Miller Wins in Supreme Court.

The suit tried in Judge Hanna's court last fall, wherein heirs of J. G. Grossman were plaintiffs and J. W. Miller was defendant, was decided in favor of Miller. An appeal was taken to the Supreme court and the decision of Judge Hanna has been affirmed by Chief Justice Moore.

This was a suit to set aside a deed given in escrow by Jacob G. Grossman, of Medford, in favor of J. W. Miller. The deed covered lots 11 and 12, block 60, in Medford, and was deposited in the Jackson County Bank, to be delivered immediately after Grossman's death, provided that Miller faithfully cared for Grossman and furnished him food, clothing and medicine and give him decent burial at death. The deed was deposited May 9, 1899, and Grossman then went to live with Miller. On July 1, 1899, he went to the Soldiers' Home, at Santa Monica, California, where he remained until the time of his death, August 17, 1899. The expenses of his burial were borne by the Soldiers' Home. The deed was then delivered to Miller.

The plaintiffs in this suit are heirs of Grossman. They alleged that Grossman was incompetent to enter into a contract; that he was deceived by Miller, and that Miller did not faithfully perform his agreement. The suit was decided in the court below in favor of defendant. On appeal the supreme court holds that the evidence shows that Grossman was mentally capable of making the agreement; that Miller performed his agreement so far as Grossman permitted; that Grossman went to the Soldiers' Home of his own accord and not because of any neglect on the part of Miller, and that Miller, having performed his agreement so far as permitted, he was entitled to the deed. Upon the objection made by the heirs that Miller permitted Grossman to be buried at public expense, the opinion says:

"That his body was consigned to earth by representatives of a nation grateful for sacrifices made by its defenders in times of peril, and that the sepulchral rites were performed by comrades whose common experience of danger and privation united them in a bond of sympathy, demonstrates that he received the greatest honor and the most loving tribute that could be paid to a loyal soldier. If he had died at Medford his body could not probably have been given better interment, and as the costs of travel, residence and burial, though not defrayed by Miller, were not imposed as a charge upon Grossman's estate, the plaintiffs, as his heirs, suffered no injury."

Meader, G. A. Hoyer, J. A. Perry, J. McPherson, T. L. Taylor and J. Merley.
