### AND RECIPROCITY

Roosevelt Makes Splendid Impression on People of Minneapolis and St. Paul-Preparations for His Reception in California.

Minneapolis, April 6. - President Roosevelt was given a cordial recept ion Saturday from the time of his arrival in St. Paul until his departure from Minneapolis for the West at 11 o'clock p. m.

Armory hall, at the University of Minneapolis, where he spoke in the evening, was crowded to its limited capacity. The speech, which was on the traiff and reciprocity, brought out enthusiasm, the president treating ex-tensively on the Cuban situation, declaring that we must have military control of the southern waters, and saying that the United States is the most prosperous nation ever known. At the close of his speech many of the audience rushed forward to shake the president's hand, but this was denied Thousands of persons barred the
