.

What struck the eye most in the Abbey, says a London dispatch, speaking of the coronation services, was the marvelous display of jewels that certainly surpassed anything previously seen at a court function in England. The combination of these, with the magnificent robes and the beauty of the many wearers, made a memorable sight.

Advices from Rome say that the government engineer, Vendrasco, who prophesied the fall of the Campanile and lost his position in consequence, is now asserting that two other bellfries in the city, particularly that of St. George, are in danger of collapse. The government is being urged to adopt precautions in time to prevent another disaster.

The body of General Lucas Meyer, who died Friday in Brussels of heart disease, has been embalmed for shipment to Pretoria, where it will be interred. Messages of condolence have been received from Lord Salisbury, General Roberts, General Lord Kitchener and from General Sir John Denton French. Former President Kruger sent a personal letter by his secretary.

A Cape Haytien dispatch of Saturday says that General Albert Salnave, commandant of the Artillerie Militaire troops, has completely defeated the army of the provisional government under General Alexis Nord at Limbe, capturing General Nord's cannon and ammunition. Many of General Nord's soldiers were killed and a great number taken prisoners. General Salnave continues his march on Cape Haytien, an attack on which is hourly expected. Since the arrival of the American gunboat Machias the fears of the foreign inhabitants of a bombardment of the city, have been allayed.

TO KEEP THE FLAG FLOATING.

Such Were the Instructions of the Marcus Island Expedition.

Honolulu, T. H., Aug. 3.—According to the Honolulu men who are interested in the Marcus Island guano expedition, against which Japan has sent a war vessel, as reported by the last advices from the states, the vessel which left here for the island carried a complement of Mauser rifles and her captain had instructions from the company to plant the American flag on the island and keep it floating until compelled to haul it down. Captain A. A. Rosehill, the discoverer of the island, who left his claim to it on a coconut tree on Marcus in 1893, is in command of the expedition. The company's claim is based on his title, which is on record with the state department at Washington.

It is thought that the schooner commanded by Rosehill, the Juka E. Whalen, has arrived there by this time and that the Japanese war vessel was there first. The Whalen has on board a crew of nine men and a cook, with Taxidermist W. A. Bryan of the Bishop Museum, Honolulu, and T. F. Sedgewick of the United States Agricultural station, who goes to make an examination of the guano deposits. According to Fitch there are Mausers and ammunition for all on board the schooner.

Bell Regains His Liberty.

Marysville, Aug. 9.—At the preliminary examination of Walter Bell, who last week twice stabbed his brother Bert, held in Quincy, much sensational testimony was given, the upshot being that the defendant was turned loose, as it was proved that he acted in self-defense.

Vallejo Carpenters Walk Out.

Vallejo, Aug. 9.—There are no union carpenters working in this city today. The Building Exchange notified the local carpenters' union of a reduction from \$4 per day to \$3.50. The carpenters would not accept the reduction and quit work.

Popular Officer Passes Away.

San Francisco, Aug. 9.—Lieutenant Ralph P. Brower, artillery corps, who for three years has been one of the most popular officers at the Presidio, died of heart failure while swimming at Lake Tahoe.

A Fortunate Student.

Berkeley, Aug. 9.—Jose Castro, a young student in the sophomore class of the state university, has fallen heir to an estate variously estimated at from \$3,000,000 to \$5,000,000. Young Castro will leave for his home in Cienfuegos, Cuba, on Monday.
