ARE HUNTING SULTANS

POTENTATE CAPTURED AND THEN TURNED LOOSE.

Second Expedition Against the Moro Forts at Maciu Comprises Infantry, Cavalry, Artillery and Engineers, In Command of Captain Pershing.

Manila, Sept. 23.—A second expedition against the Moro position at Maciu, island of Mindanao, left Camp Vicars yesterday. It is in command of Captain John J. Pershing of the Fifteenth Infantry and is composed of a battalion of infantry, three sections of artillery and a detachment of engineers. The engineers will construct a pontoon bridge across the swamp which flanks the land side of the Maciu forts. This work will occupy several days.

Rafts probably will be used to attack the fort from the lake side. The actual date of the assault upon the forts is indefinite.

The sultan of Bulig was made a prisoner by the column under Captain Eli A. Holmnick of the Tenth Infantry, which last week destroyed the Bulig forts. The sultan was subsequently released. He furnished the Americans with horses to transport their supplies.

The first expedition that left Camp Vicars to operate against the Maciu Moros was composed of a battalion of infantry, two troops of cavalry and two guns, which started September 17. The position at Maciu was found to be strong and the attack was delayed in order to improve the methods of approach and to receive reinforcements.

The fort at Maciu is on an elevation close to the lake shore and flanked by swamps which virtually make it an island. The sultan of Maciu regards his position as impregnable and has refused to treat with Captain Pershing. Captain Pershing is confident of his ability to capture the Moro forts without serious losses.

FROM FOREIGN LANDS

A storm burst over the district of Santa Maria, Sicily, Sunday, and many houses were destroyed. The story weather continues generally throughout Sicily. It is now believed that 60 persons perished at Modica during the tornado. In one instance a family of ten persons was drowned in bed.

Gossips do not intend to permit Lord Rosebery to remain a bachelor. A year ago they engaged him to a royal princess. Now they insist he is engaged to an "Anglo-American lady who is the richest widow in society." Rosebery's intimates, however, declare he has no intention of providing his sons and daughters with a step-mother.

King Edward's responsibilities as a grandparent will be increased next month. The Princess of Wales is proceeding slowly from Scotland to Sandringham, and the stock will soon be hovering over the chimneys of the famous home of royalty. The king is desirous of having all his grandchildren born in Sandringham, his favorite residence.

Andrew Carnegie's philanthropy is at present quite overshadowed by that of Lord Mount Stephen and Lord Strathcona, whose generous contributions have practically perfected the king's plans to free the London hospitals from debt. The president and committee of King Edward's hospital fund have just announced that they have received from these two great Canadian magnates an endowment which at present produces \$80,000 a year and is likely to increase in value.

Balmoral has been scandalized because King Edward has caused the removal of John Brown, his mother's famous gladiator, from the lawn of the castle. The statue has been removed to the front of the Browns' house, where it is not visible from any castle wall. Although the king shocked the castle of Gillies by depositing the statue of Brown, he aroused their admiration by wearing kilts, not for a ring to expose his bare legs, but for a bling winds that have been nipping the moors since he went to Scotland.

One of the features of the German army maneuvers just concluded, and which was particularly interesting to American visitors was the parade of the Berlin garrison through the streets of the city, in which the Kaiser's three sons took part. The youths marched on the left of three advance files, each wearing a heavily plumed helmet. The crown prince is twenty, slender and straight. Prince Eitel Friedrich, nineteen, appeared nearly as tall as his elder brother. Prince Joachim, in spite of his extreme youth, eleven years, marched as sturdily as any veteran in the parade.

Twenty-six persons have been killed and a score of people have been injured as the result of an accident to an express train running from Lille to Paris. The train left the rails while crossing the switch at Arleux, where it did not stop and while going at great speed. The locomotive and tender were upset and smashed to pieces. About fifty persons were injured, and many of them who are suffering from broken limbs and fractured skulls are not likely to survive. The bodies of sixteen men and two girls, all French, were taken out of the wreck.

The situation in Ireland is approaching a crisis, and there is reason to believe the government fears violence during the winter's proscussions. In Dublin the suspension of trial by jury has aroused a fierce resentment among all classes of Irish. Day by day the state of affairs is brought nearer akin to those that prevailed during the turbulent times. Premier Balfour's secretary, Wyndham, continues his policy of locking up voters under the education bill. It seems probable that, when parliament reassembles the ranks of the Irish party will be seriously diminished by imprisonment. Not only are the Catholic south and west of Ireland shaken, but the Protestant Ulster farmers. The latter were staunch supporters of the castle until they were aroused. Their grievance is based upon the fact that, although they supported the government, they have received no concessions from the landlords, and are paying twenty and thirty per cent more rent than farmers in the west and south of Ireland. They have awakened to the fact that they have been used as political catspaws, and therefore they are most bitter against the government, and there need be no surprise if Protestant Ulster this winter contributes to the record of violence in Ireland as many shootings of landlords as any of the Catholic provinces.

By the amalgamation of the British and American tobacco trusts the company will control the trade of the world. "We are decidedly pleased at the outcome of the negotiations," said one of the high officials of the American Tobacco company. Not only are we pleased with the good business deal, out of which we made several millions, but we are pleased because the combination means a real amalgamation of interests instead of buying off all opposition at a price which appears to the opponent to be a profitable figure. Such a real working combination of American and English interests as has been effected will in any line of business unquestionably dominate the trade of the world. The capital of the British-American company will be \$30,000,000. Mr. Duke will be president. While it is convenient to register as an English company and have its headquarters in London, we have named twelve directors and the Imperial company's interests have named six. Their respective financial interests are two-thirds American and one-third English. We have named three directors for the board of the Imperial company, which will hereafter confine itself to the United Kingdom, while the British-American company goes in for the world's trade, outside of the United States, Cuba and the United Kingdom. The Cuban provision insures for America the cigar business of the island, of which we now control 80 per cent. The Imperial company throws the new company into colonial business, so with our trade outside the United States the British-American company starts with a ready-made annual business of 7,000,000,000 cigarettes alone."

SEATTLE'S MAYOR FOUNDED IN THE WILDERNESS.

Seattle, Wash., Sept. 29.—The last mayor of Seattle, the Hon. Thomas J. Humes, was found sitting on a log in the jungles of Squak slough Saturday morning. In his one hand he held a rabbit and across his knees rested a rifle. Hatless, the coat sleeve covering his only arm gone, his face and snow white locks blackened from the charred embers of a burned tree. In the hollow of which he had slept for two nights; the seat of his trousers torn, and a slit in the left leg the chief executive of the metropolis of the northwest presented a picturesque sight. It was about 8 o'clock in the morning that his rescuers came upon him. There were seventy-two of them, composed mostly of the mayor's personal friends, political advisors and city officials. It was a joyous meeting. Seven men reached the mayor almost simultaneously. All seven fell upon the veteran hunter, and they almost shook his arm out of its socket. Before any one had time to ask a question or even take him by the hand, he blurted out:

"What are you fellows making so much noise about. Don't you know you will scare all the game out of the country?" and then as every one gathered about him and everybody began to talk at once, he shut them all up by saying:

"Well, I got some game anyway, and with that he held up a little rabbit. It was about half grown.

Mayor Humes made a strong bid for the prohibition vote at that time. He had spent two nights in the woods with the rain falling in torrents. He had lived in the interim on salal berries and herbs.
