

WHY PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT OP. POBES PROPOSED COMPACT WITH GREAT BRITAIN.

Treaty of Commerce and Navigation Between Cuba and Great Britain Pending in U. S. Senate.

Havana, Oct. 7 .- Owing to the de welopment of strong opposition to the ten-year-treaty of commerce and navi gation between Cuba and Great Britain the ratification of which is pending in the Senate, the Senate committee on foreign relations yesterday authorized the publication in the government or. of the text of the treaty in order that its provisions may be understood Since the outline of its main conditions the treaty has been the subject of much oriticism in leading newspapers here, which agree with the commercial bodies that its ratification would be inimical to Cuban interests and this criticism has resulted in the publication of a statement by Juan Francisco O'Faddfil, Secretary of State, defending the provisions of the treaty in a general way,

Article III of the treaty prohibits ex port duties from one country to the other country other than those to any other country.

Article V prohibits greater duties on goods imported in British vessels than on those brought in Cuban ships. This latter article apparently checks any project for lowering the duties between the United States and Cuba on goods carried in either Cuban or American vessels. The treaty accordi favored nations treatment with respect to all port tonnage charges.

Article VII provides that any privlleges granted to vessels of a third power in harbors or rivers be extended immediately and unconditionally to either of the contracting powers. Article VIII covers the right of war-

ships and merchantmen to refit and resupply in cases of accident or stress of weather

Article X says:

'Except as regards the duties leviable on imports, the contracting parties agree that in all matters relating to commerce navigation and industry any privilege in favor of immunity of whatever kind, which either party has actually granted or may grant to the citizens or subjects of statements of Emmons and Wright any other State shall be extended im- about his early departure from the mediately and unconditionally to the first meeting of the Senate Commitcitizens or subjects of the other contracting party, it being the intention that the commerce, navigation and industry of each country shall be placed by the other on a perfect equality with the commerce, navigation and industry of the most favored nation.

It is provided that controversies respecting the treaty shall be submitted to arbitrators and an umpire. The treaty is to become applicable to Great Britain's over-sea colonies if any of the latter give notice of intention to adhere thereto within a year. The treaty contains twenty-two articles.

Some of the senators are strongly in favor of ratifying the treaty as a means of showing Cuban independence of the United States, but it is now believed that the strong opposition of President Roosevelt, combined with that of the Spanish commercial element, will prevent ratification.

#### Flying Fish.

Flying fish are very voracious. In their turn they are preyed upon by barracudas, sharks, dolphins, bliffab, redfish and a hundred and one others. Nature has colored the flying fish pro tectively. The back is a deep blue, merging into the blue of the seas they frequent, so that they are invisible a few feet below the surface, while the underneath is a dazzling white, and to a fish that looks upward must merge into the light failing on the sea. In ad dition they possess the unique power of flight. Flying fish are about seven inches long, and the spread of wings is about equal to their length. The "wing" is of thin, gauzy substance, having stiffening sinews, like the fiber of a leaf, to strengthen it.



#### Grace Knives.

There is a curious class of knives of the sixteenth century the blades of which have engraved on one side the musical notes to the benediction of the table, or grace before meat, and on the other the grace after meat. These knives usually went in sets of four, representing a four part harmony of bass, tenor, alto and treble. They were kept in an upright case of stamped cept in an appendix case of stamped leather and were placed before the slugers according to the adaptation of each one to his particular part. As may be supposed, the inactification was usually in Latin. The following speet-men is taken from actual knives of the period. "Fro this beneficia Dema period; "Pro tuis beneficiis Deus, gratias agimus tibi" (For thy good gifts, O God, we thank thee).
