You don't find such oranges in the market, they are too large to pay to ship them, and the only way you can get them is to have a friend in the business. Yes, Dial is doing first-rate in that country and sends regards to his friends here."

A Medford Prune Grower:—"The prune-growers of this vicinity are figuring on organizing for the purpose of 'blowing in' some of the money we get for our fruit this year. Not that we got so much, but because, owing to the conditions of the market, we were pretty thankful to get anything at all. The fact is, that there was such a big crop of fruit all over the United States and especially in sections where usually a large amount of dried fruit is sold, that there is hardly any demand in those sections for our product."

Frozen to Death.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., Jan. 9.—A young man named A. E. Bennett was found frozen to death in the woods near Callahan's ranch, in Alkali Valley, Saturday. Bennett left here December 31st on horseback with provisions and mail for his homestead.
