### A Real Boy.

"Where did I get my copy of 'Bob'?" queried Miss Stockton. "Why, I studied the character long before I played the part. I just dote on boys; in fact, I've studied them all my life." And the youngster—beg your pardon, the little woman, made this remark without so much as the quiver of an eyelash, and spoke as earnestly and as seriously as if she were unaware that woman's mission is to make a lifelong study of men. "So you think I'm a real boy? That's the nicest compliment I've ever had paid me. That's just the way I try to play the part to make people think I'm a real boy and not a woman playing the sacrifice of my hair in order to be realistic; and it was such pretty, curly hair too," and the accompanying sigh was a real womanly one. But the next moment she was the boy again, chatting vivaciously about her work, her hopes and her plans. Her hands plunged as naturally into her pockets as any boy's and there were other boyish tricks and poses that made it difficult to believe that Bob is the same old stage as on. Perhaps skirts might make a difference, but in the Bob make-up Miss Stockton doesn't step out of the picture. "I try to make Bob a genuine boy; one that the boys in the gallery will endorse and believe in. That doesn't mean that he should be ragged and dirty, or a tough, low down kid. My observation of street boys, newsboys at least, who have any ginger in them, don't go about with besmudged faces, unkempt hair and repulsive clothes. There may be a few tears in the clothes, but on the whole a wide-awake hustling street kid keeps himself cleanly in manners and appearance. It's part of his stock in trade. He isn't getting customers if he is foul mouthed, or if he looks as if he hadn't had a bath in years. I want Bob to please not only the gallery kids, but be one with whom the downstairs people will sympathize. You ought to see how the kids chase me though; they wait for me at the stage door and follow me about until I get really embarrassing at times. But bless 'em, they're all right and they're loyal little friends."

Of course, you know that I was the original "Tags" in "A County Fair," and have played similar roles for several years. And I've played "Little Lord Fauntleroy," and, of course, that helped in playing boy's roles. I've never had the starring fever, though I've had offers a plenty. Until this season I have never allowed my name to be featured. I believe in working for the good of the company and the good of the show. The better the company, the better the show. I shall keep on playing boy's part if I can get anything to suit me. It's so hard to get a good play, but I am on the look out for good plays always."

Miss Stockton is an energetic little woman, and the secret of her success is due to the enthusiasm with which she enters into her roles. She believes in ginger. She is also quite a business woman having managed her own company with a signal success. The role of "Bob" in "A Little Outcast" she likes better than any role she has ever played for it is full of pathos. As she says, "I just like to get right down at their heart strings and tug away. There is so much sympathy for you if you can stir their hearts."
