#### Klamath County News.

**Klamath Falls Express.**  
R. D. Maplesden, the agent for a Salem nursery, recently made a visit to the valley and took orders for quite a number of fruit trees. Since the fine crop of apples grown last year more people have faith in fruit growing in this region.

Bids will be received until Monday, May 1st, by Alva Lewis, county treasurer, for the sale of bonds of school district No. 1, (Klamath Falls) to the amount of \$13,500 interest at 6 percent and redeemable after ten years or before twenty years.

The reclamation service here has a quantity of sugar beet seed which will be distributed to parties who will plant them, grow the beets and leave a sample of the product in the fall with the service. These samples will be sent to Washington for analysis.

The Electric Light Company was notified Tuesday by the secretary of war that any diversion of water by it from Link river for the purpose of generating electric power, or for any other purpose, would be illegal. The company would have saved itself considerable trouble and expense if it had asked permission of congress or the secretary of war to divert water from this navigable system of waterways instead of proceeding on the assumption that such diversion would not be interfered with.

Klamath Falls Rebuilders.  
J. G. Pierce left Sunday morning for San Francisco, where he will remain for two weeks. From there he will go to his old home at Forestville, New York, where he expects to spend the greater part of the summer.

A. H. Naftzger and W. H. Holabird, of Los Angeles, were in the city the first two days of this week. Mr. Naftzger is the president of the Klamath Development Company, and also one of the buyers of the Wood railroad. Mr. Holabird is also interested in the new railroad and is the gentleman who represented the Development company in inducing the people of Klamath county to raise the \$200,000 bonus.

Engineer Humphrey stated to a Republican representative that there was plenty of money in the reclamation fund to carry out the Klamath project. There was in the fund on July 30, 1904, \$23,270,502.03. The amount remaining unexpended in this fund is \$19,005,886.01. Oregon alone has in the fund \$1,158,782.95. The amount expended to March 31, 1905, was \$80,507.55, leaving a fund available for expenditure of \$4,009,073.40. Since June, 1904, there has been added to the fund from Oregon practically \$2,000,000.

It is expected that during the day injunction papers will be served on the Klamath Canal Company restraining them from taking water from the Upper Klamath lake. The company have not as yet used any water in their irrigation canal, but have been using it in their sluice ditch. They claim that this water is taken from the Upper lake and carried in its entirety to the river or lake below Klamath Falls, and in this way they do not in any way interfere with navigation. The action of the government has, however, placed the matter in the courts, where it will have to be settled.

We have been informed that Captain O. C. Applegate has been designated by the Indian office to go to the Grande Ronde Agency, as soon as he is succeeded at Klamath Agency. To investigate some fifty cases where there is doubt or objections having legal rights to a participation in the distribution of funds received from the sale of tribal lands. The long experience of Captain Applegate in Indian affairs especially fits him for the determining such questions and the department is evidently disposed to avail itself of his services. It will be just forty years next October since the Captain first entered the Indian service. At his new work his compensation will be much better than as superintendent of the Klamath Agency.

#### DIVORCE NOT AN EVIL.

to Declare Susan B. Anthony Before Women's Council.  
Washington, April 15.—Over the bitter protest of Miss Susan B. Anthony the National Council of Women has adopted a resolution pledging the organization to co-operate with church and state to ascertain what are the chief causes which induce or lead up to divorce.

"I do not consider divorce an evil by any means," asserted Miss Anthony who was on her feet before the reading of the resolution had been concluded. "It is just as much a refuge for women married to brutal men as Canada was once a refuge from brutal masters. I will never vote for a resolution that will cut women off from refuge from brutal and despoiling men."

The council adopted formally the anti-polygamy resolution favorably reported previously; also a resolution deploring the horrors of war in general, and particularly the present war in the Far East.
