New a Halibut Trust.

Tacoma.—The International Fisheries company, which was organized here a few days ago, has absorbed the Tacoma Fish company and the Pacific Halibut company. The new company will control almost the entire halibut trade of the Pacific coast.

An Oregon Suicide.

Portland.—The body of J. W. Fuller, a well-known business man of this city, who disappeared from his residence about a month ago, was found in the underbrush lining the canyon road near the city on Saturday by a party of young boys. Mr. Fuller had committed suicide. A revolver being found beside the body and an ugly wound through the head.

Mother Rescues Her Son.

Vancouver, B. C.—Nine-year-old William Graham fell into the water while playing on a log boom. His screams attracted the attention of his mother, who plunged into the stream to rescue him. Estimates for the Army.

Washington.—Secretary Root has just completed his estimates for the next fiscal year and he has succeeded in effecting a marked reduction in the amount of money required for the support of the army and war department. Exclusive of river and harbor appropriations, over which the department has little control, as they are directed largely by congress, the secretary said that the estimates for each of the last five fiscal years shows an annual average increase from the estimates of the previous year of about \$44,500,000. The estimates for the next year show a net decrease of \$31,420,000 compared with the estimates submitted for the current fiscal year.
