The clerk of the Idaho supreme court is a woman, Miss Ola Johnson, and she is said to be well fitted for the duties of her position carrying on the work in a most satisfactory manner, which has made her very popular with the legal fraternity. Another position in connection with the supreme court of that state which is occupied by a woman is the librarian of the state library, the present incumbent being Mrs. A. S. Erickson who will give up the office on May 1 to the new appointee, Mrs. Minnie Boston.

The largest postage stamp ever issued measured four inches by two inches, and was the old United States five cent stamp for packages of newspapers. The quarter shilling stamp of Mecklenburg, Schwerin, issued in 1856, is the smallest postage stamp ever produced, being less than one-fourth the size of the British penny stamps issued in the various countries of the world. Some of these are made only for collectors by countries wishing to make money easy.

E. R. Brown, of Revere, Ohio, father of eight sets of twins, has just heard from his eldest son in St. Louis that the latter's wife: several days ago presented to him the sixth set of twins. In each case they are a boy and a girl. Brown says the family was numerically strong long before President Roosevelt promulgated his anti-race-suicide ideas. Mr. Brown, who died 11 years ago, was a full blooded Cherokee Indian. At the World's Fair in 1893 the twins were weighed and aggregated over two tons, the biggest being 320 pounds.

At a party given recently by ladies at a club in Corning, Calif., the gentlemen present were given a slip of paper upon which to write a description of their wife's wedding dress, a prize to be given for the best description. Here is one: "It was gorgeous! All the men went wild and all the women were jealous; it was made of bombazine, with a bonnet frill over the heart; it had a high bosom and low skirt; benighted place was bias up the back, with a full drawn in near the middle, and beautiful gore wound round for ten round limit; it dragged on the floor behind and had ten cream colored streamers of gingham velvet on each side. Oh, it was gorgeous! And people said go through talking about it yet. She was as pretty as a picture, and has been ever since."

The "central" of the telephone office at Pilot Rock, Oregon, is a blind man, named Edward Chapman, and it is said that he attends to the duties of the position in a very satisfactory manner. In his mention of him the Pendleton East Oregonian says: "He makes calls, goes as messenger about the little town and keeps his financial affairs perfectly straight, although he cannot keep a written record. He ties a knot in a twine string for every message call he makes and thus keeps his accounts segregated. He is able to go to any house in Pilot Rock and very seldom misses his way or meets with accident. He operates all the lines between the Pilot Rock and the south part of the county and also the line connecting with Pendleton. Mr. Chapman was reared on Butter creek and is about 38 years of age."

By 1904 the population of Greater New York will be three times what it is now, or, in round numbers, will be 12,000,000, according to Dr. W. H. Guilford, registrar of records of the department of health. According to the same authority of the city's population will be doubled by 1927. The doctor has raised his estimates on the State census of 1900. These show that the growth of the city annually is 3.15 per cent compounded. On June 1, 1905, the population of New York city was 4,014,301; on June 1, 1910, it should be 4,700,442; on Sept. 23, 1927, there should be 8,028,008 persons living within the city limits, and in Oct. 12, 1940, there should be 12,042,912, if the growth continues at the rate it has in the last half decade.

Klamath County News.

Klamath Falls Express.
Klamath Falls has been relegated to the extreme rear in the mail service. The irregular schedule of trains on the Southern Pacific railroad brought about by numerous washouts and slides has caused Manager Abbott, of the Klamath Lake railroad, to favor this city with a tri-weekly mail service, which will continue indefinitely.

Suits have been filed in the United States Circuit Court by Assistant Federal Attorney James Cole of canceled patent to 380 acres of land in Eastern and Central Oregon. The suits are directed against Mont E. Hutchison and Sadie V. Hutchison, James A. Robinson, S. A. D. Puter, and Frederick A. Kriba. Two suits are directed against Puter and Kriba in each of which Puter is sued as a subsequent grantee, and Kriba as the present owner of the lands. It is charged that the lands were obtained from the Government by fraud in the method of acquiring title by patent. The lands are in four separate parcels of 120 acres each.

Klamath Republican.
Considerable excitement was occasioned Sunday evening about nine o'clock, when the Steamer Klamath rounded the signal of distress as she rounded the point on the return trip from Keno. The cause of the signal was the bursting of a fuse in the boiler. Not knowing the extent of the damage Captain Roberts ran the steamer ashore. The wood was taken from the fire box and thrown into the lake, which led to the belief that the boat was on fire. The damage was slight, and the steamer was ready for the run Monday afternoon.

One of the quickest pieces of work done by the police in this city was executed Tuesday evening when Police-man Broderick and deputy Sheriff Schallcock placed Miguel Vera and Frank Hernandez under arrest on the charge of stealing watches and rings from G. Heitkemper, Jr., and H. J. Winters. Winters was an hour had the principal offenders under arrest. Mr. Broderick deserves much credit for the rapidity with which he worked out this case and showed he is the right man in the right place. The accused men entered Winter's store just as he was closing up and asked to see some watches. While the trays were being placed on the counter the men "nipped" seven watches and three rings. They had visited Heitkemper's before this and succeeded in lifting a fine Waltham at this place. The joke was on Heitkemper for he could not believe they could have done it, as he was suspicious of the pair and watched them carefully. When he discovered that he had been fooled, he placed a box of cigars on his counter with the sign, "Don't stay a word I'm it." All of the stolen jewelry was recovered. Vera and Hernandez were bound over to await the action of the grand jury.

R. E. Doane, representing Los Angeles capital, has been taking options on coal lands in Sams Valley. He has been carrying on his work quietly and a good deal of speculation is rife, as to the plans and identity of the interests for which he is acting. Several years ago the railroad people created a stir in that section by bonding coal ground and doing prospect work. About the time the oil burners were put on the road and the coal search was dropped. It is said that every indication points to valuable coal deposits in the Sams Valley and Meadows districts. Frequent out-croppings of a good, steam creating fuel have been found and the present move may lead up to the opening up of a good vein of mercantile fuel, that would find a ready market in Southern Oregon.

Ashtand Tidbits:
A miner of Ashtand, who has been working the Bine Ledge copper mine on Elliott creek, returned Tuesday and reports three men having made a phenomenal gold discovery on one of

the north forks of Elliott creek in Jackson county, about twenty miles southwest of Ashtand. Just before the late heavy storm came on three young men from the East who were working at the Blue Ledge, and who knew next to nothing about gold or prospecting, started out with pick and pan one bright morning to find a gold mine, with every confidence that they could go up one of the creeks in the mountains and pick the gold from some of the crevices in the rocks. The old time miners and prospectors in the camp winked out at one another and let them go. In picking amongst the strata of rock, where no "experienced" prospector or mining expert would stop to even look, they struck a vein of rotten quartz "lousy with gold." The first three panfuls taken out and crushed in a crude manner gave returns of \$120, \$102 and \$123 pure gold.

Open Shop in St. Louis.

St. Louis, Mo., April 2.—Open shop, put into effect yesterday by all breweries in this city and East St. Louis is fulfilling the ultimatum issued by owners last Saturday night that if all workers did not return to work Monday morning the measure would be adopted.

The unions will not be recognized as organizations. All employees persons applying will be employed regardless of affiliations. Hundreds of workmen, some union, some non-union, were given work at various plants. No questions were asked. A conference of local union officials and international officers is being held.

Playing Slot Machines His Downfall.

Alton, Ill., April 2.—With an article of treasured French, Greek and Latin books, Professor Albert Williams, aged 60 years, formerly principal of the Humboldt school, and also of the public schools at New Alton, was admitted to the Madison county poor farm. He was removed from his position as school principal five years ago. A year later his wife obtained a divorce. He became addicted to playing slot machines, and since the loss of his position has lost his entire fortune of \$12,000 in slot machines and is now penniless. He has no children.

Timber Fraud Investigation.

Boise, Idaho, April 2.—The Federal Grand Jury continues its investigation of timber frauds. There is not a vestige of truth in the statement that the Stuenkelberg assassination was because of his evidence against the timber men, for two reasons. The cases were outlawed a year before he was killed, and he was the principal agent of the company. If his friends were committed, he would be the chief conspirator.

Girl Injured by Wrestling.

Chicago, April 2.—W. H. Ines is in the Mercy hospital and is likely to remain there for some time, as the result of a rash challenge made by him to wrestle his daughter, Ines, former right guard for the Renascence College basketball team, for the championship of the family, catch-as-catch-can. The girl won the first fall in three minutes, after which the contest ended and physicians were called. Her father was suffering from a split knee cap, a broken leg and minor injuries.

HAVANA IS NOW UNDER WATER

HIGH WAVES DASH OVER THE SEAWALL AND PROPERTY IS DESTROYED.

Havana, April 2.—A portion of this city along the water front is inundated from the sea. High waves are dashing over the seawall outside the harbor and many streets are flooded. It is feared that some of the houses under water will collapse. The fire department has been called out to Vedado, where the water is reported to be endangering lives. The men are saving property along the sea front and rescuing those in danger. The water has put a stop to the street car service between Havana and Vedado.

Washington, April 2.—According to James Dunne, a temperance worker of New York, who spoke last night before the Catholic Abstinence Society here, New York society is not what Henry Watterson said it was. Dunne is certain that ten per cent of the Four Hundred do much good in the world.

Dunne referred to the good Samaritanism of the rich as follows: "Mr. Watterson said they were a pack of unclean birds. I say with the greatest emphasis that the accusation is false. I know forty of them who are ministering angels—two of whom visit the Toms, two the hospitals, two the island and others trying to save wayward girls."
