New Use for Refined Paraffine Wax.

A new and important use for Refined
Paraffine Wax seems to have been dis-
covered by a prominent resident of
Ohio, living near Lancaster, who had
two trees badly damaged by storm, one
being a maple and the other an apple.
In each case a large limb was broken
down from the trunk, but still attached
to it. The limbs were propped up and
fastened securely with straps very
much as a broken leg might be fastened
with splints, and then melted refined
wax poured into and over all the cracks.
The "surgical operation" was entirely

the trees, prevented the depredations
of insects, and the limbs seem thus far
to be perfectly re-attached to the trees.

Power of Justice.

SALEM, Sept. 29.—Judge Boise de-
cided a point of law new in this state
when he rendered a decision holding
that a Justice of the Peace has power
to set aside the verdict of a jury because
it is not in accordance with the law and
evidence. In a Justice Court it has al-
ways been the rule that a jury is judge
both of the law and of the evidence.

The legislature of 1899 passed an act
giving Justice Courts the same power
over verdicts, judgements, etc., as are
possessed by courts of record. Under
the authority of this law, Justice of the
Peace, E. D. Horgan, set aside the ver-
dict of a jury in a recent case tried by
him, and the party aggrieved went to
the Circuit Court on a writ of review.

Judge Boise sustained Justice Horgan
and sent the case back for a new trial.
Under the ruling Justices of the
Peace will have much more authority
in the trial of cases than they have
ever had before.
