CONDENSED TELEGRAMS.

The steamship Ohio has arrived at Seattle from Nome with 308 passengers and \$75,000 in treasure.

The North American Copper company has purchased the Ferris-Hagarty copper mine at Battle Lake for \$10,000,000.

The new battleship Maine has had her trial run and has proven herself to be the fastest battleship in Uncle Sam's navy.

A movement is said to be on foot in Pennsylvania to elect Henry Clay Frick to the United States senate from that state.

The family of Mary Collier of Bedford, Ind. were mysteriously poisoned by eating cookies. Nine of the victims are in a serious condition.

In a head-on collision between two Baltimore and Ohio trains in a tunnel near Pittsburg, a fireman was killed and a brakeman fatally injured.

A report from Louisville, Ky., says the grindstone, ax and handle factories of the country are about to form a trust with a capital of \$25,000,000.

Grand Duke Boris has postponed his departure from Chicago indefinitely owing to the illness of Chevalier de Schaack, personal attaché to the duke.

Clarence A. Plank, police judge of Springfield, O., committed suicide in that city on Saturday. He denounced Springfield politics as "rotten to the core."

The statement published in this country that Americans were trying to purchase the house near Sandbury, Oxfordshire, England, proves to have been erroneous.

A forty-story office building, to represent a \$10,000,000 investment, has been planned for the block fronting on the west side of Broadway, between Cortland and DeWitt streets, New York.

In order to clear up the many mysterious surrounding the Bartholin murder case, Chicago, the coroner has decided to have the body of the murdered girl, Minnie Mitchell, exhumed.

Hiram Cron, the only soldier of the war of 1812 upon the government pension rolls, is dying at his home near Danbrook, N. Y. Cron is 103 years old, having lived in three centuries.

Near Lexington, in Cleveland county, O. T. Charles Davis, a young man, shot and killed "Grandma" Johnson, an old woman, as she lay asleep beside Miss Davis, the murderer's sister.

The marriage of Vivian May Sartoria, granddaughter of General Grant, took place at St. Peter's church, Coburg, Ontario, on Saturday. The groom is Frederick Roosevelt Scovel, a cousin of President Roosevelt.

In regard to the sensational newspaper reports hitting at gross irregularities and fraud in the unloading of United States transports at ports in the Philippines, and declaring that a searching investigation is about to be made to discover the guilty parties, Frederick E. LANDING IMPOSSIBLE

ADMIRAL PILLSBURY SURRENDERS TO HIGGINSON.

The Attacking Fleet Could Not Make a Landing, and the Coast of New England Has Been Shown to be Practically Impregnable.

Rockport, Mass., Aug. 25.—The first act of the naval war game has been finished. "Quod Erat Demonstrandum" has been written after the solved "search problem" and Admiral Pillsbury has formally surrendered to Admiral Higginson. It has been demonstrated that the protection of the New England coast by a fleet is possible and practicable, and in case of another war there will be less uncertainty and uneasiness. The conclusion of the five days of anxiety was marked by something of flatness. The victory of the defending squadron was so decisive and followed so quickly the attempt of the invading squadron to effect a landing near Gloucester that naval authorities are wondering if Admiral Pillsbury ever had a ghost of a chance.

The attempt of the white squadron to land was made at Gloucester. Discovery followed so quickly, however, that Admiral Pillsbury had no chance to even begin the six-hour's wait imposed upon him before he could claim a victory. His ships were discovered and captured before a landing had been effected, and in an hour he had surrendered. The finish came so quickly and decisively that the demonstration is regarded as hardly conclusive.

Naval officers familiar with the politics of the navy department are prone to believe that Admiral Pillsbury was not at all inclined to bring discomfiture upon Admiral Higginson. The surrendered itself was conducted with all the pomp and circumstance of an actual war time occurrence. The proffered sword of Admiral Pillsbury was declined with courteous and graceful acknowledgments by Admiral Higginson and Admiral Pillsbury replied in like fashion.

Turkey Concedes All Our Demands
Constantinople, Aug. 25.—An imperial order has been issued commanding that all the demands made by the United States upon Turkey be conceded and the relations between the porte and the United States legation here have resumed their normal condition.

The demands made by the United States included the rebuilding of the American mission house at Kharput, destroyed at the time of the Armenian massacre there; and the granting of permission for Armenian women and children to join their husbands and fathers who are naturalized Americans.

Mother and Son Drown Together.
San Bernardino, Cal., Aug. 25.—Mrs. Henry Jacobs and her 9-year-old son were drowned yesterday in a creek in the mountains across the line in Riverside county. While wading in the stream the boy stepped into a deep pool and when the mother leaped in after him she was dragged beneath the water by the drowning lad and both were drowned. A 7-year-old son of Mrs. Jacobs was also wading in the creek and witnessed the drowning of his mother and brother.

West Virginia Miners Want to Resume.
Thurmond, W. Va., Aug. 25.—The striking miners held meetings at various points throughout the New and Kanawha river coal fields yesterday. Nothing has been made public as to what was done. Some of the operators, or the greater part of them, are in favor of resuming work, and it is expected before the end of the week practically all the mines in the Chesapeake and Ohio territory will be in operation.

Luzon Drones Ambush Constabulary.
Manila, Aug. 25.—Ten members of the native constabulary were ambushed at a point near Magdalena, in the province of Sorsogon, Luzon, by a band of sixty ladores, armed with rifles and bolos. A desperate fight at close range took place. One member of the constabulary was killed, two wounded and three captured. Seventy constabulary have taken the field in pursuit of the ladores.

Will Search for the Frithjof.
London, Aug. 25.—Cabling from Copenhagen, the correspondent of the Daily Express says William Zeigler of New York, who financed the Baldwin polar expedition, has ordered Mr. Baldwin to proceed to Franz Josefland on board the America in search of the Frithjof, which has not been heard from since she was dispatched last July to search for and bring relief to Mr. Baldwin.

Leaps from a Bridge.
Oregon City, Or., Aug. 25.—An unknown man jumped from the Willamette river suspension bridge, connecting Oregon City and West Oregon City last night and was drowned.

Freight Train Wrecked.
New Albany, Ind., Aug. 25.—In a disastrous freight wreck on the Southern railway, near Georgetown, ten miles west of here, yesterday, one of the train crew was killed outright and the engineer and fireman fatally hurt. Fourteen box cars and two locomotives were tumbled over a trestle into a ravine forty feet below. The loss to the railroad company is \$75,000.
