To Resume Boring.

New Cattle Company.

W. P. Heryford, J. D. Heryford and F. M. Green have filed articles of incorporation under the name of the Heryford Land & Cattle Co. The capital stock is \$110,000, divided into 1100 shares of the par value of \$100. The new corporation will deal principally in cattle, but do not confine themselves to that kind of stock. The Heryford Bros. are well known cattle growers of Lake County, and Mr. Green has had long experience in the stock business in this county, having for the past few years been foreman and manager of the Cox & Clark cattle ranches in Lake and Modoc Counties.

A Complicated Suit.

A very important and complicated suit in equity is now pending before the circuit court in Jacksonville and F. M. Calkins, court reporter, has been taking testimony therein. The suit is brought to settle the dower interest of Mary H. Hanley in the estate of the late John A. Hanley, her husband. During his life time Mr. Hanley gave a mortgage on certain property owned by him, to which mortgage his wife was not a party. The mortgage was foreclosed, the property sold by execution and was purchased by Mrs. E. J. Kubli. At the time the mortgage was made a wife's dower interest in the property of her husband, consisted of one-third of the rents, issues and profits, but at the time of J. A. Hanley's death the law had been changed, giving the widow a one-half interest.

The suit is brought to determine which law shall govern in this case—the law in force at the time of the making of the mortgage, or that in force at

the time of the mortgagor's death. The plaintiff claims a one-half interest, while the defendants claim the law giving the widow one-third as a dower interest is the one which should apply. The decision will be watched with interest, as this is likely not the only similar case in the state.

At the time the mortgage was foreclosed the case attracted considerable attention. K. K. Kubli, the mortgagor, brought suit for foreclosure and, while the case was pending in the circuit court, he died. Mrs. Kubli was substituted as plaintiff after quite a battle between the legal lights of the Jacksonville County bar.
