Forced Japanese to Retire.

St. Petersburg, June 17 .-- General Linevitch in a dispatch to the emperor dated June 15 reports that a Russian turning movement forced the Japanese to retire from Iulantizi June 11 after burning their supplies. Portland, June 17 .- Senator Fulton has announced that President Roose velt would appoint W. W. Cotton of this city United States District Judge to succeed the late Charles B. Bellinger. IS MADE PUBLIC DESIRES PEACE IN THE INTEREST

JAPAN'S REPLY

OF THE WORLD AS WELL AS IN THE INTEREST OF JAPAN

Expected That Three Plenipotentian ies Will be Chosen by Each Side-Ito and Nelldoff the Leaders.

Washington, June 17 .- The follow ing is the text of the Japanese reply to President Roosevelt's identical note to Japan and Russia on the subject of negotiations for peace:

"The imperial government has given to the suggestions of the president of the United States embodied in the note handed to the minister of foreign affairs by the United States ninister on the 9th inst, very serious consideration to which, because of its source and its import, it is justly entitled. Desiring, in the interest of the world, as well as in the interest of Japan, the re-establishment of peace with Russia on terms and conditions that will fully guarantee its stability, the imperial government will, in response to the suggestion of the president, appoint plenipotentiaries of Japan to meet the plenipotentiaries of Russia at such time and place as may be found to be mutually agreeable and convenient for the purpose of negotiat-ing and concluding terms of peace directly and exclusively between the two belligerent powers."

Washington, June 17 .- Following the selection of Washington as the seat of the conference which it is hoped may eventuate in a permanent peace in the Far East, there is a lull in the negotiations.

It was indicated that the selection of the plenipotentiaries will be the next step.

It is now expected that the announcement of the selection of the plenipoentiaries will be promulgated in Washington after the two governments shall have communicated their selections to President Roosevelt.

It is probable that the formal announce ment of the selection will be made here practically coincident with the president's communications to Russin and Japan.

It is learned authoritatively that M. Nelldoff, the Russian ambassador to Paris, will beyone of the plenipotentiaries for the St. Petersburg government, and that Marquis Ito will probably be the principal representative of Japan. Ito's selection is certain provided his health will permit him to participate in the treaty negotiations.

So far as can be ascertained here the number of the plenipotentiaries to be named by each government has not been determined, but it is expected now that the number will not exceed three each.

It is not unlikely that the names of the plenipotentiaries and the time agreed upon for the assembling of the conference will be made next week.


