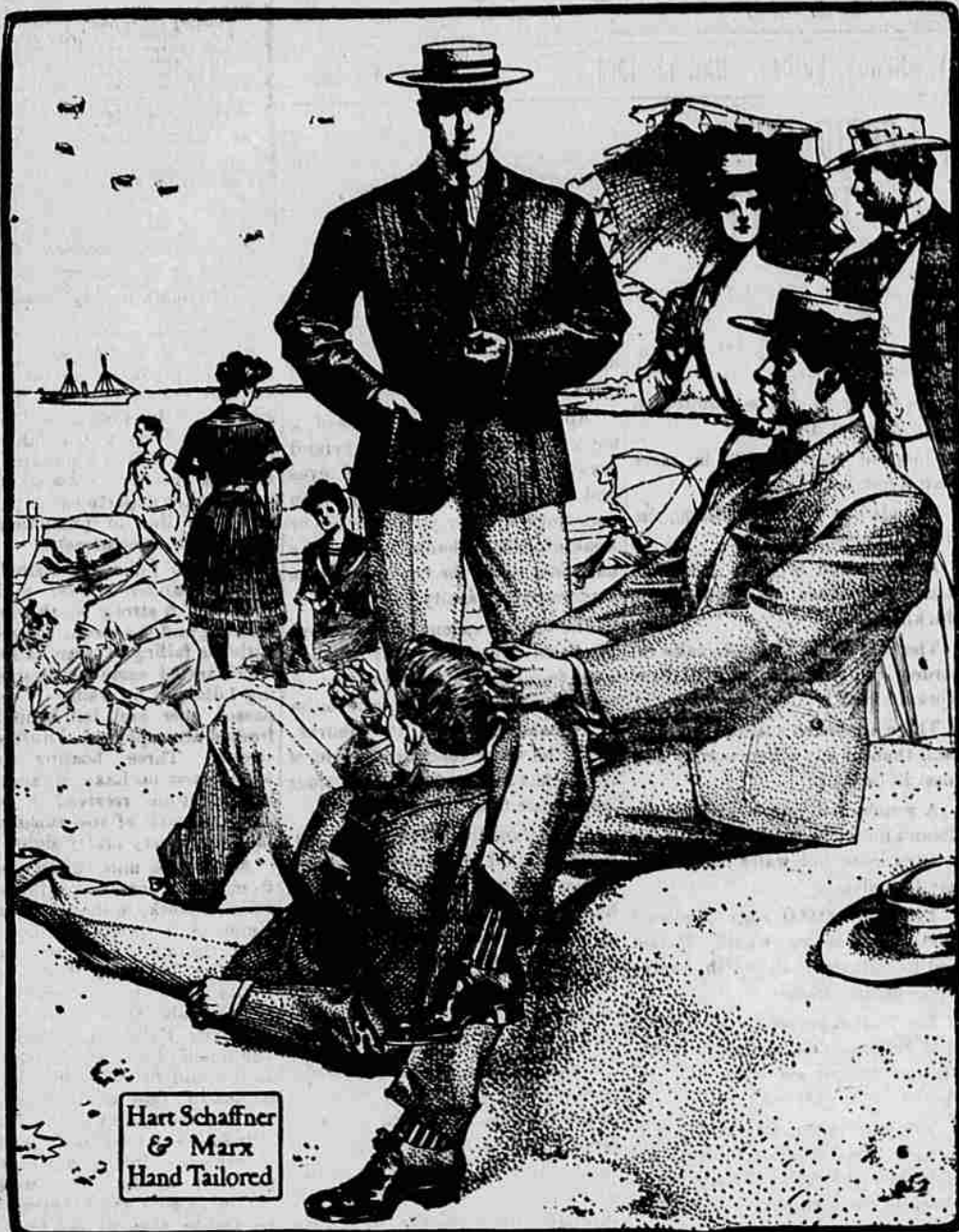

R. & N. train known as the "Spokane Flyer." Fortunately there were no lives lost, but it was not the fault of the fiend or the idiot, as the case might be, that placed the obstruction on the track. The engine and baggage car went into the river, and the engineer and fireman had very narrow escapes. It seems to us that no punishment could be to great for anyone who would deliberately endanger lives of several hundred people. The placing of the spike was evidently deliberate, the thoughtless idiot would be as likely to lay the obstruction on the outer rail, where it would not do so much damage, that it was placed on the inner rail shows calculating devilishness which is deserving of but one reward.

A KANSAS paper gets off the following: In reply to the question, "who pays the expenses of the President's junketing trip?" PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT has completed his journey of 14,000 miles through the United States. He has made 265 speeches to all classes of people, of all shades of religious and political belief, but

on no occasion was there the slightest incident to mar the pleasure of the Presidents journey. He was received everywhere with the honor due his position as Chief executive of the Nation, and in nohing has the American people shown their superiority as a nation and a people than in the hearty greeting extended the President by all classes, not because of his high rank, but because we all must respect an honest, straight forward, manly man, in whatever station of life we may find him. The long ride he made in Montana with out apparent fatigue and his evident enjoyment of the ride shows one side of Roosevelt's character, the incident at Salem, when he left his carriage to speak to and kiss a little crippled girl shows another. Theodore Roosevelt's heart is as tender as it is brave.

LANDIS TO BE BROUGHT BACK.

Governor Chamberlain upon information of District Attorney George M. Brown has issued a requisition upon the Governor of the Indian Territory for the return to this state of M. D. Landis, who is held as a fugitive from justice in the town of Collinsville, Cherokee Nation, and is wanted in Coquille City, Coos county, to answer to the charge of murder in the first degree. Landis is accused of having on May 23, 1901, laid in wait for one Jesse B. Eudalley, shot and killed him for his money and then buried him. When the dead man's body was discovered and Landis was suspected he fled. Sheriff Stephen Gallier was appointed state's agent to serve the requisition and bring the accused man back to justice.

(Several years ago Landis was engaged in the business of locating timber land claims, Marshfield, Coos county, being his headquarters. He would take strangers into the woods, singly, on the pretense of locating them, and if inquiry was made about their failure to return, would say they had left the country, and he would have their baggage, if any, forwarded to eastern cities, as the fancy might strike him. Finally about two years ago, when the search for his victims was bringing the crime of murder near his door, he

cluded the officers and fled the state. As near as may be learned, fourteen men who went into the woods with Landis are missing, murdered, it is thought, without doubt.—Eugene Guard.)

About the time that Landis disappeared, M. F. Parker, who had known the criminal in Lane county, learned that a man answering his description had been seen in the Elk creek country, and he traced him into the Klamath country where he lost him.
