Refractory ores are those that are not free milling, their gold refusing to alloy with mercury in the mortar or in the plates. Ores containing sulphides, tellurides, arsenides, selenides, etc., are refractory.

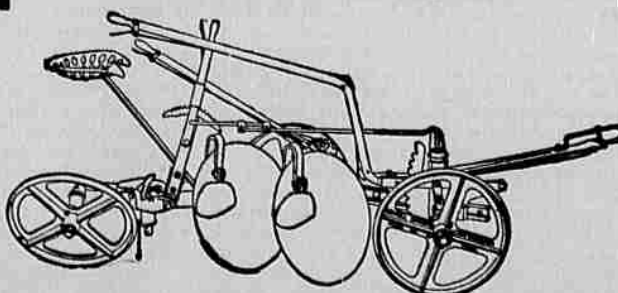
