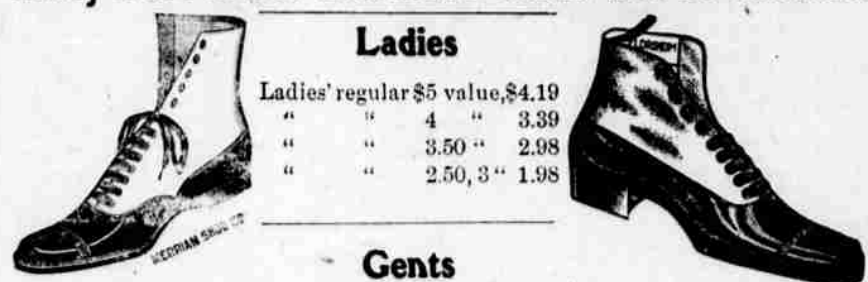

CITY HAPPENINGS.

—Hon. W. J. Bryan, who is making a tour of the country, lecturing principally for the Y. M. C. A., passed through Medford Friday, enroute to California. It was announced that he was to deliver a short address from the rear platform of the train and about 2500 people were out to take a look at the famous Nebraskan and hear what he had to say. He was presented a basket of fine Rogue River Valley apples and his wife was the recipient of a bouquet of Medford flowers, prepared by some of the ladies of the city. Mr. Bryan's talk was of Oregon as an apple country, and he spined that the Webfoot state could not be excelled in this line.
