

TELEGRAPHED NEWS NOTES

F. C. McLewee's grand performer, Major Daingerfeld, with Odum in the middle, won the \$15,000 annual champion stakes at Sheepshead Bay on Saturday.

The street car strike of Ottumwa, Ia., is assuming a serious aspect. The blacksmiths in the employ of the company have struck. The city depends upon the street car plant for electric power, which may be shut off.

"We regard Theodore Roosevelt as the logical candidate of the Republican party for the presidency in 1904, and we pledge ourselves to do all in our power to secure his nomination." This resolution was adopted at a conference of the state party leaders of New York, called by Senator Platt, and is to be incorporated in the platform at the Saratoga convention this week.

General Wheeler, who has just returned from France, witnessed the French army maneuvers, which took place in the territory between Toulouse and the Pyrenees mountains. "The French army maneuvers were very interesting," he said, "but the French have much to learn. While they are modern in some ways, they are away behind in others, and they do not seem to have learned anything from the late South African war. For instance, they have no long range guns, and then, again, they march in close order instead of extended. They are away behind in some things."

An important decision against the Chicago board of trade was rendered Saturday by Judge Axel Chytrus in the July oats corner injunction cases. Not only does the opinion of the court, if sustained by higher tribunals, get an end to all corners in commodities on the exchange, but it strikes at the very life of the institution as now organized. The directors for all time have had their powers so curtailed that they cannot longer adjust upon property rights of the members of the association. Judge Chytrus goes even farther, and says that under the charter of the board of trade there is no provision for succession of membership. "What should become of the corporation when persons now composing the original board are dead?"

Governor Savage of Nebraska has announced that any attempt to include the packing houses of Nebraska in a merger will result in a strong fight in the courts. On account of the large Nebraska packing interests an attempt of the state officials to prevent the combine from doing business in Nebraska would have a serious effect on the proposed merger. "As soon as it comes to my knowledge that a merger of the packing interests has taken place," says Governor Savage, "I shall instruct the legal department of the state to investigate fully. If I find that any law of the state of Nebraska is being violated I will direct that proceedings be immediately brought to declare the merger void, and will impose the full penalty of the law against those responsible for the combination."

FIFTEEN PERISH

FORESTS STILL ABLAZE IN OREGON AND WASHINGTON.

Fifteen People Perish and Many Burned Out of House and Home in the Lewis River, Regior, Clark County, Wash.

Kalma, Wash., Sept. 15.—A messenger from Lewis River, Clark county, arrived here yesterday morning with the information that only two houses are left standing on that stream, from the Strait place to the head of the river, a distance of thirty miles, and that fifteen persons have perished.

D. L. Wallace, wife and two children were camping in the woods when caught by the fire; their charred bodies were lying near their wagon. A 12-year-old boy named Hanley, Mrs. John Polly, her baby and brother (name not known and Mr. Newhouse) and Mrs. Graves are dead.

Fifteen others, who were found without clothing except gunnysacks, escaped by wading into the center of the creek and keeping only their heads above water. A crowd of refugees from Allan & White's mill near Centuria, had a similar experience, finding themselves surrounded by fires they fled to the creek, where they dipped the children constantly, while the adults jumped in occasionally. By this procedure, and keeping wrapped in blankets, they were able to endure the heat until the fire came near, when they abandoned the stream and went into the center of a small meadow surrounded by burning timber. Here they found themselves preceded by many other fugitives from the flames—rabbits, bears and deer, all equally panic-stricken. The meadow proved a safe refuge until the flames died away.

Tacoma, Wash., Sept. 15.—Absence of wind has prevented the fires from spreading into new territory, and the blanket of smoke which overhangs the state is gradually drifting away.

The fire has been the greatest in the state's history. Elma, although badly scorched, has been saved; likewise Enumclaw. Shelton is out of danger. The fate of Mattlock, in Mason county, is unknown.

At Plum, near Olympia, Elan Collins was gored by a bull that had become maddened by smoke and darkness, and an Olympia physician rode through fire to save Collins' life.

Captain W. J. Bryant, inspector of hulls, and A. P. Stockwell, an American lumberman, had a thrilling twelve-mile ride through the blazing forests Thursday afternoon, barely escaping with their lives. Fifteen minutes after they passed through New London that village caught fire and was soon destroyed. They were saved by their team of thoroughbreds, which kept just ahead of the rapidly advancing fire.

Portland, Ore., Sept. 15.—For the most part the forest fires in this vicinity have burned themselves out. Hundreds of people in this and adjacent counties have been made homeless, and the loss in timber and farm houses will be many hundreds of thousands of dollars. There is no prospect of rain and until it does some conditions will not improve.

Sixty people in the town of Springwater, Clackamas county, were forced to flee for their lives, and a fine timber belt is destroyed. Bridges were attacked and residences threatened in South Portland. The sawmill of the Bridal Veil Lumbering company and the whole town of Palmer, situated twenty miles east of Bridal Veil, in this county, has been destroyed.

A woman was burned to death near Vancouver, Wash., and a woman and a child are missing. Mills, lumber and timber to the value of \$1,000,000 were destroyed in Chehalis county, Washington. The damage near Lents, Ore., amounts to over \$25,000.

WANTED TO MOB SPURIOUS MESSIAH.

London, Sept. 15.—Extraordinary scenes occurred yesterday at Clapham, where nearly 5,000 persons attempted to mob a former Episcopalian clergyman named Piggott, who is now the leader of a sect called the "Agapemontes."

Piggott last week announced himself as the Messiah. Exposures in the newspapers, heightened public interest in the matter to such a point that Piggott was only taken from the mob by the efforts of mounted police.

LOST THE CHAM \$25,000 FOR 18 DAYS' BOARD.

Paris, Sept. 14.—The shah left Paris yesterday for St. Petersburg. The railway company mobilized fifty-seven trolleys to convey his baggage, which weighed twenty tons, to the train. The shah's total hotel bill was \$25,000 for eighteen days.

LEFT IN DISGUISE.

Newport, Sept. 15.—William K. Vanderbilt, Jr., left Newport last night and said as he went that he would never come back except on short visits to his relatives.

Mr. Vanderbilt has been annoyed for some time at the treatment he says he has received from the city officials in regard to his automobile speeding.

SAID PRESIDENT WILL SEND ULTIMATUM TO HAYTI.

Washington, Sept. 15.—It is reported here that the president has decided to send an ultimatum to Hayti within a very short time.

The cause of this decision is said to be that the United States does not want to run the risk of becoming involved with some European power by reason of the repeated outbreaks in Hayti, a spectacular instance of which was the sinking by Germany of Admiral Killck's vessel, the Crete-Pierrot.

It is seen here that occasions may arise in which the forcible entry of foreign war vessels into the harbors of republics like Hayti may demand intervention by the United States and a foreign war as a probable consequence. The story is that the government will notify Hayti that peace must be declared and that it must be put on a firm basis. If those assurances cannot be had, it is said that the United States will feel justified in intervention by sending a squadron to Hayti to carry out the program.

It is, of course, understood that intervention, if not acceptable to the Haytiens, would end in a war and the outcome of that would not be clear, possibly annihilation.

The report then goes further to the effect that an intimation has been made to some high officers of the navy department to be ready for an emergency with reference to Hayti.
