LOOKING TO THE LABOR FEDERATION

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Oct. 13.—President Mitchell arrived at strike headquarters from New York shortly before 10 o'clock Saturday. He steadfastly declined to talk of his New York trip for publication.

"I think the best interests of the operators, of the miners and the public will be served by my remaining silent," he said.

Mr. Mitchell's attention was called to the letter of Vice-President Wilcox of the Delaware and Hudson to President Roosevelt, in which he maintains that the Miners' Union is an illegal organization. The strike leader hesitated to say anything for a moment and then replied:

"The Miners' Union is organized along the same lines as all the labor unions in the country. If the miners' organization is illegal, so are all the others, and I say our union is not illegal."

There was a rumor that President Mitchell would go to Washington, but he denied it.

The leaders of the strikers are now looking to the American Federation of Labor to help them in their fight. The Miners' Union is the strongest trade in that organization, and they now feel that the Federation should come out and take an open active interest in the struggle. There is a report here that this will be done in the form of an appeal for assistance to all the labor organizations in the country.

MANILA TO HAVE A NEW STEAMER SERVICE.

New York, Oct. 13.—From an official source it has been learned that the American Asiatic Steamship Company, which was recently formed by capitalists interested in the China Development Company, has absorbed the Philippine steamship line, which is operated by the Philippines Transportation and Construction Company. The steamship business of the latter company will be entirely absorbed, but the Philippine end of the business will be continued by the old company.

The Philippine Transportation and Construction Company has been operating a monthly service to the Philippines. In addition to this service the company owns and operates nineteen steel steamers and barges of 400 tons each. These were formerly operated on the lakes and the Erie canal, and were taken apart and transported to the Philippines for use between the islands of the Philippine archipelago. The first steamer, the Gibraltar, of the new company, is scheduled to sail from New York on October 25.

ADVANCES REPULSED.

Manila, Oct. 13.—The sultan of Bacolod, Mindanao, has rejected the friendly overtures of General Sumner, commander of the American forces in Mindanao, in a defiant letter, in which he invites war. The sultan says: "The sultan of Calicut desires war forthwith. He wishes to maintain the religion of Mohammed. Cease sending letters. What we want is war. We do not desire your friendship."

Friendly Moros report that the sultan of Bacolod is fortifying his stronghold.

SHOULD BUILD OUR VESSELS

ADMIRAL BOWLES SAYS WE
SHOULD USE OUR PLANTS
FOR NAVAL BUILDING.

Washington, Oct. 12.—Rear Admiral Bowles, chief of the naval bureau of construction, in his annual report to the secretary of the navy, points out that the policy of congress for some years past has been against the construction of new vessels in the navy yard, and as a result the development and improvement of the yards in matters such as quay walls, slips, location of buildings, etc., have not been generally directed toward efficient arrangement for shipbuilding. The admiral is of the opinion that it should be the policy of the navy department to arrange the navy yard plants that they will be efficient for shipbuilding, which is in reality, he says, one of the most important functions they may be required to perform.

"Progress upon new vessels under construction during the last year has not been satisfactory," he says. All the larger vessels have been delayed by non-delivery of structural steel, while the vessels building in San Francisco were set back by the ten months' strike and the hold-out of the workmen at Seattle prevented any actual progress on the structure of the hull of the battleship Nebraska, building there.

The delay in the deliveries of armor for the battleships Maine, Missouri and Ohio and the monitors Arkansas, Florida, Nevada and Wyoming has retarded the completion of these vessels, concurrently with other causes. The inability of shipbuilders to obtain a sufficient force of skilled workers also has been in many cases an important factor in the slow progress.

The ships added to the navy during the past year are the battleship Illinois and the torpedo craft Decatur, Perry, Preble, Biddle, Thornton and Wilkes.

FAST EXPRESS HELD UP BY THREE MASKED ROBBERS

London, Neb. 13.—Three masked men held up Burlington train No. 41, the Pacific Coast express, four miles west of Lincoln shortly before 2 o'clock Saturday. They used explosives on the express car, shattering it badly, and after wrecking the safe, rifled it of its contents, securing an amount thought to be \$1500.

Train No. 41 reaches Lincoln at 12:55 a. m. and leaves for the north-west ten minutes later. It was a few minutes late Saturday, and was in charge of Conductor Lyman and Engineer Clayburg. On the crest of a hill midway between the city and the town of Woodlawn the engineer saw a red light waved across the track, and brought the train to a standstill. Two men sprang quickly into the cab and covered Clayburg and his fireman with revolvers. They lost no time in giving their orders and were just as promptly obeyed. The express car was cut from the remainder of the train and run ahead a short distance. They found the door locked, and after commanding Messenger William Lupton to open it and getting no response, fired two or three shots into the car. The door was then opened. A heavy charge of dynamite on the safe literally tore it to pieces.

Fourteen packages said to contain \$100 each were taken, together with other valuables. The two men who were in the car politely bade the trainmen good morning, jumped from the car and disappeared in the darkness. The passengers were not molested nor were the trainmen asked for their belongings.

While the robbery in the express car was going on a third robber walked alongside the track by the passenger coaches, firing his revolver occasionally to keep inquisitive passengers quiet. Brakeman Moore, who alighted from the rear coach to go ahead, found a revolver pushed into his face with a warning to go back where he belonged. He ran the four miles to the Lincoln yards and was the first to give the alarm. The robbers were cool, talkative and apparently experts. The train was run back to Lincoln, the wrecked express taken out, and at 4 o'clock it resumed its journey, the original crew going out with it. Following it was an engine carrying Chief of Police Heagland, Detective Malone and two bloodhounds and three police officers. At the scene of the hold-up the hounds took the scent and the pursuit of the robbers was actively begun. Every town and village marshal and every county sheriff in southeastern Nebraska has been notified of the robbery and told to be on the watch. The Adams Express Company officials say its loss is not large.

OLD LANDMARK TO GO.

New York, Oct. 12.—It has been decided that the old Hall of Records in this city, which was used as a prison in the days of the revolution, shall be removed to make way for the Rapid Transit tunnel. If possible, the Historical Society will get possession of parts of the building, in the hope that they may be put together again on another site. Much sentiment surrounds the old building, and it was only after representations that the building might collapse, owing to the tunnel work, that Supreme Court Judge Leventritt decreed its removal.

DANNY MAHER WINS IMPERIAL PRODUCE PLATE.

New York, Oct. 13.—At the Kempton Park meeting the rich Imperial Produce plate of 3000 sovereigns, for 2-year-olds, has been won, says a dispatch from London, by Sir Daniel Cooper's Flotsam, 7 to 4 on the favorite, with the American jockey, Danny Maher, in the saddle.

Sir E. Vincent's Countermarch, a 20-to-1 chance, was second. W. C. Whitney's Zaza, with "Skeets" Martin up, was third. The king's colors were carried in the race by Persistence, but the youngster finished nearer last than first.

ATTEMPTED TO MURDER WOMAN HE WAS TO WED.

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—A wooing that was launched by a strange coincidence in names and that was pressed to the point of engaging a minister to tie the nuptial knot came to a sudden and dramatic close last night when Joseph Lucido drew a revolver from his pocket and sent two bullets after the woman he had vowed to love. Fortunately both shots flew wide, and this morning a warrant was issued by Police Judge Conlan charging Lucido with assault to murder.

Lucido is a man of some means, it is said, employing many fishermen and controlling a number of smacks on the bay. Some time ago he was introduced to Miss Mary Lucido, who was not related to him, and the novelty in names inspired the courtship, which was soon pressed to the last stages. Mary and Joseph agreed to wed, according to the statement made by the fair young woman to Judge Conlan today, and a date was set for the happy events.

Then Lucido and his prospective bride decided to establish their future home in a cozy cottage at 8 Vandewater street and the place was fitted up neatly, even to the dainty finishing touches which were given it by the future Mrs. Lucido. There was furniture and fittings and all sorts of trinkets loaded into the place.

A lover's quarrel ensued which later developed into the fight when the refused to allow any of her effects removed, and then the shooting occurred. Lucido has fled to Black Diamond, in Martinez county, it is said.

NEW YORK PRESS FEEDERS WANT MORE WAGES.

New York, Oct. 13.—A strike of 1200 press feeders employed in the book and job-printing trade of this city has involved 550 pressmen and has, it is stated, nearly tied up the business in a large number of plants. The strike may prevent many magazines and periodicals from coming out on time. Some time ago many of the feeders demanded an advance in wages from \$12 to \$14 a week, and struck to enforce them. Then it was decided, after several conferences with the employers to make a demand for the advance in wages in all of the union shops. The employers refused the demand and the strike followed.

MASKED BURGLARS ARE BUSY IN KENTUCKY.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 13.—Chinn of the firm of Chinn & Todd, dry goods merchants of this city, one of the most prominent business men and ex-Confederate soldiers in Kentucky, was shot to death by two masked burglars early Saturday in his bedroom at his home in this city. His son Asa, who heard the noise, rushed to his father's rescue and opened fire on the burglars through a closed door with a rifle. The burglars returned the fire, and Asa is probably mortally wounded. Citizens and police are searching for the murderers, but no clew has yet been found.
